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Patriots Go Against Wheeler At Memphis Friday Night

The Valley High Patriots won the District 2-B championship last Thursday night at Bulldog Stadium in Plainview when they beat a good Amherst Bulldog team 21-7.

By winning the district title, the Patriots won the right to advance to the state playoffs and the Patriots' first foe will be the defending Class B champion, the Wheeler Mustangs.

Last week's game for the district title was the biggest game in the six-year history of Valley High School but this week's game of course is still an even bigger one. The game will match the number one ranked Mustangs against the number six rated Patriots. Wheeler, in addition to being the top-rated Class B team in the state, also owns the longest winning streak of any football team of any classification in the state. Wheeler has won 29 games since last tasting defeat. Valley has won nine games this season and has only been tied by Crosbyton in the first game of the season.

The Mustangs boast the gaudiest season record in winning their 10 games this season but this reporter suspects that the Patriots have played the tougher schedule having started the season by playing four straight Class A teams, winning three and tying one and giving up a total of 26 points to the four teams.

Wheeler and Valley last played each other in 1964 when the two teams were playing in Class A and Wheeler won that game by a 12-0 score, a game the so-called experts said the Mustangs would "win as big as they wanted to win." The truth was the Mustangs had to work for the win and it was only in the fourth quarter that the Mustangs scored their second TD. That was in the days before Valley High ever won a football game. It might be noted that that same season (the night before the varsity teams played, in fact) the two junior high teams played and Valley won 32-0. These two teams, of course, were made up largely of the same players that are seniors on the present varsity and Kenneth Helms ran wild in that game. Wheeler has three players who were named all-state last year with Grimes, the Mustangs' fine halfback being the one getting most of the headlines. The Patriots feel they have the personnel to match just about anyone. The Patriots, in fact, will have an edge on the Mustangs in size. Coach Giddens and his assistants, Coaches Steve Adams and Robert Phelps, drove over to see Wheeler roll over Booker last Friday night. Coach Giddens says the Mustangs are quick and fast and that the Patriots will have to play better than they have ever played to win. The Mustangs will be favored to win but the Patriots have been looking forward to this game all year and will come to play. A large crowd of Valley fans will be on hand at Memphis Friday night to root for the Patriots.

In winning the district championship last Friday night the Patriots did something that they have had to do only about one other occasion this year: they had to come from behind to win. Amherst took the game-opening kickoff and marched to the Valley 34 yard line before losing the ball on a fumble. The Patriots picked up nine yards before facing fourth down and one at the 46. Valley went for the first down but failed to make it and the Bulldogs took over on the 46. From

there the Bulldogs scored in four plays and kicked the PAT and led 7-0. The two teams traded possessions again before the first period ended, with Valley in possession on the Amherst 48. From that point the Patriots, with Dowd, Helms, McNary and Proctor sharing the ball-toting chores, marched downfield for a touchdown. James McNary got the TD from about three yards out and then Darrell Dowd ran the ball in for a 2-point conversion and the Patriots had what amounted to the winning point as Valley led 8-7 with 9:07 left to play in the second quarter.

The Patriots stopped the Bulldogs cold on the next possession and Amherst kicked to Valley on their own 24. Six plays later the Patriots scored again with the big play being a 60 yard pass-run play from Proctor to Jon Davidson. Proctor kicked the extra point and Valley led 15-7 with 4:00 left in the half.

On the kickoff the ball went out of bounds and the Patriots were penalized five yards, their only penalty of the game. Neither team could move the ball for the remainder of the period and at halftime Valley led 15-7. The third period was scoreless. Proctor ran for the third touchdown from the three yard line and the try for extra point was no good and Valley led 21-7 early in the quarter. Valley moved deep into Amherst territory before losing the ball inside the 10 on a fumble.

The Bulldogs were big and tough, certainly the biggest team the Patriots have played this year. The Patriots executed well and flawlessly Friday night. The Patriots had been plagued with penalties all season long but luckily they have been able to overcome losses due to the penalties. Friday night Valley was penalized only five yards, that when a kickoff went out of bounds. Except for the opening minutes of the first period Valley was well in control of the ball game and except for their only score the Bulldogs were not able to put on a sustained drive. Valley rolled up 16 first downs to 13 for Amherst. Valley accounted for 348 total yards of offense to 207 for Amherst.

A large crowd was on hand to witness a very good game in spite of the weather. Valley had a large group of well-wishers within the district which was appreciated by all. Cheerleaders from Silverton came to Valley Thursday afternoon.

It should be a real "barn burner." See you there!

