Knight said he got to know Bass professionally in the five months he knew him. He said he was a kind and nice man.

Knight said Bass was diagnosed with melanoma about 12 years ago. He was in remission, but was diagnosed with cancer again approximately two months

Knight said the department was surprised by the news of Bass's death because he looked healthy.

"We are still in a bit of shock," he said. "It all happened so quick." Knight said Bass loved to be physically active and was involved with faculty

sports teams. Bass'soffice contained many trophies for sports, such as badminton, volleyball, basketball and tennis, Knight said. "He's extremely active in sports," Knight said.

# Bell towers return to use

Soon the famous words of the Texas Tech fight song — "and the victory bells will ring out" — will

The well-known tradition of the bells playing music between classes and after Tech victories has been on hold for the last year and a half because of

The bell towers have been undergoing restorations because of inevitable weathering during the last 75 years, said Mike Ellicott, vice chancellor of facilities planning and construction.

The \$3.1 million project has been under construction for approximately 18 months, Ellicott said. The victory bell, a gift from the graduating class of 1936, is rung for 30 minutes after each Tech victory by the

Saddle Tramp President Matt Schultz said ringing the victory bells will be a great tradition to have

"It'll be nice to ring the victory bells again after basketball games for tradition purposes," he said. "It has been a Saddle Tramp tradition since the late 1930s."

The Saddle Tramps' ringing the bells, which weigh a combined 1,200 pounds and hang in the east side of the Administration building, has been a Tech tradition since former Tech student Arch Lamb, romised that if Tech beat Texas Christian University in a football game, he would ring the bells all night long, Schultz said.

Tech beat TCU, and to the dismay of the Lubbock residents, Lamb rung the bells all night. The time limit on ringing the bells after Tech victories soon was shortened to 30 minutes, Schultz said.

The carillon, played between classes by the music department, still is undergoing restoration, Ellicott

"We have just been doing repairs. Stones were loose, and the structure had deteriorated," he said. "(The carillon) should be completed around the end of March or early April."

The carillon is in the west tower of the Administration building and are comprised of 36 bells, playing organ-like music between classes.

The restoration project was primarily renovating existing stonework, and the repairs are mostly complete, Project Manager Rick Richeda said.

"The mechanisms will be replaced, and we will check the tones of the bells," he said. "It will help with the total improvements."

The last 18 months have primarily focused on repairing environmental damages the open structure

# The common condom — looking at pros, cons of most popular contraceptive

Some medical professionals in Lubbock and at Texas Tech believe students should consider condoms when engaging in inter-

"Condoms can be very effective at reducing the transmission (of STDs), but they are not 100 percent effective," said Eric Benson, former disease investigator for the Texas Department of Health.

Male condoms are the most common of including HIV/AIDS, according to Consumer so the contraceptive is not ripped. Reports.



counselors. Turns out, they had not changed either. The service still was exceptional, the paperwork straightforward and the staff friendly. No sarcasm inserted here.





ably err to the side of caution and use one," Thompson said.

Although using condoms can protect against pregnancy, 90 out of 1,000 women will become pregnant if using only condoms, according to the U.S. National Survey of Family Growth.

Thompson said women who are uncertain of the monogamy of their relationship should use two types of birth control, barriers and hormones, Thompson said. This ensures that if something hinders a condom's effectiveness, birth control will still be present to prevent pregnancy.

If one is not in a long-term relationship or at a stage in life where one could care for a child, precautions should be taken, Thompson said.

Male condoms are inexpensive and do not need to be remembered daily like the pill. The failure rate is two in every 100 women if used perfectly and 15 per 100 women if used typically, according to Consumer Report's Web site, www. ConsumerReports.org.

has sustained, Ellicott said, adding 95 percent of the stone was reused, as was 98 percent of the roofing tile.

Ellicott said although the concrete used for the restoration is more modern, because of the effects of harsh weather conditions on the open structure, more repairs may be necessary in

several years. 'The guy who has my job in 75 years may have to do some of the same things we are doing today," he said. "(The structure) cannot be waterproofed."

Ellicott said if any of the \$3.1 million funding for the project is not used, the money will go to the Higher Education Assistance Fund.

Irma Coleman, Tom Coleman's mother, took the stand and attempted to discredit the allegation that her son stole gasoline, saying he only wears black cowboy hats.

In earlier testimony from Jay Adams Jr., the man stealing gas was said to be wearing a tan cow-

The person who stole gasoline, allegedly Coleman, wore a white or gray cowboy hat and drove a gray truck.

It was stated in court that Coleman drives a 1992 Ford F150 that is brown on the bottom, tan in the middle and brown on top.

Irma Coleman said she paid her son's \$7,000 debt and did not have to borrow money to do so, but said she did not know for what the debt was.

"I paid it in August of 1998,"

Irma Coleman said her son had his mail sent to her P.O. box while he was an undercover agent, but said she never received any legal notices regarding stolen gasoline.

"I don't know what your hangup is about lawyers and letters," she said. "He did not steal any gas. I did not know he was paying restitution for anything."

The defense noted that paying restitution does not mean someone is guilty of a crime; however, Irma Coleman said she would not pay restitution for something she had not done, which does not coincide with prior statements.

"I will never stop helping my children," she said.

The defense called Gary O. Smith, a practicing Lubbock attorney who settled Coleman's theft case by having him pay restitu-

Smith said when he initially spoke to Coleman, he was not sure whether the case was criminal or civil. It sounded like a criminal matter, he said.

Smith testified that Coleman told him he had problems and acknowledged he was indebted Morton residents, but said he had not stolen gas.

Smith prepared a waiver of arraignment, which acknowledges that a defendant understands charges against him and understands his

Coleman signed the waiver.

A few months later, Coleman paid restitution, and the charges were dropped.



## MLB, players decide on new steroid-testing policy


SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Saying it wanted to restore confidence in the game, baseball rolled out a tougher steroid-testing program Thursday that includes penalties for first-time offenders and random, year-round checks.

"I've been saying for some time my goal for this industry is zero tolerance toward steroids," baseball commissioner Bud Selig said.

A first positive test would result in a suspension of up to 10 days, a second positive test a 30-day ban, a third positive a 60-day penalty and a fourth positive test a one-year ban. Under the previous agreement, a first positive test resulted only in treatment, and a second positive test was subject to a 15-day suspension. Only with a fifth positive test

was a player subject to a one-year ban under the old plan. Since the old agreement was reached in 2002, the sport has come under increased scrutiny about steroids. Barry Bonds, Jason Giambi and Gary Sheffield testified before

a federal grand jury investigating a California lab, and President Bush brought up the steroids issue in a State of the Union address.


