England sentenced to three years for scandal

FORT HOOD (AP) - Army Pfc. Lynndie England, who said she was only trying to please her soldier boyfriend when she took part in detainee abuse at Iraq's Abu Ghraib prison, was sentenced late Tuesday to three years behind bars.

England's sentencing wrapped up the last of nine courts-martial of low-level soldiers charged in the scandal, which severely damaged America's image in the Muslim world and tarnished the U.S. military at home and abroad.

The jury of five Army officers needed about 90 minutes to determine their sentence for England, the 22-year-old from West Virginia who was the most recognizable of the reservists charged after photos of naked detainee in degrading poses became public.

The charges carried up to nine years, but the prosecution had asked the jury to imprison England for four to six years. The defense asked for no time.

None of the lawyers would speak with reporters after the sentence was an-

Rice seeks assurances in Haiti election process

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said Tuesday that Haitian authorities must move 'quickly if they are to hold free and fair national elections by Nov. 20 as planned.

Rice met with Haitian President Boniface Alexandre and Prime Minister Gerard Latortue during a daylong visit designed to show support for Haiti's attempts to overcome long years of political

The election process "must be open, inclusive and fair," she told a news conference at the presidential palace.

Elections "can be a very important and precious step along this road to democracy," Rice said.

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The 2002 Help America Vote Act mandates that every voting precinct have at least one handicap-accessible voting machine by Jan. 1, 2006.

"We are having to upgrade the entire voting system," said Dorothy Kennedy, Lubbock County Elections Administrator. "Every county in the country is having to do this."

Kennedy said two types of direct recording electronic devices nationwide exist.

"Ours is a wheel turn," she said. "There are others that are touch screens."

To use the wheel turn, the voter turns the select wheel to highlight their ballot choice. Then the voter presses the enter button to enter the selection.

"It allows folks with disabilities to vote very easily," Kennedy said.

Hepatitis A outbreak may have stemmed from local food handler

A food handler who worked at Angelita's Kitchen, 5401 South Ave. Q, may have infected customers who dined at the restaurant between Sept. 9 and Sept. 11 with hepatitis A, according to a City of Lubbock Health Department alert.

"Although the risk of infection is considered to be low, it's still a concern," said Tigi Ward, public health coordinator for the City of Lubbock Health Department.

Environmental Health has worked with the restaurant, and the establishment still is open for business, Ward said.

The formerly infected food handler, Ward said, "no longer poses a risk to your exposure," she said. the public."

Ward said, they have lifelong immunity against the virus. The incubation period for hepatitis one for adults.

A, a liver disease caused by the hepatitis A virus, is between two weeks and 50 days, Ward said.

Someone infected at the restaurant may show the earliest symptoms of infection this week.

Ward said the viral infection is spread by not washing hands after going to the bathroom. Symptoms of hepatitis A include fever, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, muscle aches and fatigue.

"If people are feeling ill, they really need to be checked out by their physician," she said.

There are four known cases of hepatitis A in Lubbock, Ward said.

No cure for hepatitis A exists, Ward said, but supportive treatment can help ease symptoms of the viral infection. Those living with the disease must get into the care of a gastroenterologist to manage their condition.

> Elementary school children must be vaccinated for hepatitis A and B before they are allowed to enroll in school.

Hepatitis B can cause liver cancer later in life, Ward said, and is spread through infected bodily fluids, similar to HIV

Hepatitis C is spread through bloodto-blood contact and is the fastest growing disease among young adults, Ward said. Hepatitis C often is asymptomatic, but the disease eventually can cause permanent liver damage, according to WebMD.com.

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AMTRAK announces modified fare increases following initial fare hike announcement

WASHINGTON (AP) - Amtrak on Tuesday announced that ticket prices nationwide would increase an average of \$3 to \$4 starting next Tuesday.

Acela Express and long distance coach trains will see a 7 percent fare increase, while regional and long distance sleeper trains will rise by 5 percent.

The fare increases were described by Amtrak as an important component of its fiscal 2006 budget to cover its increases in current and anticipated expenses, including the cost of fuel which has risen 40 percent in the past year.

Starting Oct. 16, the approximately 18,000 Northeast Corridor commuters who have monthly passes will see a 10 percent increase. The currently monthly fares - which vary depending on destinations - are currently discounted at 70 percent. The discount will be adjusted to 60 percent, Amtrak said. In February 2006, that discount will be adjusted to 50 percent.