Coach Giddens stated that it was hard to select outstanding

players in last week's district win for all the team played well. However he picked the following players to honor this time:

OFFENSIVE BACKS: The coaches selected two players to honor. They are Kirk Proctor and Kenneth Helms. Both players had key roles in the win, performing very well at quarterback and running back, coming up with the big play time after time.

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN: Kenny Chandler came up with good blocks all night long as he cleared the way for Valley ballcarriers. A very fine football player.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER: Darrell Dowd, a great all around football player. Darrell gets headlines as

a great offensive player. However, his coaches will be the first to tell you that Darrell goes all out on defense, too, giving 100% all the time.

BIG PATRIOT: The coach said he had to pick two Big Patriots this time. They are Jon Davidson and Darrell Dowd. Both these players came up with big plays all night long, both on defense and offense. Jon caught a pass (he made a very fine catch) and ran for a touchdown, the play covering 60 yards. In addition he sacked the ballcarriers several times on defense. Dowd ran for 156 yards against a big, tough defense on a muddy field. One of his best performances.

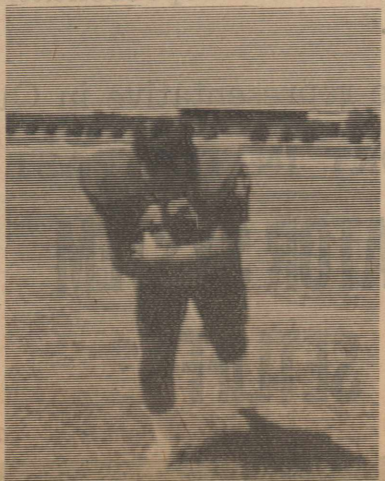
MET AT D-FW AIRPORT

Farmers Union Task Force on Foreign Land Investments met at the Dallas-Fort Worth airport in the Marina hotel recently.

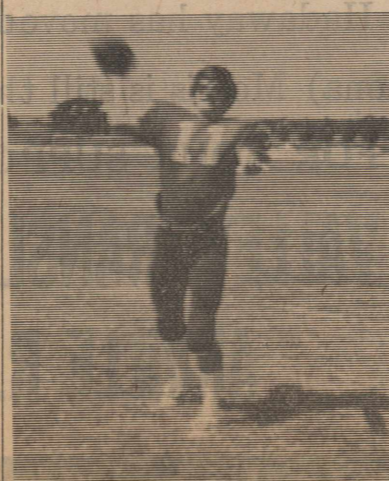
FU has retained a lobbyist to guide us on a proposed bill. We will meet again in January. Tentatively we are going to sponsor two bills.

One is a law to prohibit foreign investors from buying farm land in Texas. Another is to ban corporations other than bonafide farm corporations from operating in Texas.

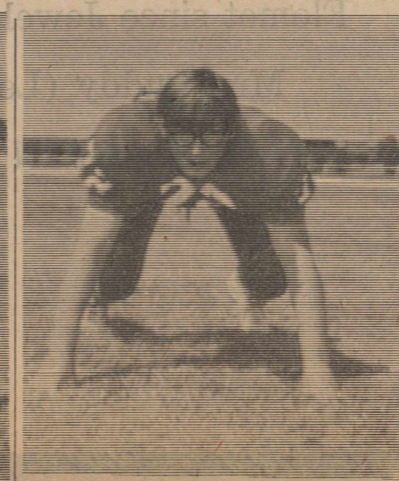
The State Task Force Committee will testify before the Texas Legislature, probably in February.

"WE THE WOMEN" HAVE SPECIAL LUNCHEON GUESTS MONDAY

Mrs. Lynda Fogerson, Briscoe County Assistant Extension Agent from Silverton, and Bill Benson, Specialist in Community Resources Development with the Texas A&M Extension Service, were special guests of "We the Women" Monday at the regular monthly luncheon.

Mrs. O. R. Stark, jr., president of "We the Women," introduced Mrs. Fogerson, who, in turn, introduced the speaker, Mr. Benson.

Mr. Benson brought a very interesting and informative address. He told the club not to go into the Beautification Contest just to win a contest, but to have goals to win for the improvement of the community. He stated that the most important thing that could be accomplished by entering the contest is Citizen Involvement. He stated the first thing to begin was Community Organization. He praised "We the Women" for having

accomplished this before he came. He said he had not been in another town where the women were organized as they are in Quitaque.

Some of the things the contest involves is Community Beautification: clean yards, removal of junk cars, erection of street signs (all of these have been stressed in Quitaque already, but must be continued to a greater effort). Another thing we have which he commended is the Emergency Medical Service. This is a requirement of the contest, to provide medical service to the community. He stressed getting individuals involved along with schools, 4-H clubs, senior citizens, youth, agriculture areas, including terracing, etc. We are a community, striving together to improve our lot in life. He stated that the first thing a traveler or visitor notices on entering a town is its neatness. This first impression often makes the difference in the desire of one to make his home in a particular town.

