## School shooting creates awareness LISD, TECH: Plans prepared by police if similar situation occurs locally.

After the Columbine High School shootings in April 1999, students, parents and teachers became more aware of possibility of dangers on school grounds. On Monday, a similar scene played out in a Minnesota

The shootings, which so far are blamed for the deaths of 10 people, took place at Red Lake High School, located on the Red Lake Indian Reservation in Minnesota.

Lubbock officials said in the event of a similar incident occurring locally, they should be prepared to handle the situation.

Lubbock Independent School District Police Chief Thomas Nichols said he is confident about the safety of Lubbock schools. He said plans have been made addressing concerns of school shootings.

I here is a plan for almost everything, he said. "Every district in the country has

Nichols said the plan of choice is primarily the lockdown approach. This entails getting all students and faculty behind closed and securely locked doors. He said the main problem with this plan is shootings and other similar occurrences are unpredictable.

"It can be hard to respond because many times, it's over before it starts," he said. "There are almost no preventable measures. You can mainly just look back to find other types of interventions."

Nichols said plans have been made in advance to address many situations, but it is much harder to have a plan in an ongoing attack. He said despite that, he feels Lubbock schools are safe.

The team is seeking more players to represent Texas Tech in tournament play. The group encourages anyone who plays pool to join.


Membership dues are \$40, which helps cut costs on entry fees to tournaments, gas for travel, chalk and other

Hinshaw said the store takes precautions to prevent people from shoplifting.

"We try to enforce an ID policy where students must have an ID number and show their ID when selling the books back or purchasing them," she said. "Nobody is allowed to go back behind the counter where the books are located unless an employee is with them."

Communication between bookstores is another method to decreasing shoplifting incidents, Hinshaw said.

"We also try to stay in contact with the other managers at the other Double T as well as Barnes and Noble and Varsity Bookstore," she said.

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# Brothers fined for issuing fraudulent college degrees

The office of Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott released a statement last week that will fine two brothers for issuing fraudulent university diplomas.

According to the press release, Craig B. Poe and Alton S. Poe, two Dallas brothers, will be fined thousands of dollars for operating as a fake university and handing out bachelor, master's and doctorate degrees to those who pay for them.

The two brothers were operating the for-profit, Dallas-based Trinity Southern to pay a \$100,000 penalty and another University and head of Massachusetts's University. The report stated those pursuing a bachelor's degree from Trinity were credited 115 to 120 hours of classes once they were qualified to receive them.

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board referred the matter to the Attorney General's office for action under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act, according to the release.

The Act states its purpose is to protect consumers against false, misleading and deceptive business practices, unconscionable actions and breaches of warranty procedures to secure such protection. 



hree days after being crucified and L buried, Jesus was missing from his burial tomb. Some say Jesus' disciples stole his body and concocted a story that he rose from the dead. If that's true, why would they die for something they knew was a lie? Would you?

And theirs wasn't a mass suicide, where they bonded together in some delusional facade. Each of them left family and jobs, traveling to distant countries, preaching that Jesus died and came back to life. If the disciples were making it all up, each of them chose to die prematurely for something they knew wasn't true. Doesn't make sense.

What does make sense are the historical facts. Even while being tortured, the disciples insisted that they, as well as hundreds of other Jews, had

seen Jesus alive. When some were arrested and ordered not to speak about Jesus' resurrection, they responded, "We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard!"

They knew Jesus had been beaten, whipped, nailed to a cross, where he died in public display. A spear was thrust into his side to confirm his death. Roman soldiers were stationed at Jesus' tomb, because Jesus had stated that three days after being crucified, he would rise from

On that third day, the guards fled, the two-ton boulder sealing the tomb's entrance was up a slope, and Jesus' body was gone. Inside the tomb, Peter and John saw the burial cloths still lying there, empty.

After that, the disciples saw Jesus physically alive multiple times. They even had lengthy conversations with him and ate with him—all after his death by crucifixion. These disciples went to their deaths proclaiming what they had no doubts about—that Jesus had risen from the dead, proving that he was everything he claimed to be...the Son of God.

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
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# Justice v. the Constitution

Power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely. Nineteenth-century philosopher Lord Acton coined this phrase, and it could not be truer today.

When the current system of America is examined, it is clear absolute power is not held in the executive or legislative branch — and heaven forbid it should rest in the people! No, absolute power is held in the Supreme Court, and absolute corruption is what it has led to.

What was designed by the framers to be the least powerful branch of government, at least according to Alexander Hamilton in Federalist 78, now has become the most powerful and corrupt. Rarely is the authority of the Supreme Court checked, or even questioned, and this has created a government ruled not by the Constitution, but by the "enumerations"



Right or wrong, hand-picked international law should never sway the Court's decision on any issue.

and "penumbras" interpreted between its lines.

Like modern day alchemists, the majority of the justices sitting on the Supreme Court have found and created rights within the Constitution the founders never intended, and this has been the case for much of the Court's recent history.

Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia best summarized this dilemma, stating, "Day by day, case by case, the Supreme Court is busy designing a Constitution for a country I do not recognize."

Many of the most troubling decisions of the Court have come as a result of justices legislating their own morality from the bench, instead of interpreting the law

By finding crevices in the surface of the Constitution, the Supreme Court has created a "right of privacy" for women to kill their unborn children (Roe v. Wade), restricted religious freedom by erecting a "wall of separation" (Everson v. Board of Education), and trampled on the basic understandings and principles of Federalism (Brown v. Board of Education).

At the heart of this problem is a flawed belief that justice (or perceived justice) and the Constitution go hand in hand. They do not.

In all these instances, the moral dilemma or "injustice" of the cases played a more central role than the Constitutional issues in question. And no matter how you view the outcomes of these cases, you cannot argue their ultimate decisions were based on sound Constitutional law.

In fact, in the case of Brown, the court stopped the unjust practice of segregation but trampled the Constitution in the process, undermining basic state rights. And this sort of judicial activism is contrary to the intent of the framers.

The Supreme Court was not designed to rule on the morality or justice of the cases it hears, but to rule on their Constitutionality. It was never written to be a document in flux, but was intended to create a framework for democracy.

The beauty of the Constitution is that far from being "living and breathing," as some on the left have insinuated, it was designed to be the solid, unwavering foundation of this country.

Indeed, the only part of the Constitution that should be viewed as "alive" is the space immediately following the last amendment.

And if the Constitution is outdated or allows for unjust actions to take place, we the people should amend it — not five Supreme Court Justices.

What is more troubling, however, is that more and more, the Supreme Court is not simply misinterpreting the Constitution, they are not interpreting it at all.


In a recent case where the Court struck down the death penalty for juveniles (*Roper v. Simmons*), the majority opinion referred to the "overwhelming weight of international opinion" on the issue.

Right or wrong, hand-picked international law should never sway the Court's decision on any issue. Besides, the only "international law" chosen by the Justices in the case of Roper was that which conformed to their majority opinion, and certainly not that which would undermine it.

And just as Lord Acton was right about power and corruption, he was also right when he observed that the beauty of the American system rests in our fundamental belief that "a nation can never abandon its fate to an authority it cannot control."

If only the Justices were reading.

## As AIDS sweeps the world, people must take caution

Several 100 years ago, a plague swept the world.

It killed millions, devastating the population centers of the world and driving survivors into exile to avoid the horrifying death.

Another wave was behind the plague — fear. Fear of dying, fear of living, fear that nothing would ever stop this monster.

Bubonic plague is a thing of the past, but, more terrifying in a different way, has taken its place. That disease is acquired immunodeficiency syndrome.

AIDS is a relatively new disease; it became an American epidemic in the early 1980s. It is caused by the human immunodeficiency virus, which kills or damages the cells of the body's immune system, according to about.com. The virus progressively destroys the body's ability to fight off infections, leaving the infected person vulnerable to the common cold, flu, pneumonia and other diseases that can turn deadly.

The problem is largest in sub-Saharan Africa, which has 10 percent of the world's population and more than 60 percent of the AIDS population. More than 3 million people were infected in 2004 alone, and 2.3 million people died, according to the United Nations.

In Australia and the surrounding islands, the number of people living with AIDS increased about 15 percent in 2004, according to the UN. In the Caribbean, 440,000 people live with AIDS, and the disease is the leading cause of death among people ages 15 to 44.

In Latin America, 1.7 million people are living with the disease, with 240,000 people infected in 2004. In Eastern Europe, 1.4 million have the disease, a number which has increased more than nine times in less than 10 years. In North America and western Europe, 1.6 million have the disease, 64,000 people were infected in 2004, and while widespread access to drugs have kept the death toll lower than in other regions, indicators show prevention

efforts are not keeping pace with the fluctuating epidemic. Scared yet? Here are some more numbers to consider. According to about.com, the total number of people living with AIDS in 1999, the most recent year given, was 34.3 million, about .5 percent of the world's population. Almost 19 million people have died since 1981 from AIDS or AIDS-related illnesses. And worse, 13.2 million children have been orphaned because their parents died from AIDS.

Still not convinced AIDS has reached the terror level of bubonic plague? Consider this: a teenager is running around Lubbock who tested positive for HIV and is aware of that, and has engaged in unprotected sex with more than one person. According to the Lubbock Health Department, one of that person's partners also engaged in sex, possibly unprotected, with others.

AIDS is serious; it's real, it's deadly and it's here now. In recent years the disease has been downplayed, particularly in the United States, because of its livability. People who are AIDS or HIV positive can live a fairly normal and long life, thanks to the antiretroviral drugs available.

The stigma associated with the disease also has largely left us, largely because of celebrities like Magic Johnson, who is HIV positive and has been active in AIDS awareness.

