

Mallory autopsy released, ecstasy overdose confirmed

It has taken a little more than two weeks, but the Lubbock Medical Examiners' office has now released the autopsy report for 16year-old Coronado High School sophomore Thomas Mallory. According to the report, Mallory did die from an ecstasy overdose as previously thought by law enforcement.

On June 10, police responded to a call about a suspected 16-year-old overdosing on ecstasy. Mallory died later that night.

As of Tuesday, the death has been ruled an accident by the medical examiner's office.

Lubbock Assistant District Attorney Matt Powell said that he is looking over the evidence that has been presented to him and then he will determine if there will be any criminal charges filed.

"We'll present the case in front of a grand

jury here in a few weeks," Powell said.

"If you repair the broken windows," he said, "and keep repairing them whenever they break, fixing

In effect, dodging responsibility for our actions will end up corrupting us to the point where we do wrong more naturally than right. Brokenness is the norm. And when our lives are done we will look back and see the mess we have made and have nothing but regret.

If I tell a lie, that makes me a liar. If I take something that does not rightfully belong to me, I am a thief. If I take credit for something I did not do, I am a cheater.

If we are to have any hope, we must recognize that everything we do is in the context of right and wrong. If we don't recognize what is wrong, how can we do what is right?

Letter: Wood's article wrong on kites

bird causing mayhem" by Andrew Wood on July 26, I would like to clarify many items of misinformation. First and foremost, Mississippi Kites are not rare, and are not endangered. The species is protected by both federal and state law from harm and harassment, as are all non-game bird, but that does not equate to status as an endangered species. Second, they are not causing "mayhem." A few aggressive incidents by a half-pound bird, while a management issue, do not constitute "mayhem." The word is an exaggeration and inflammatory, misrepresents the issue, and generates animosity towards the birds. When the kites first arrive in May, they select nest sites and are habituated to the normal patterns of foot traffic. When people depart from these normal patterns, the kites may become agitated. Aggressive behaviors usually only occur during the 30-40 day period

In response to the article "Rare" in which nestlings are present. Not all kites become aggressive. Currently, there are 15 active kite nests at TTU and only two pairs have demonstrated consistent aggression. There are several nests that students walk under and constructions crews work under without ever knowing the nests are there. Signs are being put up in the areas where kites have demonstrated consistent aggression to warn pedestrians to stay away from the nest trees. Rather than be fearful of these birds, I suggest students and staff of the TTU community take some time to watch the kites. They are elegant, aerobatic fliers that are enjoyable to watch while they pursue cicadas and dragonflies overhead. And it is not often that you can watch a bird of prey up close for extended periods.

NASA should update shuttle designs, technology, not abort missions

Wednesday, NASA announced that all future shuttle flights are grounded until a solution can be found for the continued problem of foam on the main fuel tank breaking off and possibly damaging insulating heat panels on the orbiter. This is, of course, the situation that caused the disintegration of the space shuttle Columbia in early 2003. While it is indeed important to safeguard the lives of the astronauts, it is equally important that NASA finds a quick return to


First, Congress must get behind the idea. As all government spend-