There are a number of require-

ments for a community which enters the Beautification Contest, in which Quitaque was recognized a few years ago. Much working together is required to get the job done. One requirement is to answer the question, "Twenty Most Important Reasons Why I Live in Quitaque." Another requirement is to Assist Other Communities. There are many reasons why we desire to live in Quitaque. There is also a helping hand to other communities when there is need, whether it be illness, fire, or whatever emergency that requires help.

Mr. Benson closed his address with the remark: "Set your goals and work toward those goals. Work to make Quitaque a better place to live."

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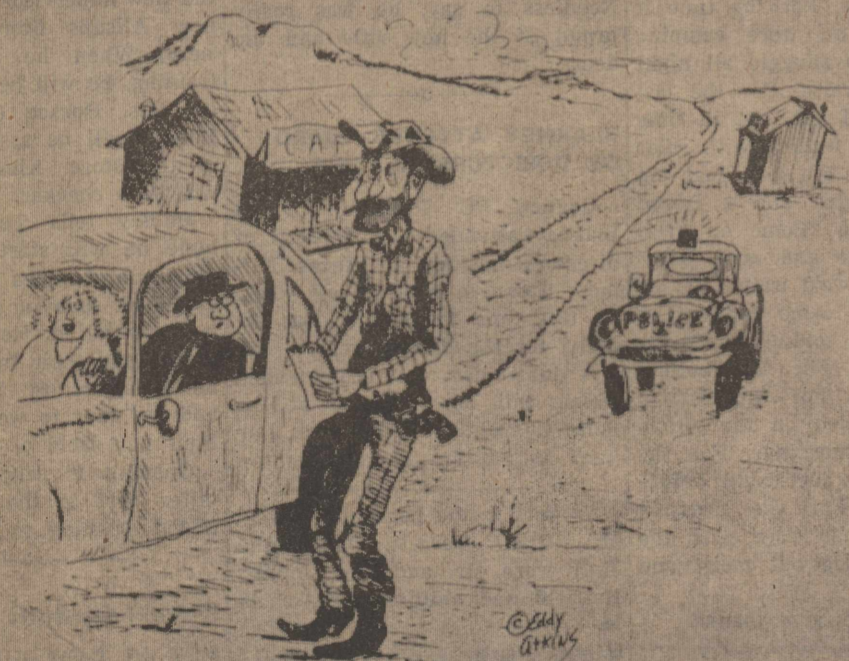

Before the start of a new year on December 1, 1978, I would like to make some announcements.

First, all the interest held by Mrs. Odell Setliff and her children in Valley Translator System has been purchased. It is now totally owned and managed locally.

Second, the rates will have to be raised for next year's service from \$45.00 to \$55.00 due to the following reasons:

1. Electric Power, rates have increased from approximately \$25.00 per month to a high of \$200.00 for the month of September 1978.
2. Parts for the Translators, such as tubes, etc., have increased in price over 500%.
3. Insurance on buildings and equipment has increased from \$250.00 per year to over \$1000.00 last year.

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DOWD AGAIN NAMED CLASS B PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Although he's missed two games, Valley tailback Darrell Dowd still has managed to push through opposition defenses for 1,292 yards thus far this season.

Dowd's achievements have earned him the Globe-News Texas area Class B Player of the Week Award twice previously. Among his better efforts was a 273-yard outing against Nazareth.

Forget about the past, however, says Valley coach Ted Giddens. Dowd's best effort of the season came last Friday night in the District 2-B North-South zone play-off between the Patriots and Amherst.

"It would have to be (his best outing)," said Giddens, "because the weather dictated that Darrell perform good for us to win and he did."

Valley won 21-7, with Dowd as the main contributor. He gained 156 yards on 34 carries on a night when a treacherous field made any kind of running play a hazard.

And on defense, the Valley senior contributed three solo tackles and 12 assists from a linebacker spot.

Dowd's effort, which enabled the Pats to advance to the first round of state play Friday night against Wheeler, has earned him yet another Player of the Week honor.

"The field was real damp and soft," explained Giddens. "It had rained all day. The field was in such bad shape we couldn't use our outside threat. So they knew we were either coming with Darrell or with (Kenneth) Helms."

"They were stopping up the middle with Helms so we were sweeping at em. We'd give it to Darrell on third down and long and he was getting the first down."

Dowd converted on nine third-down situations, according to Giddens.

"The weather conditions kinda limited the running. Darrell was getting the pitch and was getting outside. But he couldn't make any moves—he had to run over people to pick up five and six yards at a whack."
