Budi Atmaji Adiputro, a spokesman for Indonesia's Coordinating Agency for National Disaster Relief, said rescuers found 330 bodies in the rubble Tuesday. The toll was expected to rise because more bodies were believed to be trapped in collapsed buildings, he said.

Vice President Jusuf Kalla told the el-Shinta radio station in Jakarta the death toll could rise to 1,000-2,000, based on the amount of destruction to buildings. Other officials said the dead numbered in the hundreds, not thousands.

An Associated Press Television News cameraman who landed briefly in the city said he saw at least one body and about four injured islanders who had yet to receive medical treatment.

At least two fires smoldered in Gunung Sitoli. About 1,000 people gathered in a large field in the town.

A soccer pitch in the town was turned into a makeshift triage center, with about 10 badly injured survivors awaiting evacuation by relief agency helicopters. People swarmed around U.N. helicopters as they landed to deliver relief supplies.

A steeple had been knocked off a church on the mainly Christian island.





VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II may have to return to the hospital to have a feeding tube inserted because he is having difficulty swallowing, an Italian news agency reported Tuesday.

The AP.com news agency said no decision had been taken and the feeding tube was one option being considered to help the 84-year-old pope get better nutrition and regain his strength.

Calls to the Vatican spokesman went unanswered late Tuesday.

Citing an unidentified source, the agency said the pope's doctors were considering the procedure, which involves inserting a feeding tube through the throat and into the stomach. The tube is drawn through the throat, then extended from inside the stomach to outside the body through a small incision in the abdomen. Liquid formula is fed through the tube into the stomach, Doctors said they expected to and the tube does not remain in the throat.

The technique — percutaneous endoscopic gastrostomy, or PEG — was developed in 1979 and is used more than 250,000 times a year in the United States alone. If performed, the pope would be receiving nutrition the same way Terri Schiavo did before her feeding tube was removed. Schiavo, a severely brain damaged woman, is at the center of a legal battle in the

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

Evidence against Annan not enough for a conviction

NEW YORK (AP) - Investigators of the U.N. oil-for-food program in Iraq said Tuesday there was not enough evidence to show that Secretary-General Kofi Annan knew of a contract bid by his son's Swiss employer.

The report obtained by The Associated Press accused Annan's son, Kojo, and the company, Cotecna Inspection S.A., of trying to conceal their relationship after the contract was in place. It also criticized the U.N. chief for not determining the exact nature of his son's relationship with the firm.

The conclusion in the investigators' report was not the clear vindication that the secretary-general wanted, although the investigation led by former U.S. Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker did not accuse the U.N. chief of corruption.

The report obtained Tuesday said "there is no evidence" the selection of Cotecna for an inspection contract "was subject to any affirmative or improper influence of the secretary-general in the bidding or selection process."

Investigators also said "the evidence is not reasonably sufficient" that Annan knew about Cotecna's bid in 1998.

The report is the second issued by the Volcker's team of investigators and comes a week after Annan called for the biggest overhaul of the United Nations in its 60-year



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The battle over being

Life shows itself to be the No. 1 most defining and divisive issue of our time

t is increasingly apparent the most prominent social and political divide in this country is not centered on Social Security, taxes or even education.

More and more, it is clear that the major political boundaries of this generation are being drawn around one issue - life.

And whether it is a debate on when life begins or when it should end, the lines of this battle have been drawn during the first part of our lives, and the battle will continue for the remainder

From abortion to euthanasia, our society has two prominent and overarching paradigms: One conforming to a mindset that sees life as unexceptional and without eternal significance, while the other conforms to a mindset that sees life as wholly exceptional, worthy of eternal significance.

Each of us, for the most part, conforms to one of these overarching paradigms and thus views life in two completely separate ways - which is why the battle rages so fiercely.

Nevertheless, in large part, our generation has been raised in such a perverse society that the basic principles of this debate have been obscured from us.

And instead of focusing on the fundamental questions of life, such as when it begins, we focus on semantics, such as when it is tolerable for us to end it. Even worse, most of us have been told it is acceptable to not take a firm stance on any of these questions, lest we offend.

This is not an acceptable posture. You can tip-toe around many issues, but when it comes to one as essential as life, it is illogical to waver.

And it is illogical to set artificial boundaries around life, as if one life is more significant than another simply based on how it was conceived or because of the way it is sustained.

Moreover, to suppose we have the authority to set those boundaries in the first place is the epitome of human pride run amok.

As a direct result of this relativistic thinking, our country, which was created in part to sustain the pursuit of life, has become a nation entrenched in a culture of death.

