jail cell, Texas Tech students speak out about her arrest and mission to bring U.S. troops home from Iraq. Sheehan, a 48 -year-old Californian who became a leader in the anti-war movement after her sons
death in Iraq last year, was arrested death in Iraq last year, was arrested
Monday along with dozens of other war protestors outside the White House, according to The Associated
Press Press.

rallied outside the White House on the two-block pedestrian walkway of Pennsylvania Avenue. Dozens of protestors, including
Sheehan, sat down in Sheehan, sat down in front of the

the war now," knowing they would be arrested if they did not leave According to The AP, Sheehan was the first of 50 protestors to be taken into custody and was smiling as she entered a police vehicle. 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Roberts heads toward confirmation, Bush hints 'diversity' in next selection
$\qquad$ John Roberts, hailed by supporters as "the brightest of the bright," cruised Monday toward easy confirmation as chief justice while
President Bush hinted President Bush hinted that his
next pick to the Supreme Court next pick to the Supreme Cour
could be a minority or a woman. "Diversity is one of the strengths of the country," the president said. $\qquad$ Roberts, a 50 -year-old federal appellate judge and the president's
first pick for the Supreme first pick for the Supreme Court, is
assured of getting an overwhelminsurca of getting an overwhelm- for
ate later this week whe the Sen- that ate later this week, making him the nation's 17 th chief justice.
Roberts is "the brightest of the Roberts is "the brightest of the bright," declared Majority Leader
Bill Frist, R-Tenn., as the Senate Bill Frist, R-Tenn., as the Senat
began several days of debate. began several days of debate.
Two-thirds of the 100 senato - both Republicans and Democrats - already had promised to support Roberts as the successor to the late William H. Rehnquist
before the debate began. Robers before the debate began. Roberts'
would-be colleagues support him, would-be colleagues support him,
too, said Judiciary Committee Chairman Arlen Specter, R-Pa. Chairman Arlen Specter, R-Pa.
"The word is that the justices very much applaud his nomination to be chief justice," Specter said.
"He has the porential "He has the potential, almost from a running start, to bring a new
day and a new era to the Supreme day and a new era to the Supreme
Court."

With Roberts' confirmation guaranteed, senators and Bush started oming select White House's upor retiring Justice replacement for retiring Justice Sandra Day O'Connor. Specter said he expects
that nomination to come "shortly if that nomination to come "shortly, if made by the Senate on the Roberts nomination."
Frist and Minority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., expect Roberts to be confirmed by Thursday, and Bush is xpected to make his next selection for the Supre
that.

An official ruling will probably be published within six weeks. The "instruction," issued from the Congregation for Catholic Education, will have worldwide application. apostolic visitation where investigators will visit all 229 U.S. seminaries. The guidelines for the visitation, the document "Instrumentum Laboris," reads as follows: "Is there evidence of homosexuality in the seminary?
(This question must be asked) ... Do the faculty formation watch out for signs of particular friendships!"

say it will apply only to candidates for priesthood, not those already in service. In fact, however, it will bar or drive underground any and all gay men currently laboring for the church. The Pledge of Allegiance was first published on Oct. 11, 1892, by
Francis Bellamy, a socialist author and minister, as a way to commemorate the 400th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of America. The original words stated, "I pledge
allegiance to my Flag and to the Republic for which it stands: one Republic for which it stands: one
Nation indivisible, with Liberty and ustice for all." After a declaration shortly thereafter by President Benamin Harrison, the Pledge began to On June in public schools. On June 22, 1942, Congress officialy recognized the Pledge of Alle-
giance. In 1943, in the Supreme Court giance. In 1943 , in the Supreme Court
case West Virginia State Board of Education vs. Barnette, the Court ruled $6-3$ to prohibit a school from requiring

The move to include "under God"

Knights of Columbus led a campaign to add the words to the Pledge, with the purpose being to separate the U.S. from the officially atheistic Soviet Union and to remove the expression
