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## Turkey Hit By Severe Rain-Hail Storm Sunday Night

Hail and wind damage was received from the rain storm that hit the Turkey area Sunday night. The rain storm came in from the east. The big hail swath covered an area about four miles wide from about the Northfield turnoff on Highway 70 across to the Turkey Farmers Coop Gin located in the Wolf Flat area, with the cemetery being about the center of the hail storm. Cotton crops were completely wiped out in this area.

Severe winds damaged the area, with many tree limbs twisted off. At the Jim Majors residence, their carport was collapsed on their automobile. They were away on vacation at the time. At the Burl Pierce home one mile south of Turkey on Highway 70, their new brick carport that they had just built was destroyed. The County highway barns located on Highway 70 were partly unroofed.

Heavy rain fell in the area with reports ranging from .6 in Turkey proper, 2.8 at the Turkey Co-op Gin, and other reports ran as high as five inches. A reported 3,000 acres of cotton was destroyed by the storm.

## Cover Crops Save Energy And Increase Profits

Caprock Soil Conservation District O. E. Chandler is sold on over-seeding his irrigated cotton with rye. "The great thing about it is that I don't have soil blowing and I don't have to plow during the winter. Other farmers who don't overseed their cotton plow all winter," said Mr. Chandler, who farms southeast of Quitaque in Briscoe County.

Chandler broadcasts 40 - 60 pounds of rye per acre in his growing cotton about September 1. He then cultivates to incorporate the seed in the soil. "I always have enough moisture to get a good stand," said Chandler. The operations cost about \$5 per acre for seed and \$2 to \$2.50 per acre for cultivating.

Mr. Chandler grazes his rye during the winter with stocker

cattle. Sometimes he gets good grazing as early as January and he grazes until April 15 or May 1. "We have to plant cotton late because of the boll weevils," said Chandler, "so there is no reason to get the land ready early."

Chandler, who runs cattle on grass as well as the rye, said of his operation, "I usually irrigate once in February and can run one cow per acre from March 1 until May." He added, "Sometimes I made more money from cattle than farming."

When Mr. Chandler prepares his land for planting cotton in the spring, he doesn't plow his stubble under but leaves it on top of the soil. After plowing with stubble mulch equipment and incorporating Treflan, he lists his land and is ready for another crop.
