Congress does have the right to "To reeulate commerce with foreign nations, and amon the United States and major source of jobs domestically is a major intermational and interstate business. For the vast majority of marijuana to get to where it is sued by individuals, it must cross intermational and state borders. Clearl boch items do have a substantial effect on con
justifcation for Congress to eopisiste on them.

Congress also has the power "Io make all laws which shall be necessary and proper" to nance of forces to defend the U.S. (Art. 1, Sec. 8) To these ends, Congress has broad powe to give foreign aid or regulate commerce.
The fact that you may not like where the money goes or what it is spent on is simply a finction of your politics - its constitutionality is textually assured.
The case that you cite as "questionable," Wickard v. Filburn (1942) is the first case holding that Congress could regulate wholly intrastate activity if that activity would havea
substantial effect on interstate commerce. Arising out of the Great Depresion, this makes sense - if millions of people were allowed to grow their own wheat without regulation, agricultural prices would continue to fall, farms would continue to fail and the Depression could last longer or be made more severe. This case was later used to further such "question able" causes such as desegregating restaurants and hotels during the civil rights era. Lincoln preserved the constitution by bending it during the Civil War so that our nation would not be broken. II also was in his spirit that the $13^{\dagger}, 14^{\dagger}$, and $15^{\dagger}$ amendments were
passed, substantially broadening the number of A mericans who can bathe in Constitutional pased, substanialy broadeening thenumberor American who can bathe in Constuutiona
liberty. Roosevel protected the constitution by giving Americans hope during the darkes days of the Great Depression and later defeating the fascist powers. Johnson defended the constitution by defending citizen's rights to enjoy the liberties their county afforded then and to maintain those rights at the ballot box.
These men did not abuse the Constitution; they fuffilled its ideals and preserved it by
