

# **U.S.** weapons inspector finishes work

DEFICIENT SEARCHING: After more than 18 months of investigation, weapons of mass destruction still have not been found in Iraq.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In his final word, the CIA's more than 1,000 military and civilian translators, top weapons inspector in Iraq said Monday the hunt for weapons of mass destruction has "gone as far as feasible" and has found nothing, closing an investigation into the report released last fall. purported programs of Saddam Hussein that were used to justify the 2003 invasion.


Another addendum also noted military forces in Iraq may continue to find small numbers of degraded

chemical weapons - most likely misplaced or improperly destroyed before the 1991 Gulf War. In an insurgent's hands, "the use of a single even ineffectual chemical weapon would likely cause more terror than deadlier conventional explosives," another addendum said.

And still another said the survey group found some potential nuclear-related equipment was "missing from heavily damaged and looted sites." Yet, because of the deteriorating security situation in Iraq, the survey group was unable to determine what happened to the equipment, which also had alternate civilian uses.

"Some of it probably has been sold for its scrap value. Other pieces might have been disassembled" and




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
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# Finals can cause stress, but students can cope

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II. First stop, finals - next stop, stress city. Texas Tech students may resort to pulling hair, chewing nails and calling home to deal with the stress. However, campus experts suggest more productive ways to deal with the onslaught of testing time.

Stephen Cook, associate professor of psychology and director of Tech's Psychology Clinic, said he has told students to think about what can be controlled and what cannot.

Cook said the reasoning behind this is if something is uncontrollable, the situation cannot be changed and no logical cause for worry exists.

Students can choose from three different stress-relieving methods to alleviate the pressure of finals, Cook said, including task-oriented, emotion-oriented and of themselves during finals, Cook said. Exercising and avoidance coping.

Task-oriented stress relief is directly dealing with stressors, Cook said. In other words, one can list every course of action available to accomplish tasks, beginning at the beginning of the list until every task is complete.

Avoidance coping is defined as evading stress by watching television or playing video games, Cook said.

"Sometimes students say, "I'm going to do anything to avoid it," he said. Avoiding stress is a way to temporarily relieve it, but procrastinating can be more

detrimental than facing stress head-on, Cook said. For example, if a student does not study for an upcoming final and is unprepared, there will be more anxiety when exam time comes.

The third stress-relieving method is emotion-oriented, Cook said. Many stu-

It is important for students to keep a sense of humor about stress and keep things in perspective, Cook said.

'Students are in college because it is worth the sacrifice," he said.

Most college students realize the advantages of going to college far outweigh the trials they endure while working toward a degree, Cook said. A better job with a superior salary is the ultimate motivator.

It also is important for students to continue to take care eating well is important to students' well being.

Stacey Moore, psychologist for the Student Counseling Center, said students should engage in good health care especially during stressful times.

Students can manage their finals better by sticking with a good nutrition plan, Moore said.

"Stress tends to really deplete nutrients," she said.

"Avoid trying to study at times that don't work well," she said. Students also should treat each test with the importance it requires, Moore said. finals tunnel, it is easier to get through it, Cook said.

Studying in short but frequent sessions is more logical than expecting to be able to study for five hours straight, Moore said. It is a good idea to study for about 30 minutes and then take a break.

Zach Miller, a senior accounting major from Houston, said he makes sure not to study too much.

"I tell myself it's not the most important thing," he said.

Moore said students should do anything to make them feel more grounded, focused and relaxed when dealing with stress associated with studying.





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

My purpose, and the purpose of this newspaper and most media outlets you'll find, is not to tell you what to think. It's to tell you what to think about.


For all of you who have wondered, or who have accused me of one or the other, I'm not liberal or conservative.

Leaving the door to the investigation open just a crack, the U.S. official said a small team still operates under the U.S.-led multinational force in Iraq, although the survey group officially disbanded earlier this month.

Those staying on continue to examine documents and follow up on any reports of weapons of mass destruction.

In a statement accompanying the final installment, Duelfer said a surprise discovery would most likely be in the biological weapons area because clues, such as the size of the facilities used to develop them, would be comparatively small.

Among unanswered questions, Duelfer said a group formed to investigate whether WMD-related material was shipped out of Iraq before the invasion was not able to reach firm conclusions because the security situation limited and later halted their work. Investigators were focusing on transfers from Iraq to Syria.

No information gleaned from questioning Iraqis supported the possibility, one addendum said. The Iraq Survey Group believes "it was unlikely that an official transfer of WMD material from Iraq to Syria took place. However, ISG was unable to rule out unofficial movement of limited WMD-related materials."

# Tech theatre brings season to roaring end with 'Macbeth'

arkness fills the room, and a clap of thunder shakes the Charles E. Maedgen, Jr. Theatre at the opening of Texas Tech Theatre's production of William Shakespeare's Scottish play, "Macbeth," immediately setting the appropriate mood of devilish dread.

"Macbeth," finishing its run this weekend, possibly is the darkest and most violent of Shakespeare's tragedies (and my personal favorite). Director Bill Gelber has wanted to pull the trigger on it for years.

He finally has, and he drills it. Gelber has set his interpretation of "Macbeth" in a military turn-of-the-century era, with the help of excellent costume designs by Melissa Merz.

Forget about kilts. The warriors in Gelber's "Macbeth" are outfitted in button-down uniforms, accompanied by long broadswords.

The story of "Macbeth" lends itself to this kind of setting. Military leader Macbeth (Kirk Davidson) becomes convinced by three bearded witches (Chiyo Wichman, Kimberly Kathman and Lindsey Walker) that he is to be the next King of Scotland.

So Macbeth, largely under the duress of his wicked young wife "black and deep desires," takes matters into his own hands to make the witches' prophesy come true by with paranoia and seeks to kill seemingly rise out of the stage.



This is, in many respects, one of the finest and most enjoyable productions I have seen in my three years of reviewing Tech Theatre.




