Red Raiders move up in Big 12 Conference rankings with win

exas Tech did something it has not done in many years, and Tuesday night in the United Spirit Arena, the Red Raiders had fun doing it.

Ronald Ross, a senior, said he enjoyed his last chance at beating the Longhorns at home.

"It's 'bout time," the guard said. "They've been killing us all these years, or it was really close. We finally put one together and brought one home."

The Raiders (17-7, 9-4 Big 12) beat Texas (18-8, 7-6), 69-65. It was the first time Tech has won against the Longhorns during the regular season since the 1996-1997 season.


Since coach Bob Knight arrived at Tech in 2001, he has not had much success against Texas. In his first eight tries, he fell to the Longhorns seven times, winning only one game during postseason play at the 2002-2003 Big 12 tournament.

Bush denies plan for U.S. attack on Iran

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — President Bush said Tuesday that it is "simply ridiculous" to assume that the United States has plans to attack Iran over its alleged nuclear weapons program.

"This notion that the United States is getting ready to attack Iran is simply ridiculous. Having said that, all options are on the table," Bush said after discussing the issue with European allies.

Bush used his bluntest language yet to give assurance to Iran's leaders. Last week, in a series of pre-trip interviews with European journalists, he also tried to dispel talk of a military attack, an issue that has been raised repeatedly since the United States went to war with Iraq primarily over its alleged weapons of mass destruction. No such weapons have been found in Iraq.

On Iran, Bush has walked a careful line in expressing support for a European-led approach offering Iran techno-

Gas leak on Brownfield, West Loop backs up traffic

A Texas Department of Transportation contractor hit a gas line while drilling about 9:30 a.m. Tuesday at the intersection of W.Loop 289 and Brownfield Highway.

Rob Comey, Texas Department of Transportation area engineer for Lubbock County, said the contractor accidentally hit the gas line while drilling. "The contractor was drilling to replace a bridge line and hit

a 16-inch gas pipe," he said.

The area surrounding the gas line was cleared immediately,

Lubbock emergency crews including both the fire department and police cleared a 150-yard radius around the area. This required the closure of roads to traffic, including W. Loop 289 and Brownfield Highway.

"The concern was the safety of all involved," he said. "This included the construction workers and the traveling public." Detour routes were set up to divert traffic around the gas

Traffic was congested in the area and caused delays for

many drivers.

Comey said the gas was shut off at about 2:30 p.m. and traffic flow through the intersection was restored about 4 p.m.

No individuals required medical treatment because of the gas leak, Comey said.

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Job outsourcing is not the enemy

This business practice serves to benefit companies and consumers

et's talk about outsourcing. You know, it's that dirty word everyone uses nowadays to describe the flight of American jobs overseas. During their campaigns President Bush and John Kerry spit the word out like it tasted bad, pledging to find a solution to the problem of outsourcing.

Wrathful Americans have used the word in anger, insinuating greedy corporate America is colluding with our enemies to undermine the average worker while making Wall Street's big dogs even

In short, outsourcing is the new evil. Just ask someone who's trying to get elected, who knows someone who knows someone whose cousin's sister-in-law's neighbor lost his job because of outsourcing, pin it on corporate America and the other side of the world.

Or maybe, just maybe, outsourcing isn't such a bad thing after all.

One of my business teachers made a very convincing argument in favor of this new idea last week. He said that jobs are outsourced to other nations because it's more efficient than companies trying to do it.

By paying someone else to do the less important tasks, American companies are able to focus on what they're good at, instead of trying to do every little thing about the business.

Think about it. Nike isn't good at everything. Neither is Microsoft, Dell or any other company. Nike does marketing and nothing else. Dell has the just-in-time shipping and mass customization to set it apart.

Why should Michael Dell use his company's time with inventory, customer service or promotion when his company is not good at that? It just makes sense to pay somebody who is good at those tasks to do them for Dell, so Dell can focus on its core competency. Of course, the problem most

Americans have with outsourcing official who can pass laws, enforce is that many manufacturing or customer service jobs are being outsourced overseas. The jobs that used to be good, stable, no-collegedegree-needed positions are going elsewhere, to some other country's economy and some other country's

Well, the sad state of affairs is that companies in other countries are more efficient at the jobs we're sending over there. They can do them at a lower cost and with a high enough service rating to make it worthwhile.

And no, this trend is not a terrible thing for the American economy. In the long run, Americans are much better off by companies' outsourcing positions outside of the country.

