# Leaders mark 60th anniversary of Auschwitz

in the snowy, winter gloom, world leaders and Auschwitz of Poland, Vladimir Putin of Russia, and Jacques Chirac survivors Thursday remembered victims of the Holocaust of France. German President Horst Koehler sat on the on the 60th anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi platform without speaking in recognition of his country's 1945. Some 1.5 million people, most of them Jews, had death camp.

The ceremony, which opened with the recorded died during World War II. rumble of an approaching train, was held on the spot where new arrivals were brought in by rail to the vast camp and put through "selection" — meaning those few who were deemed able to work were separated from the rest who were taken immediately to the gas chambers.