So now, to Americans, it's not such a big deal, or at least it doesn't seem that way.

Now step outside the borders of the United States, and the situation is a little different.

You know the numbers, you've heard the stories. We all have, of the young women who are gang-raped by roving criminals or forced into marriage, the babies who are born with AIDS and no chance and so on. The AIDS cocktail isn't available in Zimbabwe or Rwanda. Although the United Nations has begun a program to treat AIDS in developing countries, providing drugs to 700,000 people, this is only a tiny percentage of the number of people who have AIDS.

Even people in developed countries will not always be kept alive by the drugs. Drugs don't always work depending on each case, and even if they do, the cost is high - anywhere from about \$300 to \$1,700.

There's no vaccine and no cure. Scientists don't know how to stop it. Even when progress is made, HIV is a virus. It can mutate, it can change, it can become stronger or more resilient than it currently is. And the more drugs we throw at it, the more likely it is to adapt and become resistant to current technology.

What can be done? Take responsibility for yourself. AIDS is not a homosexual, a poor person's or a drug user's disease. If you engage in unprotected sex with someone with HIV, you're at risk. If you think you were exposed, get tested.

Take action for AIDS victims outside the U.S. Demand that your government get involved in the U.N. humanitarian efforts to control AIDS. Be informed on the disease, and be on guard against it.

After all, you never know when it's coming your way.

## Lawmakers fight for life, pull plug on Medicaid — the poor ultimately suffer the most

(U-WIRE) ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — A young woman in the Southern United States has been dependent on machines and constant medical care to survive for the last decade and a half.

She has been threatened with a removal of the care that keeps her alive. A concerted grassroots campaign to contact public health officials and elected representatives eventually led to the restoration of her care and almost certainly saved a life.

Readers would be forgiven for thinking the preceding paragraph was a summary of the nationally famous case of Terri Schiavo, the Florida

woman whose vegetative state has led to years of legal battling between her husband and parents about whether to let her die.

Earlier this week, Congress met in special sessions to pass a bill that allows a federal judge to examine the case and possibly overturn a Florida court's ruling that removed Schiavo's feeding tube last week.

Instead, the story above relates to another medical case, this time involving a 13-year-old Alabama girl, Lauren Rainey.

Rainey is conscious and attends school but is afflicted with a variety of ailments, including an enlarged heart, scoliosis and bone diseases.

She depends on an oxygen machine and a humidifier to breathe and must constantly have her airway suctioned to prevent suffocation.

Last fall, Alabama's Medicaid eliminated her

Surprisingly, in the months before Rainey's care was reinstated, no emergency congressional sessions were demanded, no speeches were made by President Bush about "erring on the side of life."

Perhaps this has something to do with the fact that Bush and the same congressional Republicans who jumped to Schiavo's aid have called for major cuts in Medicaid programs and consistently opposed any guaranteed health care plan for the 45 million Americans without insurance.

Lives appear to be important to elected officials when their political base takes up the cause, but when poor people's lives and quality of life are at risk, the silence from Washington is deafening.

"Many faculty will use discussion as a method to get students to talk about things," she said.

Passive learning is a different way of learning and teaching that includes students memorizing and listening without thinking through what the professor has just said, Tapp said.

Students are more familiar with passive listening, but should be more

open to less traditional methods of teaching, Tapp said.

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

### Authorities search for boy's motive in Minnesota shooting

RED LAKE, Minn. (AP) - Authorities were trying to determine Tuesday what caused a teenager to gun down his grandfather, put on the man's police-issue belt and bulletproof vest, and drive his marked squad car to a high school, where he began shooting his classmates at will.

Jeff Weise, who authorities said was 16 or 17, killed nine people and wounded seven Monday before trading gunfire with a police officer and apparently shooting himself. His motive still wasn't clear Tuesday, but the FBI said the shootings appeared to have been planned in advance.

It was the nation's worst school shooting since the Columbine massacre in April 1999 that ended with the deaths of 12 students, a teacher and the two teen gunmen.

The killings on this northern Minnesota Indian reservation began at the home of Weise's grandfather, Daryl Lussier, 58, who was shot to death with a .22caliber gun, according to Michael Tabman, the FBI's special agent in charge for Minneapolis. Also killed was Lussier's companion, Michelle

Lussier had worked as a tribal police officer for decades. Weise then drove the older man's squad car to the school, where he gunned down security guard Derrick Brun at the door and spent about 10 minutes inside, targeting people at random.

Hearing the shots, students and adults barricaded themselves into offices and classrooms and crouched under desks, authorities said. A teacher and five students were shot to death, and two 15year-olds remained in critical condition at a Fargo, N.D., hospital with gunshot wounds to the face.

"Right now we are in utter disbelief and shock," said Floyd Jourdain Jr., chairman of the Red Lake Band of Chippewa.

Authorities were investigating whether Weise, who dressed admiration for Adolf Hitler.


