After the Columbine High School shootings in April 1999, students, parents and teachers became more aware of possibility of dangers on school grounds. On Monday,
a similar scene played out in a Minnesota a similar scene played out in a Minnesota The shootings, which so far are blamed
for the deaths of 10 people, took place at Red for the deaths of 10 people, took place at Red
Lake High School, located on the Red Lake Indian Reservation in Minnesota. Lubbock officials said in the event of a similar incident occurring locally, they should be prepared to handle the situation. Lubbock Independent School District
Police Chief Thomas Nichols said he is conPolice Chief Thomas Nichols said he is con-
fident about the safety of Lubbock schools. He said plans have been made addressing concerns of school shootings.
"There is a plan for almost everything," he said. "Every district in the country has a plan."
Nichols said the plan of choice primarily the lockdown approach. This primarily the lockdown approach. This
entails getting all students and faculty behind closed and securely locked doors. He said the main problem with this plan is shootings and other similar occurrences are unpredictable.
"It can be hard to
"It can be hard to respond because many times, it's over before it starts," he said.
"There are almost no preventable measures. You can mainly just look back to find other types of interventions."
Nichols said plans have been made in advance to address many situations, but it is much harder to have a plan in an ongoing attack. He saiddespite that, he feels Lubbock

Fed delivers seventh quarter-point rate increase

## WASHINGTON (AP) - T

 Federal Reserve on Tuesday pushed a key interest rate up by a quarter-point campaign to gradually nudge rates campaign to gradually nudge ratehigh enough to make sure that a rebounding economy does not trigger unwanted inflation.
The increase in the federal funds rate marked the seventh time the central bank has pushed rates higher since
it started its current credit tightening it started its current credit tightening
campaign last June. At that time campaign last une. At that time, the
funds rate stood at a 46 -year low of 1
percent.
The Fed kept language that it has used with every rate increase, saying that future rate hikes would occur "at a pace that is likely to be measured,",

"I think the tone is slightly more hawkish and it could lead to slightl higher interest rates by year's end," said economist David Jones, the author Wall Street also focused on the Fed's inflation comments. The Dow ones industrial average, which had been up by 42 points before the Fed's mid-aftermoon announcement, dipped into negative territory after the announcement as investors feared more
to come.
Jones said that he now expected the funds rate could be as high as 3.75 percent by the end of the year, meaning one more quarter-point rate increase than he had been expecting 30 -year mortgage rates, currently near 6 percent, could be at 6.15 percent by
year's end, still a low-enough level that the housing industry should remain strong this yea

## Grants to assist divorced parents connect to their children

The Attorney General's Division for Families and Children recently administered grants from the federally funded program "A
Visitation," according to the Attorney General's Web site. Visitation," according to the Attorney General's Web site.
The grants will fund services to help parents who do not have custod to maintain relationships with their children after a divorce or separa-
tion, according to Web site. This year $\$ 300,000$ was awarded to private tion, according to Web site. This year $\$ 300,00$ was nonprofit organizations and local governments in Texas. Janice Keetch, public information officer for the Attorney General,
said the Access and Visitation program is a way for the Attorney General's office to help non-custodial parents.
"The Attorney General's office cannot get involved with the visita-
ion rights in a divorce case; we only deal with the enforcenent tion rights in a divorce case; we only deal with the enforcement of child support payments," she said. "Some parents pay child support, but are
receiving visitation rights and this is a way for us to help them." receiving visitation rights and this is a way for us to help them.
The program is federally funded and each year the government ha approximately $\$ 10$ million to distribute among the states, Keetch said. approximately $\$ 10$ million to distribute among the states, Keetch said.
"Organizations compete for the funding based on their ability to
provide services that are important for divorced families," she said.
"Services we are looking for include early intervention, co-parent eduServices we are looking for include early intery

Staley was examined last week by psychiatrists who determined he was aware of his punishment and why he was being put to U.S. Supreme Court established in 1986 as the standards for allowing execution of people whose competency is at issue. Strickland went to federal court seeking a
hearing to have the execution date withdrawn and for a court rule on Staley's competency.

