TO NEWSPAPER ADS

The following was taken from the Texas Press Association weekly newsletter.

On the average weekday, four out of 10 adults go to food stores, one in four shops for other merchandise and nearly half of these (44%) look for ads in their newspaper before shopping, according to a study by the newspaper Advertising Bureau. More than half of the women (52%) and nearly four out of 10 men (37%) in the sampling reported that they looked forward to seeing newspaper ads. By comparison, only about one in 10 men or women said that they look forward to commercials on radio and TV and less than three in 10 (30%) of the women and (25%) of the men look forward to seeing the ads in the magazines.





Four EMTs have been certified by the American Heart Association to teach you basic emergency life-saving techniques called CPR-cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the Heimlich Maneuver.

These EMTs are Elgin Conner, David Brunson, Jerry Maupin and Lynnette Barefield. Other local EMTs have volunteered to help organize and conduct the classes.

They will teach an eight-hour course that will be held from 7-10 p.m. on March 20, 22 and 23. At the end of the course, all those who pass a skills exam and a written exam will be issued a card of certification from the American Heart Association.

There will be a small fee of approximately \$2 to cover the cost of renting the Community Center.

The class will be limited to 30 people. If you are interested in learning these life-saving techniques, you must register at Brunson supply or Caprock Home Center.

Because the response to this program is expected to be high, this is only the first of several classes to be taught.
