Using dogs to track narcotics or find explosives is not a new wave of brilliance for law enforcements, and it is not something foreign to Sergeant Dennis Kelley of the Lubbock Police Department.

Kelley has worked with the K-9 unit of the police department for 12 years, but has been with the force for 30 years. He supervises the K-9 unit, which consists of two other men: Jim Holmes and Michael Jordon, as well as three dogs.

"The dogs are trained for detection and criminal apprehension," Kelley said. "If someone broke into a building, then the dogs would go







John Roberts' judicial philosophy is presently unclear - he has, after all, only served two years on the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals. However, Roberts is a member of the conservative Federalist Society and President Bush has said he intended to nominate justices in the mold of Thomas and Scalia. Roberts' views will become more clear during his confirmation hearings later this year.

Whatever becomes of Roberts, I think the Court's recent behavior shows why a steadier hand is desirable. Any change in the Court is important and worth following, because the next case that comes before the Court may very well affect you. Don't make the mistake of waiting until your home has been demolished to build a hotel before you start caring.



Thousands of Tech students suffer from nicotine addiction. Instead of telling students they must stand 12 feet away from buildings to smoke, the Tech psychology departstudents kick the habit.

The Texas Tech psychology department is currently studying motivational responses in nicotine-addicted individuals, to smoking-cue images

"We're trying to learn about what will help people quit when people want to quit," Lee Cohen, assistant professor of psychology.

In an addicted individual, drugcues are known to increase motivation to consume the addictive substance. These cues include images of, or related to, the addicted substance.

Motivation to consume the substance is at the center of an ongoing





The change came about because of a hidden sex scene within the game. After the announcement was made, the major entertainment stores, such as Best Buy and Circuit City, agreed to pull the game from the shelves indefinitely.

Bachar Al-Alam, a junior game design major from Cali, Columbia, said he felt the Adults Only rating was unnecessary because the target age for the game is 17 and older.


