Rusty Brooks, the security manager at South Plains Mall, said he has seen more panhandling around the mall this year than normal, and encourages anyone who encounters someone asking for money immediately to contact

From Lubbock With Love is not the only tsunami relief effort happening in Lubbock.

The National Pan-Hellenic Council, South Asian Student Association and Alpha Phi Alpha Inc. have teamed up to help raise money for those suffering from the recent disaster.

The organizations have set up a table in the free speech pavilion through Friday where people can donate money to help in the relief.

Nahum Aman, treasurer of Alpha Phi Alpha and a senior international business major from Asmara, Eritera, said the organizations have set their goals high in the coming days.

"Our goal is \$10,000, and we will hopefully get there by the end of the week," Aman said.

Seth Freo, president of Alpha Phi Alpha and a senior business major from Grand Prairie, said the effort has been generating about \$150 a day plus private donations.

"If everyone on this campus gave \$1, that would be almost \$30,000 of relief for the disaster victims," Freo said. "Wednesday we came out with \$1500 in relief funds.'

More events are planned for the near future that will give students a chance to help the tsunami victims.

"The chancellor is sponsoring a barbecue soon to help us with our efforts," Freo said. "This week is going to be an intense effort."

Peterson said the Great Plains Life building down-

town was empty for 10 years after the tornado hit because of damage.

Morris said a tornado hit Happy, a town north of Lubbock, on May 5, 2002.

Peterson said tornadoes have caused minor damage around Lubbock about once per decade.

Nevertheless, Morris said he does not believe a cause for concern exists.

"This is one of the safest areas in the country to live," he said. If a tornado should occur, Peter-

Iraqi-born U.S. citizen charged in oil-for-food

WASHINGTON (AP) - An Iraqi-American businessman, accused of pocketing millions of dollars through the U.N. oil-for-food program with Iraq, pleaded guilty Tuesday to acting as an illegal agent of Saddam Hussein's government.

Samir A. Vincent, 64, a naturalized U.S. citizen from Annandale, Va., is the first person to be charged in the Justice Department's investigation of the program, which U.N. audits have shown was badly mismanaged.

The United Nations operated the program from 1996 to 2003 as a way for Iraq's oil riches to benefit its people, who were suffering from years of deprivation brought by economic sanctions imposed on Saddam's regime after its 1990 invasion of Kuwait.

Under the program, proceeds from the sale of oil from Iraq was placed into an account overseen by the United Nations. Money was to be withdrawn by Iraq only to purchase food, medicine and other humanitarian necessities

The program produced an estimated \$67 billion for humanitarian needs in Iraq but was used by Saddam to generate illegal kickbacks that totaled another \$1.7 billion, according to a CIA report by special weapons inspector Charles Duelfer.

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



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Tech's endless use of students' Social Security numbers poses a threat to students' security The Holy Bible is wholly offensive The holy book is under attack, while other books face no retribution for their offenses

So I finally got my financial aid refund. Usually the opening of this envelope is a very pleasant experience for me. Not this time, though, because someone already had beaten me to it.

The envelope was flapping open, completely unsealed and with half the glued part ripped off. It was not an encouraging sight.

At first I wasn't too concerned; my check was still in there, so what was the big deal? Until my roommate pointed out my Social Security number was on the statement.

Suddenly I became concerned. All the horrible identity theft stories I had heard, all those used-to-befunny commercials about fraud, all the remote possibilities screeched to a halt in my brain and demanded my attention.

Determined not to be a statistic, I decided to spend the next morning sorting this out. So I got up and called the post office, intent on explaining my problem. The nice lady on the other end of the phone said she would send me a questionnaire about mail tampering and a pamphlet on avoiding identity theft. Zero for one.

Then I called the police, thinking maybe they could fingerprint the check or at least tell me some ways to avoid becoming a victim. Instead, the person with whom I spoke told me the PD couldn't do anything until I actually was robbed. Zero for two.

Then I called Student Business Services, where the first words I heard were, "What is your Social Security number?" Three strikes — I'm out.

