Growing Tech campus creates difficulties for water drainage system expansion

When it rains, crossing University Avenue can be difficult for some. However, the drainage system on University Avenue may be an expensive goes." problem to solve.

Glick said there is a University Avenue drainage system, but heavy rainfall causes water drainage to be delayed.





The cost of the venture would be huge, Glick said, but the project would not have to be city funded.

"University Avenue is a strange thing," he said. "It's a city street on lease to Tech."

The solution is not as simple as building a giant ditch to catch water, Glick said, because to build a storm drainage system, someone has to start at the lowest point. The lowest point is out by the canyon, he said, so pipes would have to extend out to the canyon.

"You work uphill," he said. "It has to be sloped enough so there's a churning action in there to keep the sediment from building up."

doesn't happen at a steady rates but at random. It was as if the rate of change for the press, which had been puttering along at a turtle's pace, jumped to lightspeed overnight.

The mainstream media was caught wholly unaware. Nobody really thought the same thing happening to Washington would happen to Walter Cronkite. But it has happened. First came cable: CBS, NBC and ABC News had to share space with first CNN, and then Fox — but at least these were institutions with predictable behaviors, shareholders, hierarchies and vested interests. Then came the Net, and especially Google. The Internet is the most immense information dump, and Google its most powerful search engine. Together, they're an immensely powerful tool; they open access to most of the accumulated records of the world. But this wouldn't have been nearly as threatening without bloggers. The term "blog" comes from the term Weblog. A few years ago, programmers invented a tool, the blog, which made uploading text onto Web pages easier. As a result, online political journals became less like newspapers and more like cable news - on 24/7. So everyone can now have a blog. Anybody who's ever had an opinion - wise philosophers, schizophrenic cranks, your teenage baby-sitter - now can be read by millions. To understand why this is such a big deal, you have to appreciate the control powerful men always have had over information. Power is perception, and public perception has previously been easy to control: the inscriptions of pharaohs on public buildings,

gentleman's-club world, reciprocal butt-kissing among brother politicians is something everyone does: you go to a luncheon and mouth a few nice words and nothing more comes of it. It's the same world where Jordan and his buddies could trade zany remarks without any real consequence.

had been in the wrong place when bombs hit, and others accidentally shot because American-led forces had mistakenly thought they were hostiles.

But the damage had been done. The scandal was unusual because it really wasn't, in the common sense of the word. Some bigwig says something stupid and then retracts it - it happens all the time. No tabloid papers picked it up. It didn't even make the nightly news. And yet Jordan stepped down. So what happened? A species of online political journalists, called bloggers hounded CNN about the remarks.

Jordan, rather than coming clean, tried to pull a cover up. This made the outcry even worse, and eventually he was pressured into resigning. It's incredible, actually. A professional journalist at the helm of possibly the world's most powerful news organization is brought low by a number of guys typing away at their computers.

It's important to realize the setting in which Jordan made his remarks. The Davos meeting, which occurs every year, is kind of like the Super Bowl of world power dealings, where corporations, governments, academics, celebrities, non-governmental organizations and anybody who's anyone meets to talk shop.

Despite its highly publicized and international nature (they had Hollywood stars attending this year), it's the 21st century's closest equivalent to the smoky backrooms of old.

And that's the weird thing. Historically, somebody like Jordan would have had his rear protected from high by the power of the media, and even in the off-chance that some cub reporter leaked it to the Associated Press, 20 or even 10 years ago the entire matter would have been hushed up - in the way Americans never found out about FDR's wheelchair, the extent of Woodrow Wilson's stroke or Strom Thurmond's mixed-race daughter.

Jordan's not the only one to whom this has happened in recent memory. Trent Lott. Dan Rather. Zell Miller. Al

Gore and his Internet. The list goes on. Each of them had a slip of the tongue, something that you or I do every day, that powerful men do among their own kind very often, and they were nailed for it.


Something changed that can be explained by three forces, in increasing order of importance: cable, Google and bloggers. Historically, technology decentralizes power. Since the Industrial Revolution and the rise of the press, most smart observers have realized that and made corresponding adaptations in their behavior.

Elected officials, whose jobs depend on keeping a close ear to the ground, have been pretty good at this. George

Washington's farewell address was printed in newspapers, not read aloud. Lincoln, to whom the Fourth Estate ripped a new one by making fun of his coming to Washington in disguise, managed to pull off the greatest press coup in American

In this new world, you can push a button and move words and pictures and sound around anywhere. As for the blogosphere, nobody's in charge. There's nobody to buy off. Hire one to be your flunky, and like a hydra, a thousand will take his or her place.

It's staggering — imagine a stock market of information that had three buyers, then five, then suddenly a zillion. Granted, like much new technology, the Internet and its bloggers are overhyped.

Most people still get their news from TV, read the paper and prefer the fairly objective stance of mainstream media to the heated, eccentric, usually partisan agenda of fragmented blogdom.

I've seen more lies online than I have on TV. But more than ever, it's a world with not three, but millions of channels. And there's usually something good on. Good luck finding the remote.



ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) - Daniel Horton was suspended for the rest of Michigan's season on Sunday.


Horton was indefinitely suspended on Jan. 25 after he was charged with domestic violence. The standout point guard pleaded guilty on Monday.

"As we stated all along, we understand the seriousness and sensitivity of this situation," Michigan coach Tommy Amaker said in a statement. "As with all of our decisions, we will do what we feel is right."

Horton, a junior, recently started practicing with the Wolverines and will continue to be permitted to do so.

"This has been a very difficult time, and I've learned a lot," Horton said in a statement issued by the school. "I'm grateful for the chance to get back with my teammates."

The suspension means Horton will miss 11 games in the regular season, plus the Big Ten tournament and any possible postseason games. He missed six games earlier this season with a knee injury.