it is clear the courrent system of America is examined, it is clear absolute power is not held in the executive
or legislative branch - and heaven forbid it should or legislative branch - and heaven forbid it should
rest in the people! No, absolute power is held in the Supreme Court, and absolute corruption is what it has led to.
What was designed by the framers to be the least powerful branch of government, at least according to Alexander Hamilton in Federalist 78 , now has
become the most powerful and corrupt. Rarely is the become the most powerful a a corrupt. Rarely is the
authority of the Supreme Court checked, or even questioned, and this has created a government ruled not by the Constitution, but by the "enumerations"

justices sitting on the Supreme Court have found and justices sitting on the Supreme Court have found and
created rights within the Constitution the founders never intended, and this has been the case for much of the Court's recent history.
Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia best summarized this dilemma, stating, "Day by day, case by case, the Supreme Court is busy designing,
tution for a country I do not recognize."

$$ have come as a result of justices legislating their own morality from the bench, instead of interpreting the law.

By finding crevices in the surface of the Constitution, the Supreme Court has created a "right of privacy" for women to kill their unborn children
(Roe $v$. Wade), restricted religious freedom by erecting a "wall of separation" (Everson v. Board of Education), and trampled on the basic understandings. and principles of Federalism (Brown v. Board of Education).
At the heart of this problem is a flawed belief that justice (or perceived justice) and the Constitution go hand in hand. They do not
In all these instances, the moral dilemma or
injustice" of the cases played a more central role than the Constitutional issues in question. And no matter how you view the outcomes of these cases, you cannot argue their ultimate decisions were based on sound Constitutional law.
In fact, in the case of Brown, the court stopped
the unjust practice of segregation but trampled the the unjust practice of segregation but trampled the
Constitution in the process, undermining basic state rights. And this sort of judicial activism is contrary to the intent of the framers.
The Supreme Court was not designed to rule on the morality or justice of the cases it hears, but to rule on their Constitutionality. It was never written to be a document in flux, but was intended to creat
a framework for democracy. a framework for democracy
The beauty of the Constitution is that far from have insinuated, it was designed to be the solid, unwavering foundation of this country.
Indeed, the only part of the Constitution that
hould be viewed as "alive" is the space immediately should be viewed as "alive" is the space immediately
following the last amendment. following the last amendment. unjust actions to take place, we the people should amend it - not five Supreme Court Justices. What is more troubling, however, is that more and more, the Supreme Court is not simply misinterpreting the Constitution, they are not interpreting it at all.
In a recent case where the Court struck down the death penalty for juveniles (Roper v. Simmons),
the majority opinion referred to the "overwhelming weight of international opinion" on the issue. Right or wrong, hand-picked international law should never sway the Court's decision on any is sue. Besides, the only "international law" chosen by the Justices in the case of Roper was that which not that which would undermine it
And just as Lord Acton was right about power and corruption, he was also right when he observed
that the beauty of the American system rests in our fundamental belief that "a nation can never abandon its fate to an authority it cannot control." If only the Justices were reading.

The virus progressively destroys the body's ability to fight off infections, leaving the infected person vulnerable to the common cold, flu, pneumonia and other diseases that can turn deadly. has 10 percent of the world's population and more than 60 percent of the AIDS population. More than 3 million people were infected in 2004 alone, and 2.3 million people died, according to the United Nations.
In Australia and the surrounding islands, the number of people living with AIDS increased about 15 percent in
2004, according to the UN 2004, according to the UN. In the Caribbean, 440,000
people live with AIDS, and the disease is the leadingcause of death among people ages 15 to 44

There's no vaccine and no cure. Scientists don't know how to stop it. Even when progress is made, HIV is a virus,
It can mutate, it can change, it can become stronger or more resilient than it currently is. And the more drugs we throw at it, the more likely it is to adapt and become resistant to current technology.