The experience was disconcerting not so much because it seemed nobody could help me, because likely, those departments could not do much. It was more the thought of how unnecessary the experience really was.

Why was my Social Security number on my check in the first place? The school has my name and address. Even if my Social was used in the administrative process, was it really necessary to put it on the refund check?



According to FBI statistics, identity theft is the fastest growing crime in America. Given how often we give out our personal information, I can see why.

Considering how personal our Social Security numbers are supposed to be, our society is far too dependent on them, particularly at Tech. I need it to register, to drop, to take a test, to check books out of the library if I forget my ID, to find out any information from a campus department, to check my grades and on and on. At one point I returned something to the bookstore, and the cashier asked for my Social Security number.

According to FBI statistics, identity theft is the fastest growing crime in America. Given how often we give out our personal information, I can see why.

Obviously the way the entire nation uses Social Security numbers is not going to change. But maybe the way Tech uses it can. Following is an impassioned plea to administrators to please, please stop putting our identities in danger.

Every student at Tech is issued a unique test number. Why can't this number be used in place of our Social Security numbers? It can be used on tests, to post grades, to register and so on. While this does mean we have to remember another number, I think we can handle it.

Granted, someone still could get hold of this number and sign me up for a bunch of classes I don't want, or whatever. But a lot less is at stake with this number. I'm willing to take the risk.

Now, I understand why I give identifying information to departments on campus when I call with questions. I would say the departments just could ask for names, which is fine by me. But while a whole lot of other Heidi Toths aren't at Tech, a few more Smiths and Jones are, which could get confusing. So I see the logic of Social Security numbers. But again, give us each a unique number. Or at least don't ask for my Social Security number until you know you need it.

Take the numbers off our checks and any other documentation where it's not necessary. Keep it on the computer when dealing with my files; I don't care. But please, take it off the checks, the reminders about advising and everything else that's going through the mail. And definitely don't require it when I'm returning something to the bookstore.

Finally, to merchants outside of Tech — please ask for identification when a customer is using a credit card. As consumers, we should demand it. I know it's irritating to pull out your driver's license, and it sets you back a few seconds, but it's much less of a hassle than trying to convince your bank you didn't spend \$6,000 on faux fur.

Consumers — be careful what information you give out on a Web site or over the phone. Make sure your Internet is secure and you know with whom you're dealing.

Protect yourselves. Your identity is valuable. Treat it as such.

Bush will raise his right hand and take the oath of office for the second time as the 43rd president of the United States. While this will be an offensive scene to many liberals, Bush will not be the most offensive sight on stage — it will be the Bible under his left hand.

The Bible stands alone as the most loved and hated book of all time. And it seems the Bible is more offensive now than ever, as evidenced by the increasingly outrageous and hostile attacks by liberal secularists.

The most recent assailant is Michael Newdow, the atheist California lawyer and doctor who tried to have the phrase "under God" removed from the pledge of allegiance. Newdow recently sought to prevent Bush from placing his hand on a Bible while taking the oath of office, claiming the sight would make him feel like an "outsider" by causing him and other non-believers to be "second-class citizens."

But Newdow is not without a faith of his own. In fact, he is a licensed minister of atheism (I've heard everything now) and attends an Internet church (well, almost everything). He claims while he and his fellow members worship nobody, they espouse a common worldview. And according to a Washington Times article, when asked how he determines right from wrong, Newdow said, "I use my brain."

(Perhaps rather than use a Bible, Newdow would prefer Bush raise his right hand and place his left on top of his head.)

Ridiculous attacks like this one are not just coming from individuals. It seems the Bible now is offending entire countries — and not the ones you would think.

Last year, Canada's governor general signed into law the famed "Bible as hate speech" bill fol-

lowing its overwhelming passage in the legislature. The bill actually categorizes the Bible as "hate literature" when used to speak out against homosexuality.

Now, by law, a Canadian minister, who believes the Bible to be inherent and uses it to speak out against homosexuality, could face a maximum penalty of five years in prison — for simply preaching the Bible!

