"It's very clear the top 10 percent plan has bee successful in sustaining certain levels of diversity," said Raymund Paredes, Higher Education Coordinating Board commissioner.

impacts diversity in the state's public universities and impacts diversity in the state's public universities and
what is needed to increase minority representation. The what is needed to increase minority representation. The
committee examined one bill that would abolish the top committee examined one bill that would abolish the
0 percent law and others that would change it.
