"I don't fall asleep easily either. I can't lie down and go to sleep; $I$ just crash when I have to." Ring said the pressure he is nder could be a reason for his in ability to sleep. "It might be stress from looking or a job," he said. "I'm worried about my future." Lemons said college students could make some changes in their lifestyle to ensure they stay healthy.

If (college students) have to stay up late, they should set aside nights where they are going to get a full night's sleep," he said. "They should also exercise and eat right. If you have to stay up late for a test, $\qquad$ Texas Tech students who are not getting enough sleep may face long-term consequences such as seizures, strokes and heart attacks, said Richard Lemons, manager of Covenant Sleep Center. Lemons said the results of sleep deprivation can be damaging and potentially irreversible. "The brain gets in a cycle of resting and waking; if you don't get rest, the brain gets agitated," he said. the brain gets agitated," he said. "They've done studies where they try to keep people up for a week and it's done irreversible damage They start to hallucinate because their brain needs a dream state to function." Students who do not get the Sroper amount of sleep on a consistent basis can build up sleep debt, something that happens frequently when students stay up late to study for tests, Lemons said. AMTRAK announces modified fare increases following initial fare hike announcement

WASHINGTON (AP) - Amtrak on Tuesday announced hat ticker prices nationwide to $\$ 4$ starting next Tuesday.
Acela Express and long distance coach trains will see a percent fare increase, while
trains will rise by 5 percent. The fare increases were described by Amtrak as an impor tant component of its fiscal 2006 budget to cover its increases
in current and anticipated expenses, including the cost of fuel which has risen 40 percent in the past year.
Starting Oct. 16 , the approximately 18,000 Northeast Cor ridor commuters who have monthly passes will see 10 percent increase. The currently monthly fares - which vary depending on destinations - are currently discounted at 70 percent. Th discount will be adjusted to 60 percent, Amtrak said. In F
ary 2006 , that discount will be adjusted to 50 percent. For the approximately 2,000 Smart Pass 10 -trip ticket hol ers whose fares are discounted 50 to 60 percent, the discount will be dropped to 20 percent starting Oct. 16 .
Starting Oct. 4, Amtrak said it will begin to "revenue manage" some Northeast Corridor trains to better match fares to demand periods to allow passengers traveling at off-peak time take advantage of lower fares.
The fare hikes come at a time when President Bush has announced the fare increases on Sept. 9 , but postponed its plans a week later to gather more input from public officials and other groups. Amtrak backed off its initial plan to raise monthly pass fares for Norheast Conidor commuters by much as 50 percent
In July, a bipartisan group of senators introduced a bill that wailroad $\$ 3.3$ billion in subsidies over six years. The cuts would be absorbed through cost cutting, restructuring and reform.
