Turkey City Water Contains Unsafe Level Of Nitrates

The City of Turkey has been by" symptoms. Parents are adnotified by the Texas Depart- vised to find other sources of ment of Health that the water drinking water, such as bottled being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act;" Public Law 93-523 (U.S.)

The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water we supply was reported to be 14.9 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of six months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of six months may reand possibly produce "blue ba-

water, for their infants under six months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. Caution: DO NOT BOIL YOUR WATER. Boiling the water will increase the concentration of Nitrate.

The City of Turkey has applied to the Texas Department of Health for an exemption from the Nitrate requirement while we search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques which would lower the Nitrate to an acceptable level. In the meantime, please follow the precautions mentioned.

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

There was some improvement on rice, but the group failed to get any change on peanuts. The committee had worked several days and would not re-write much of its original policy. Texas came out better than most states, however.

On Wednesday, delegates moved and seconded to get peanuts visited with quite a few people amended to 100% parity, but failed again. The delegates knew it would not pass, but they stood pat for the Texas policy. They did get some more improvement on cotton passed on the floor. Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland spoke Tuesday evening. He stated that we need the Brannon plan. This was the Farmers Union plan and it worked well. Charles Brannon is former Secretary of Agriculture and is now the FU legal advisor and was seated by Mr. Bergland, who said if farmers get 100% parity the big farmers would soon buy the small farmers out and therefore he is against 100% parity. But he did say that if farmers could come up with a plan that would help the small family farmer he would try to do something about it.

Out of all the farmers from across the nation who attended this convention, it was Texas' F President, Jay Naman, who offered this statement and it was adopted: "Mr. Bergland, if you are sincere in your statement to help the family farmer we will meet with you at the earliest possible date." Telegrams were sent to the Secretary and to all members of the Agriculture Committee. This thought represents a ray of hope.






