After arriving at the lodge, the men "scouted and set out baits Aldridge. Each man used a portable tree stand, putting him 6-10 feet in the air on a seat mounted on and chained to the tree.

Tainted meat scraps were set out and covered with logs to keep the small animals from stealing it, they explained. From 3:30 until 10:30 each evening, the hunters would be in their stands watching for their prey. "Prime time for hunting is in the evening," Aldridge said. "All of our bears were taken from 7-9 p.m."

The hunters would use old logging roads, high line clearings, or streams for their bait stations. 'The bugs aren't as bad in the clearings," said Aldridge. The hunters wore headnets, long sleeved shirts, gloves and tape on their cuffs to keep the heavy insects away, according to Aldridge.

A total of sixteen bears were sighted their week in Ontario, "a good concentration."

"We were in the right area at the right time," Aldridge said. They did take credit for "scouting good and putting the right bait out."

"It is critical to get a perfect shot," said Aldridge. "It's important to be a good archer.,' By taking their time and setting up the bears, each hunter came through with a good hit, bringing down his black bear.

By the next-to-last day, four hunters had gotten their bears, which they felt was a very successful hunt. But on the last day the other two hunters got their CENTRAL AMERICA bears averaged 200 pounds, with the largest one weighing in at 425-450 pounds. "That's a tremendous black bear for the spring," said Aldridge. "They will put on 150-200 pounds by fall," The hunters are sure the large black bear will "make the bow hunting re-

CONDITIONS RIGHT FOR INTER-SEEDING RYE

Moisture conditions are excellent now for inter-seeding rye or winter peas into your cotton if you have not already done so, according to Charles Wade, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Memphis.

A good cover crop will help protect the land this winter and spring from wind erosion as well as help build up the organic matter and humus in the soil. The more organic matter and humus the soil has, the better the aeriation, absorption and water holding capacity is, Wade said.

The Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District is encouraging everyone to interseed a cover crop to help protect their land against wind erosion.