The overall costs of products and services go down when the manufacturing, customer service and other factors of the product or services go down.

Meaning, it's better for you, the consumer, if corporations outsource to a company that does the job just as well but for less money. It means you have to pay less for that product, which means more money for you. Who can argue with that?

The problem, of course, is not the long-term effects. The problem is in the short run, because exten-

sive outsourcing causes higher unemployment, fewer jobs for untrained workers and so on, which today and tomorrow and next week hurts those people who used to hold those jobs.

The problem with that thinking, though, is the long-term prosperity of Americans is being sacrificed for lower unemployment rates in the short term, or worse, for higher ratings for the elected or change trade agreements or take some other governmental form of action to discourage or end

outsourcing. During his last presidential campaign, Bush said he does not support outsourcing but added the

more competitive on the global market. That is the winning answer here.

If American companies could get certain services domestically that were competitive in both the quality and price, betting that they would take advantage of that is pretty safe. If a call center across the street from AT&T could provide the same level of service at a comparable price as a company in India or Kenya, they'd most likely go for it. The problem is American companies are not competi-

Why is that? American companies pay workers more than other countries — significantly more, once benefits and all that are included. But that's not all-inclusive; New Balance manufactures its tennis shoes at a domestic plant at a higher cost but much more efficiently than the same shoe is manufactured at its plant in China. What's the secret?

lack of competitiveness with the rest of the world.

ast week, former presidential hopeful and governor of Vermont Howard Dean became chairman of the Democratic National Committee. Dean vowed to lead the Democratic Party into a new era, representing people of all walks of life while providing a new voice for the party.

Establishing a new voice for the Democratic Party is difficult, though, when you don't want anyone to hear what you are saying.

Just last week, Dean tried to block reporters from covering a debate he had with top Pentagon adviser Richard Perle. Two hours before the debate took place, event coordinator Gabrielle Williams requested the media not "quote, record and/or paraphrase his

tant and used to the fullest.

Student Government Association External Vice President Anne Hunninghake has not furnished data or statistics depicting the actual use of off-campus routes, but seems to have arrived at the conclusion that these routes are not benefiting a significant number of students to justify their continued use. Making decisions on such perceptions will be detrimental to those directly affected.

It might sound like a good idea to ask apartment owners to pay for offcampus bus services. But, the SGA should realize this additional expense will most certainly be passed on to students. So does the argument about "equalizing things" still hold good?

I agree not all off-campus routes are

used fully and completely.. I think it is high time the SGA concentrates its energy into re-routing and re-scheduling the bus services based on usage patterns rather than physical reach.

Not everyone can use all the services for which we pay. The SGA must be aware of the \$4 international education fee we all pay. But does that mean most of the students get to go for study abroad programs? All the same, existence of these services is essential. We pay for them to be there so they are available when we need them.

The article in Friday's UD conveys the SGA proposes to either reduce the most-needed off-campus services or financially burden students. If so, it is unfair. I am not against SGA calling for funds from various sources, but I am asking the SGA to bear in mind the consequences born by students like myself. It is not worth trying to save a few dollars from our academic fees liability.

His life has defied easy definition.

The son of a preacher who was killed after being threatened by the Ku Klux Klan, Malcolm Little was arrested for robbery in 1946 and spent six years in prison. He emerged as a fiery Nation of Islam minister with a new name and a message that blacks should cast off white oppression "by any means necessary."

He propelled the Nation of Islam from a 500-member sect into a political and religious organization with 30,000 members by 1963. His messages of black empowerment and self-sufficiency made him an icon to blacks and others around the world.

In 1964, he split from the Nation of Islam, and after an Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca where he worshipped alongside Muslims of all colors, he renounced racial separatism. His new



In case of a tornado...

Seek inside shelter immediately on the lowest floor of a building and away from glass.

Avoid buildings with a wide, free-span roof such as auditoriums and gymnasiums.

Tune into local radio or television stations for weather monitoring.



February 28 - March 5, 2005

Tornado Watch means conditions are such that tornados could develop. A watch is issued to alert you that conditions are favorable for tornadic development. Tune into radio or television stations for weather monitoring when a tornado watch is issued.

Tornado Warning means a tornado has been sighted visually or by weather radar. Warning sirens are mounted on selected campus buildings. These sirens produce a steady, high pitched signal. The sirens are augmented by police car sirens and by radio and television announcements.



Severe weather season begins in March on the South Plains. Educate yourself on what to do during severe weather. It can strike at anytime and anywhere on the South Plains!

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
