

Tech law grad appointed to Texas Supreme Court

Judge Phil Johnson is the first Texas Tech School of Law graduate to be appointed by the governor to the Supreme Court of Texas.

Johnson's confirmation date to go in front of the state senate Judicial Appointment Review committee is April 4.

After a state senate committee approves Johnson, the state senate will vote on whether he should be approved for the Supreme Court of Texas.

If Johnson is approved, he would be sworn into his new position the week of April 11.

Gov. Rick Perry appointed Johnson, the chief justice of the 17th District Court of Appeals in Amarillo, on March 15 in the Tech School of Law courtroom.

Brian Shannon, associate dean of the law school, said Johnson is an outstanding judge and well regarded by law practitioners and judges.

Shannon said Johnson's appointment to the Supreme Court of Texas demonstrates that Tech Law School graduates are up there with the best.

" (It is) a high honor that Judge Johnson has been appointed," he said. "It's a great day for the law school that Gov. Perry came to our courtroom."

Brian Quinn, justice on the 7th District Court of Appeals in Amarillo, has worked with Johnson for several years on the court.

Quinn said he believes Johnson is well prepared for the new position on the Texas Supreme Court.

"He got a good education at the law school," he said

Johnson is prepared because he has a good mind and is studious, Quinn said, qualities required in a judge.

"He has a good feel for the law," Quinn said. "I think he'll do a tre-



Fowler also spoke about Senate Resolution 40.37, concerning a recommendation to the university's operating policy and procedures regarding fines for offenses such as parking citations.

There is no official limitation placed on the amount of time that can elapse between citations for the same offense, according to the resolution. The resolution recommends an amendment to the policy so a citation for a single offense may only be issued once per calendar day.

Fowler said he does not think Traffic and Parking employees give more than one citation for a single offense. This resolution is a way to ensure abuse of the lapse in policy does not occur.

Some senators brought up concerns regarding the amendment, including that Buddy Knox, director of Traffic and Parking, had not been contacted about the resolution.

Brant said the resolution was only a recommendation and the final decision about changing the university's operating policy rests with the Board of Regents.

Emotional battle: right to live, right to die

Near-lifeless woman's last days exploited Nature of existence is main argument

Starting my day with the "Today Show," I was brought to an overwhelming amount of sadness and was distraught seeing Terri Shiavo's face on the TV screen. What has our country done?

Do I think Schiavo should live or die? The last I checked, I was not in the position, nor is anyone who holds office in the position to decide whether someone should live or die. Everyone deserves the right to live. With that comes the right to die.

Terri was long gone before Jeb Bush entered the picture and before our outlandish Congress overstepped its boundaries, trying to make a private decision that belongs to the family, and ultimately to her husband.

The courts have intervened for the past seven or eight years to pull the feeding tube or to keep it inserted, but even those decisions were inappropriate. If the court should have decided anything, it should



I would never want to 'live' like Schiavo is right now. She's not dying, but she isn't living.

If we are truly going to "save" the sanctity of marriage, should we not give Schiavo's husband the benefit of the doubt that he might know what his wife wants?

I'm sure if she were coherent, she would not agree to have the entire country argue about her state and be

we shouldn't allow the exploitation of her last days.

What we can learn from this is no matter what our age, a living will seems inevitable.

Unless it's in writing, you risk Tom Delay or Jeb Bush making your health decisions. In the meantime, Schiavo's family needs to unite to make decisions and the rest of us need to stop feeding the media frenzy.

Thursday afternoon, a federal court ruled they would not reinsert Schiavo's feeding tube, so I'll leave you with this.

From the great words of Max Ehrman, in his famous poem "Desiderata:"

"Go placidly amid the noise and haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence."

This case is something I have followed off and on for the greater part of a year and a half. It is not a new issue. The only difference is, this case is unique in one way — namely Terri Schiavo's body is fully functioning and she is conscious.

Fox News has reported Schiavo suffered brain damage in 1990 when her heart briefly stopped from a chemical imbalance believed to have been brought on by an eating disorder. Her courtappointed doctors say she is in a persistent vegetative state with no hope of recovery.

In arguing this issue, many point to the fact that most of the doctors have pronounced Schiavo brain dead with no ability to recover.