In the process, we have become aloof to a modern-day holocaust, and the saddest part of it all is, our generation has taken the greatest casualties in this battle.

For 30 years, we have been killed off, one by one, for the sake of "privacy." Unborn babies have been murdered, and we excuse it in the name of "rights" and "choice" — as if the right to continue life is solely one designated to those of us who can choose. How hypocritical!

And we have been deceived to such an extent we ignore both common sense and science which are moving closer together on this issue daily - to believe a doctor has the right to kill a child simply because it has not been born.

And in order to deceive the mother, we have told her she has the right to have an abortion because, after all, it's her body.

As if it is her brains being sucked out of her skull during a partial birth abortion. Or as though it is her arms and legs being ripped off as the womb is scraped by a sharp metal curette during an abortion in the first

But if we truly are supposed to protect the rights people have over their bodies, is it more logical to believe an unborn baby — having a separate heart, blood, organs, fingers, toes, eyes and brain — is a part of the mother's body or a separate body growing within the mother?

And if it is a separate person, we are obligated to protect it. And though this may be an offensive posture to many, I would rather err on the side of life in this battle.



Texas Tech needs to find more ways to give students more money

Once again, we watch as our tuition is increased to pay for "faculty and staff." The problem is not necessarily our tuition going up, although to me it surely is — but the problem is, available money is not going up with it.

If Texas Tech, or any other university, wants to increase its tuition, it needs to make money available. I pay my own bills, unlike many students at universities throughout the United States, where parents are dishing out money to pay for their childrens' car payments, insurance, food, bills, etc. I pay for it on my own. There are many other students in my shoes, where a \$75 increase in

tuition per semester calls for \$150 a year out of my pocket to pay for bills for which mommy or daddy do not pay. I understand tuition needs to go up as costs increase; that's inflation for you. In addition, the retention of good faculty is imperative for our education. However, for me to continue to afford school I need more money.

I do not rely on my parents for support. I cannot get a loan from a bank, because I don't have a cosigner and I don't have the credit to get a loan. It's also more difficult to find a decent job to pay for bills. As tuition goes up, I cannot take as many classes I would like; so in turn, it now will take me two years longer to finish my degree. I do not object to taking

out loans for school. I can merely add it to the loans I need to continue my education, so if Tech wants to increase tuition, then they need to find way to give out more money for people who need it.

Tech needs to find out how to make more grants available to students, create new scholarships and develop new and convenient on campus jobs for students. Most of all, Tech should develop new low-interest deferred loans. Let's get money to the students to invest in their futures; our costs are going up just as much as the schools are and more. After the 36 percent increase in tuition last year, I have been forced to take fewer classes and further jobs

are not paying what they used to. We need to make more money available to students. Low-interest deferred loan programs should be made available, either through increasing subsidized and unsubsidized loans through the federal government, or universities should create their own loan programs for students who need the money. Tech surely can borrow money for low-interest rates from the federal government; so get more money and give it to the students, invest in us - we are investing in

Despite what some people believe, she

said, dance class is a lot of hard work. For this week's program, DanceTech: The Artistry of Motion, for example, Faulkner said she spent several hours developing a choreographic routine for her portion of the presentation. She also performed as a dancer in two other portions

of the show. At the rate of four hours of practice per week per dance routine, Faulkner has spent 12 hours per week for the past two months rehearsing for the program.

All of this work, she said, is for a class worth one credit hour.

Elisabeth Nordby, a freshman business and dance major from Corpus Christi, dances in four different routines in this week's program. The 16 hours a week she spent practicing the last two months was worthwhile, she said.

"It was all worth it," she said. "If anything, we could have used more time rehearsing."

This rigid practice schedule, that in some case surpasses the amount of hours a dancer is taking in school, seems to contradict the perception of dance majors cruising through college.

But acting in spite of people's expectations is an almost everyday thing for dancers, said Christie Wiseman, a sophomore nursing major and dance minor from Spring. A good dance routine is about telling a story or conveying an emotion, not conforming to what the audience imagines a dance recital should be.

"When you're doing a routine, you can't think about whether people are going to like it or not," she said. "A lot of people just expect us to do the same thing every year, but we don't."

"Spring Trilogy," the opening number for this year's Dance Tech, begins with what is probably the expected image — a line of dancers in tutus with a French ballad playing in the background. The dance routine is more modern than ballet, however, as these dancers wrestle and push each other to the ground in time with the beat.

