by Richard Morrison, hatches and rears these wasps by the
millions under controlled condimanagement project. management project.
The way Trichogramma works
to combat bollworms and budworms can be effective, and does not present some of the
problems that are sometimes as sociated with the broad spectrum insecticides. The wasps are us ually flown on a field by air-
plane. The Trichogramma then plane. The Trichogramma then
find the budworm or bollworm eggs on a cotton plant and sting
the eggs to kill them. They bore a hole in each egg and lay their own egg inside. When the Trichogramma egg hatches, it goes through the larval and pupal sta
ges within the budworm or boll ges within the budworm or boll-
worm egg and then emerges a worm egg and then emerges as
an adult, ready to find more eggs. By releasing large numbers of Trichogramma, scientists at College Station have been able pest eggs in heavily infested fields of cotton.
"Farmers are beginning to
realize that beneficial insects
such as the Trichogramma wasp
are a valuable resource," said
Dr. Roger Ables, another of the
scientists working on biologic
control at College Station. "Under the proper conditions bene
ficial insects can be quite useful, ficial insects can be quite useful,
if you can conserve them through careful and selective use
of insecticides, then it may be of insecticides, then it may be pest control.
"We've got
our dependence got to get away from our dependence on broad spec-
trum insecticides. Those that wipe out everything in the field. We've got to go to more selective chemicals which affect the target pest while having relative
ly little or no effect on our bene ly little or no effect on our bene