However, according to Salem Radio Network News, the doctor Michael Schiavo, Terri's husband, hand-picked to look at Terri is a

The parallel here is simple. If a child is born brain dead but with properly functioning body systems, do the parents have the right to withhold nourishment from the child so that the baby may die?

Logic in reverse: Misplaced desires of administration keep Tech from going forward

Examples of the poor practice of logic can be found in our daily life. As an amateur student of logic, I enjoy discovering these occurrences.

I laugh a little inside when I see food service employees put on latex gloves in the name of sanitary food preparation, wipe off a counter with a used, damp cloth, pick up a piece of trash from the floor and then proceed to make someone a sandwich — all while still wearing the gloves.

This backward thought keeps the hands of the workers nice and sanitary, but the purpose of wearing the gloves is lost.

Like most logical errors, backwards thought can lead to minor problems, such as the case above causing gastrointestinal infections, but also can lead to major problems. As the controversy about state college and university tuition has heated, I have detected a sentiment in public opinion I believe is backward — of the dangerous variety.

The central concern of those attending and representing Texas Tech seems to have shifted from gathering funds to provide for education and research to developing research and education in order to attract more funding.

Many efforts by the university seem to have made this shift. We want top researchers at Tech to draw attention from a national market of research funds.

We want to keep tuition reasonably priced, not to ensure Texas residents can get a college education.But we want to ensure we don't, as one of our newly-appointed regents remarked in a Wednesday

UD article, "Price ourselves out of the market."

While I am sure the regent's intentions are honorable, his use of the word "market" reveals the underlying mentality. College-bound high school graduates are not a commodity for which to be competed to fund a university. Money itself has become the end to which the means of research and education are employed.

Universities are supposed to be institutions in the pursuit of truth for the pure purpose of knowledge, not for the purpose of economic gain. I understand a university needs financial resources to provide for education and research, and perhaps it's in this interest that acquisition of money has become such a huge concern.

But if this is the case, why is major from Georgetown

it that any financial contribution to Tech is headline news, while the research that warranted that contribution is a mere blurb in the article, or not mentioned at all? If this is the case, why has there been a serious decline in funding for pure research in favor of applied (read: marketable) research?

I believe there is backward logic at work here and the priorities of this and many other universities needs serious realignment.

An institution that uses research and education as a means to acquire money is a backwards university. As an interesting coincidence, university spelled backwards is "yt is revinu." Let's not, in the pursuit of revenue, create a backward university.

— Zac Ballenger, senior biology naior from Georgetown tion was filed by the Florida Department of Children and Families and said a neurologist who examined Schiavo's medical records found she was "most likely in a state of minimal consciousness," rather than the previously diagnosed persistent vegetative state.

Traditionally, persons pronounced "brain dead" are in a sort of comatose state and dependent on a respirator. This is because the brain approaches a 100 percent loss of functional capacity.

Schiavo is different. Her brain still tells her lungs to breathe, her eyes to blink and even to cry.

As reported by CNN, "There is no denying the absolute tragedy that has befallen Mrs. Schiavo," the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruling said. "However, we are called upon to make a collective, objective decision concerning a question of law."

That's the real argument — what should the law be in this case?

In the bill passed by Congress, which put the case under federal jurisdiction, legislators stated, "It has taken our nation many years to make good on its commitment to equal justice for persons with I think that, more than anything, this case helps us better understand our own views of life and human existence.

Fundamentally, the question is raised whether there is some true purpose for our lives. I believe there is, and allowing someone to die of dehydration because they can't feed themselves undermines whatever purpose may exist for Schiavo's life.

It is not that her biological systems will cause her to die. It is the removal of her food source. The fact that she has lived for the past 15 years with a feeding tube proves this point.

Again, the parallel is simple. We are not arguing about the removal of "life support" but of "nourishment." Schiavo will not die because her organs stop functioning on their own. She will die of neglect.

Schiavo's parents, Bob and Mary Schindler, challenged his credibility, saying he has no written proof of his wife's wishes and that he has a conflict of interest because he lives with a girlfriend with whom he has children.

Undaunted, the parents mustered support from President. Bush and Congress, who pushed through legislation to move the case to federal court after Michael Schiavo won Florida state court permission to remove his wife's feeding tube, which was done March 18.

In their filing to the Supreme Court, they said numerous questions remain unresolved as to her true wishes, such as whether Michael Schiavo was abusive toward her and that she may have wanted a divorce before she became braindamaged.