But while the Bible is facing relentless challenges, and the belief in its absolute truth is being suppressed, other books and beliefs are being protected from any sort of offense.

Last week, a federal judge ruled that a three-sentence sticker placed on the cover of science textbooks in Cobb County, Ga., violated the constitution. The sticker reads: "This textbook contains material on evolution. Evolution is a theory,

not a fact, regarding the origin of living things. This material should be approached with an open mind, studied carefully and critically considered."

U.S. District Judge Clarence Cooper said, "By denigrating evolution, the school board appears to be endorsing the well-known prevailing alternative theory, creationism or variations thereof, even though the sticker does not specifically reference any alternative theories."

Since when is clarifying evolution a "theory" and not a "fact" denigration?

Is it not merely stating an obvious truth?

The judge also claimed the statement aligned the school system with Christians who disagree with evolution from a religious perspective. However, it is obvious a school system that teaches evolution as fact aligns itself with the "religion" of atheism because it automatically precludes a belief in the God of the Bible.

Who is to say an atheist who believes in evolution has any less faith than a Christian who believes in creation? And who is to say that faith does not constitute a religion that worships, if nothing else, random chance? In my opinion, the belief that something came from nothing takes a greater leap of faith than the belief in an omnipotent Creator. And while Newdow claims to believe in nothing, he obviously is a minister of something.

To stop these attacks, it is evident something must be done to calm the critics by making the Bible less offensive. Perhaps we should place a sticker on every Bible that reads: "This is a book filled with useless fables, absolutely void of any significant ideas — unless you are reading in Canada, where the perverse ideas in this book constitute hate speech."



Big Brothers Big Sisters in need of male mentors to volunteer

As Americans reach out to those affected by the tsunami abroad, volunteer opportunities are at home that should reluctant to volunteer for the program is because they not be forgotten. Children in Lubbock are waiting for guidance, for someone to look up to.

She said when the experience is enjoyable and number of children enrolled in the program is larger than the number of potential big brothers or sisters, well worth any strains it may the children, who are between the ages of five and 15, are put on a waiting list.

"We've had kids who waited for up to three years for volunteers," she said.

The children enjoy both kinds of activities. As long as the little brothers or sisters receive personal attention they are enjoying themselves, Miller said.

Despite a common misconception, Miller said, the organization is mostly about having fun.

"People think this is a very serious, grueling commitment, and it's not," she said.

Jody Faircloth, a junior biochemistry major from Lubbock, would agree. Faircloth, who has been a big sister for more than a year, said her little sister does not expect more from their relationship than having a good time.

"They're not looking for you to be mature or to be a parent figure," Faircloth said. "They just want to have fun."

Miller said children in the program make better grades and are less likely to turn to drugs, alcohol and violence later in life. She said the program also has a positive effect on a child's personality, often giving shy children the confidence to be more outgoing.

"Kids without social skills become the most awesome, fun kids to be around," she said.

Miller said the program matches volunteers with children using their personalities and interests as guidelines. For example, she said an engineering major was once paired with a little brother who hated sports but

loved math and science. Miller said the organization checks out potential big brothers and sisters by calling references and running criminal background checks on them. The parent or legal guardian of the child is then given a chance to meet with the volunteer to decide if he or she is a suitable match.

Brannon, who met with his little brother's mother, said the interview made him nervous.

"It was almost like dating a girl, and I had to go talk to the dad," he said.

Miller said the program has a fund-raiser, Bowl for Kid's Sake, on March 4, and all Tech organizations are invited to participate in the Greek Bowl section of the program.





"Nothing has changed at this point," Daly said. "A lot will depend now as to what happens tomorrow whether that changes the dynamics in any material way."

No talks have occurred since Dec. 14. Then, the sides sat down for the second time in six days after not meeting for three months, but any optimism was lost quickly.

The players presented a proposal that offered an immediate 24 percent rollback on all existing contracts, but since it did not provide cost certainty, it was rejected by the owners.

A counterproposal then was presented by the NHL. Once the players' association saw that the offer included a salary cap, it was turned down immediately. Since then, other than rhetoric, there has been silence.






