Ovary transplant in sheep brings hope to fighting infertility

Women who want put off having children while retaining their fertility may soon be able to literally save their
ovaries for a later date. ovaries for a later date.
Israeli scientists fully frozen and transplanted ovaries in sheep, according to a report Thursday in Human Reproduction, a monthly journal of the European Society of Human Reproduction and Embryology.
Samuel Prien, the director of the Assisted Reproductive Technology Laboratory at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, said the research might lead the way for advances in human fertility studies. "What it's being touted as, is if you cando this, you can preserve a wo
fertility for any reason," he said Young women who are c patients often become infertile after treatment, but by utilizing the researchers' method, a woman facing this type of treatment could save her ovaries' functionality through surgi-
cal removal and reinsertion after the cal removal
treatment.

Katrina's potential: Historic changes possible in military's role in domestic emergencies
