#### U.S. government says pope immune from lawsuit

ROME (AP) — The U.S. Justice Department has told a Texas court that a lawsuit accusing Pope Benedict XVI of conspiring to cover up the sexual molestation of three boys by a seminarian should be dismissed because the pontiff enjoys immunity as head of state of the Holy See.

Assistant U.S. Attorney General Peter Keisler said in Monday's filing that allowing the lawsuit to proceed would be "incompatible with the United States' foreign policy interests.'

There was no immediate ruling from Judge Lee Rosenthal of the U.S. District Court for the southern district of Texas in Houston. However, U.S. courts have been bound by such "suggestion of immunity" motions submitted by the government, Keisler's filing says.

A 1994 lawsuit against Pope John Paul II, also filed in Texas, was dismissed after the U.S. government filed a similar motion.

Keisler's motion was not unexpected, as the Vatican Embassy in Washington had asked the U.S. government to issue the immunity suggestion and do everything it could to get the case dismissed.

#### NATION Ohio beaver thief's sentence to fit crime

XENIA, Ohio (AP) — A man convicted of stealing a 250-pound beaver statue has been ordered to start doing exactly the opposite: Guard 25 similar beaver statues for the next few weeks.

Common Pleas Judge Stephen Wolaver also sentenced Michael Ledford, 18, to five years' probation Monday and ordered him to pay part of the cost a city committee paid to put tracking devices on the beaver

Ledford, who earlier this month pleaded no contest to a theft charge, will guard the statues on weekends until they are auctioned Oct. 15. He will be given a chair while on duty, but police will monitor him, officials said.

At least nine of the toothy fiberglass beaver statues have been vandalized, stolen at some point or moved since being installed in July on the streets of Beavercreek, a city of 40,000 just east of Dayton

#### Israel pulls last of its troops from West Bank

RAFAH, Gaza Strip (AP) — Israel pulled the last of its troops out of two isolated West Bank settlements Tuesday, completing the final phase of the withdrawal it began in Gaza last month.

As Israeli soldiers left the empty settlements of Ganim and Kadim, next to the West Bank town of Jenin, thousands of Palestinians streamed in, setting fires as gunmen fired in the air — reprising the scenes in Gaza after last week's pullout.

Earlier, Israeli forces left two other evacuated West Bank settlements. Unlike Gaza, however, Israeli forces will continue to patrol the area, the military said, as it has not turned over control of the northern

West Bank to the Palestinians. In Gaza, meanwhile, workers put the finishing touches Tuesday on a border crossing between Rafah and Egypt as a top Palestinian security official announced the border would be opened over the weekend.


At the beginning of the meeting Lubbock City Traffic Engineer Jere Hart presented a slide show along with some solutions to traffic and parking issues.

> Under the resident only parking permit, Hart said, 60 percent of the homeowners on each side of the street must sign a petition to have resident only parking on their street. The permit itself costs \$50. After the initial permit fee, each automobile will cost \$5 per year.

# Tech searches for first Big 12 win

Texas Tech has been searching for the confidence to win their first Big 12 volleyball match of the season and hopes to find it when Oklahoma comes to the United Spirit Arena on Wednesday at 7 p.m.

The Red Raiders (6-5, 0-2) have struggled in their last three matches since los-

ing to Boise State in the last match of the Red Raider Round-Up on Sept. 10. Sophomore setter Emily Ziegler said the team's play has not been the same

since the loss to the Broncos. "That last game against Boise State was not a good one and I think some of

the players lost their confidence and it has been really hard for us to build that The Sooners (5-5, 0-2) also are trying to find their first conference win of the

season after being swept by No. 17 Kansas State and then losing to Kansas last Saturday Both Tech and OU have lost to the same Big 12 team and by the same score,

getting swept 0-3 against K-State. Both teams match up well when looking at the statistics they have generated

The Sooners average 14.56 kills per game and 12.47 digs per game to Tech's

14.85 KPG and 14.76 DPG. Offensively, there should be a good inside struggle between OU's junior middle blocker Eliane Santos and Tech's junior outside hitter Philister Sang. Santos has 106 kills through 22 games averaging 4.82 KPG. Sang has been the powerhouse in the Raider offense with 193 kills in 39 games averaging 4.95 KPG and is ranked

third overall in kills in the Big 12 "This game is huge," Tech coach Nancy Todd said.



#### NFL's Katrina telethon raises \$5 million

NEW YORK (AP) — A fund-raising telethon that featured more than 30 current and former NFL players raised \$5 million for the Bush-Clinton Katrina Fund in about 6 1/2 hours.

Monday night's telethon was part of the NFL's "Hurricane Relief Weekend" and coincided with a special "Monday Night Football" doubleheader on ABC and ESPN. Players such as John Elway, Donovan McNabb, Art Shell and Frank Gifford took turns, 12 at a time, spending between 75 minutes to two hours answering telephones and taking donations.

"We appreciate the tremendous response of our fans and everything that our teams and players are doing to support the relief effort," NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue said. "We are going to stay at it because all of America is going to have to stay at it."

NFL teams and relief organizations have raised approximately \$4 million from fans at stadiums for Hurricane Katrina relief, the league said, bringing the total generated by the NFL to \$21 million.
