### Texas Tech **Graduates Of 1929 Are Honored**

Bill Leslie of Memphis, a member of the Texas Tech graduating class of 1929, attended a 50th Anniversary Celebration in Lubbock last weekend.

Beginning with a dinner on Thursday in Furr's Cafeteria, the Tech graduates of the Class of 1929 attended a get-together at the Hilton Inn Thursday night.

Friday morning, the group took a bus tour of the University Campus and enjoyed a luncheon at University Center. At the luncheon, diplomas were presented to each of the 40 Ex-Students attending from the Class of 1929. The diplomas made the Ex-Students members of the "Order of the Golden Double-T."

Friday afternoon a reception was held in the Ex-Student Building on the Texas Tech campus.

Texas Technological College was established in 1923, but it was the fall of 1925 before official classes began. There were several transfer students who completed their requirements for graduation in 1927 and 1928, but it was the 1929 graduating class, less than 200 strong, which was the first class to complete all four years at Texas Tech. The first thing to be decided, it was pointed out, is the location for the new building. Sheriff Elmer Neel has looked at several locations. 

Arthur Onken, Professor at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. His work was in conjunction with the SEA-USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland.

Research results indicate that nitrogen is leached below the root zone by heavy applications of irrigation water on sandy soils. Large amounts of rainfall could produce the same effect, the researcher says. Leaching of nitrogen on sandy soils also occurs when it is applied prior to preplant irrigation.

While nitrogen application is critical on sandy soils, it is not a problem on clay and clay loam soils. Nitrogen can be applied to these soils with equal effectiveness if applied anytime from fall to early sidedress.

Producers using split applications of nitrogen fertilizer (half preplant and the remaining half sidedressed) are also reminded that the proper time for sidedressing is within 30 days after ers, mainly eggs on tips of pe-

have shown there is no economic advantage from the practice of splitting nitrogen applications. Splitting the nitrogen on sandy soils also enhances the possibility of bad weather preventing the sidedress nitrogen application. There is, however, one advantage obtained if high rates of

fertilizer are to be utilized for maximum yields. This being a lower probability of stand problems caused by high nitrogen in the seedbed.

In studies on sandy soils, sidedressed nitrogen produced irrigated sorghum yields ranging from 7,180 to 7,540 pounds per acre. These sorghum yields were dependent upon the amount of nitrogen required. If sorghum producers are interested in how much nitrogen to apply, they should have their soil tested for nitrogen. A soil analysis for nitrogen provides the irrigated and dryland producers the advantage of maximum utilization of residual nitrogen thus reducing production costs. Contact me for information on soil testing.

Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in Briscoe County. Get this costly pecan pest before eggs hatch and the worms get inside pecans.

Be alert to signs of casebearcans. Early identification and Dr. Onken and his associates control can help cope with the pest before real damage occurs.

Once you see eggs on tips of tiny nuts, spray pecan trees within four to five days. This is extremely important because the casebearer (in the form of a worm as it emerges from the egg) must be killed before it enters the pecan.
