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Two-A-Day Football Drills Start Monday, August 14

New Head Coach Ted Giddens is expected to greet some 21 returning gridders plus several freshmen-to-be on Wednesday of this week to issue them football shoes, shorts and T-shirts and to inform them to be on hand at the Valley practice field at 7:30 a.m. next Monday to begin twice-a-day conditioning work in preparation for the upcoming football season and the first game of the season on September 8. Coach Giddens said that the afternoon workouts would begin at 6:00 o'clock.

Coach Giddens told the editor that he was very excited about being here at Valley and really feels that this year will be a very good one for the team and its fans. A good schedule has been set up for the coming season that will benefit both the players and the fans. The District has been changed some from the past years. Sudan and Nazareth have been transferred into the South Zone, and Claude, which has been classified as an A school, has been dropped to Class B and will be a member of this district, 2-B North Zone.

Since Quitaque-Turkey consolidated, Valley has opened each sea-

son against Chillicothe but that has all changed this year. Valley's first four games this year will be against Class A schools. The Patriots will open the season here against Crosbyton, then comes Ralls, Spur and Paducah, in that order. All of these teams will be tough so the Patriots will know how good they are by the time district warfare opens. At present the Patriots have one open date, thus a nine-game regular schedule.

Coach Steve Adams and Coach Robert Phelps will assist Coach Giddens during the football season.
