## **Good Showers** Fall Across

From good to heavy showers fell across the Valley area Sunday morning.

The rains started falling in spots around seven o'clock and fell intermittently until between 9:30 and 10:00 when it started falling heavier and continued to fall until noon.

The rain fell gently with no runoff for the most. The heavier amounts seemed to be over Quitaque for some reports of more than two and one-half inches were recorded. Most of the reports seemed to be in the half inch to three-quarter inch range all over the area. In Turkey proper, the report was about .70 of an inch.