For "Street Flava," a routine a few minutes later in the program, performers don black and white track suits and dance to Outkast's "B.O.B. (Bombs Over Baghdad)."

Other musical choices also may come as a surprise to some audience members as the program includes the works of a variety of artists including Josh Groban, Fiona Apple and Don McLean.

McLean who is famous for "American Pie," provides the soundtrack for what may be one of the program's most experimental pieces. Instead of the popular folk tribute to Buddy Holly many might expect, permers dance to "Life is Beautiful McLean's lesser known songs which consists of a spoken-word poem accompanied by an upright bass line.

Such an unusual song choice makes for

Thefacebook.com is Web site that enables college students to chat and keep in touch with friends at universities across the nation by updating profiles and messaging. The Tech Fresh Web site is an entertainment site that informs students about social events on and off campus.

Bacchi said the center has a technology called April Age software that shows students what they may look as they get older. It also demonstrates what smoking and excessive sun exposure will do to a person's skin overtime. Smoking will cause excessive wrinkles over time.

The center will bring software to any function to help increase knowledge about smoking, Bacchi said. The center also works with the Lubbock community to make sure Lubbock's smoke-free ordinance

The ordinance states all enclosed buildings will not allow smoking indoors except sports grills, zoned bars and smoke

Bacchi said second-hand smoking affects people who work in bars, smoking restaurants, smoking offices and live with

Second-hand smoking is more harmful than smoking a cigarette because the chemicals are breathed in directly as opposed to through a filter, she said. Even if a person cannot smell the smoke, he is taking

The center also tries to deter students from smoking by reviewing the negative health problems associated with smoking and the difficulties involved with quit-

Students who smoke may never fully regain the lung capacity and health benefits of non-smokers, but they can greatly reduce their risk of getting cancer and other negative health effects by quitting, Bacchi said. The sooner people quit smoking, the sooner they will become healthier.

Cigarettes almost immediately harm a person's body by raising blood pressure, Bacchi said. There are about 50 chemicals in a cigarette that can cause cancer. Every time a person smokes one cigarette, they are increasing their risk.

'Your body begins to be harmed after those first couple of puffs," she said.

People generally have a negative reaction the first time they smoke. Some students may believe they are immune to addiction when they smoke, but usually, people have to smoke two or three times before they develop a nicotine addiction.

James Hershberger, a senior English and political science major from Midland and president of the University Democrats, said he believes controversial issues need to be discussed so students can conquer their misconceptions.

"(The separation of religion and state) is a hot topic that applies to a lot of issues," he said. "I feel that one of the main purposes of the University Democrats is to educate students."

Hershberger said he believes this is the core divider in many key issues currently, like gay marriage and abortion, and he does not believe it should be the core issue when decisions are made.

"Many people don't know about the separation of church and state and a lot of students have misconceptions," he said. "I am a Christian, but I also feel that the separation of church and state is one of the wisest things our founding fathers have done.'

Hershberger said he would like to see more discussions of serious and controversial topics, so students will be more available to think outside the box.

"I think most students at Texas Tech are liberal and just don't realize it," he said. "Many people believe in freedom and equality and other such matters and they don't even realize it because they have been brought up in a certain way."

Jason Allen, a senior philosophy major from Garland, said he was glad to hear a discussion of a major topic and he would come to more if they

"The topic interested me," he said. "I've always been interested in anything with the founding of our country, the founding fathers and the government."

Allen said he was expecting in depth answers to difficult questions, but believed some of the answers fell short.

"I thought (the discussion) was pretty informative," he said. "But it seemed a little shy to answer what the founding fathers intended to do with their religious wording."

Allen said he is not quick to make decisions or judgments and would like to see more controversial discussions

"It's up in the air for me. I don't want to criticize and find out I'm wrong—I'm very open to all views," he said. "I would like to see more discussions of interesting topics around campus."

"We had one report of a pickup following a student on campus but that turned out to be nothing,"

Upon investigation, the attempt was revealed to be nothing more than a fraternity prank in the form of a kidnapping hoax, Hoffman said.

This most recent incident comes almost one year after the disappearance of two Lubbock women. Joanna Kathryn Rogers, 17, went missing May 4, 2004, and Jennifer Wilkerson, 26, who was last seen July 13, 2004.

Rogers, a Lubbock High School student, went missing after her parents awoke the next morning and could not find her.

Wilkerson left her boyfriend's residence at 11 a.m. July 13, but never showed up to work the following day.

Lubbock residents and Tech students coordinated a search for the two young women last summer, but no traces of either missing person were found.