For the approximately 2,000 Smart Pass 10-trip ticket holders whose fares are discounted 50 to 60 percent, the discount will be dropped to 20 percent starting Oct. 16.

Starting Oct. 4, Amtrak said it will begin to "revenue manage" some Northeast Corridor trains to better match fares to demand periods to allow passengers traveling at off-peak times to take advantage of lower fares.

The fare hikes come at a time when President Bush has proposed eliminating the railroad's subsidies. Amtrak initially announced the fare increases on Sept. 9, but postponed its plans a week later to gather more input from public officials and other groups. Amtrak backed off its initial plan to raise monthly pass fares for Northeast Corridor commuters by as much as 50 percent.

In July, a bipartisan group of senators introduced a bill that would cut Amtrak's operating subsidy by 40 percent, leaving the railroad \$3.3 billion in subsidies over six years. The cuts would be absorbed through cost cutting, restructuring and reform.

for the remainder of people entering the country.

"We've seen a fairly steady growth in the number of undocumented immigrants living here, and this data shows very sizable numbers coming in," Passel said. "We're clearly not stopping them at the border."

Declines in legal immigration "appear to reflect processing backlogs, security delays and other developments that followed the Sept. 11 attacks," the report said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former Playboy model Anna that she was entitled to compensatory and punitive damages Nicole Smith is going to the Supreme Court.

Justices said Tuesday they would consider Smith's appeal over the fortune of her 90-year-old late husband. The stripperturned-reality television star stands to get as much as \$474 million if she wins at the high court and gets a bankruptcy court judgment reinstated. The case will be argued before the Supreme Court early next year.

She has not gotten any money from the estate of J. Howard Marshall II, an oil tycoon who married her in 1994 when received more than \$6 million in gifts from her late husband, he was 89 and she was 26. Marshall, one of Texas' wealthiest but was not included in his will, justices were told. men, died in 1995

At issue for the court is a relatively mundane technical her husband's money even before his death. issue: when may federal courts hear claims that are also involved state probate proceedings. But the facts of the case are eve-catching.

The 1993 Playmate of the Year and self-described "blonde bombshell" claims her husband promised her millions but that his scheming son cut her out of the estate.

An initial \$474 million award was reduced to about \$89 million, then thrown out altogether by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco. The appeals court said that a Texas probate court's decision that the oilman's son was his sole heir should stand.

The Texas Tech Jazz Band is creating a buzz not only through the mouthpieces of their instruments, but also throughout the Lubbock music scene by bringing a largely unknown musical genre to the Hub City.

"It does kind of feel like I'm not in Lubbock when I'm doing this for a couple of hours," said Alex Blue, a junior music education major from Arlington. "Maybe that's why I like it so much."

Blue plays bass trombone for the 17-piece Tech jazz band. The band's solid gig at Rocky La Rue's on Broadway brings a hip excitement to Lubbock, he said.

"I like the atmosphere we get in here when it's packed, and it's just really noisy and people get into the music," Blue said.

Much of the out-of-city experience the band and its audience encounter during the group's weekly 10 p.m. to midnight shows could be contributed to the group's new director, Brad Leali.

Leali hails from New York City and was nominated for a Grammy in 2000 for a solo performance with the famous Count Basie Orchestra. He also worked as Harry Connick, Jr.'s musical director for five years.

Colt Compton, a sophomore music performance major from Lubbock, plays lead alto saxophone in the Tech Jazz Band. He said he appreciates getting to learn from Leali's musical expertise and outside perspective.

"He's a new director, and he's really done a lot of the jazz scene around Lubbock," Compton said. "I think he's one of the best sax players in the world.

Already into his first semester at Tech, Leali said he loves his new position in the music department. He said he chose to come to Lubbock to give something back to music, specifically jazz.

"I felt that this was a community that didn't have access to the things that people on the east coast have access to," he said.

In addition to bringing a jazz mood to Lubbock and teaching jazz students about self expression through music and musical performance, the concerts the Tech Jazz Band puts on also educate Lubbock residents, Leali said.

Audience members who come to Rocky La Rue's to see the Tech Jazz Band perform get lessons in jazz songs and also in etiquette associated with performances different from rock or reggae concerts, Leali said.

For example, it is not uncommon for spectators to clap in the middle of a jazz song after a soloist has demonstrated his skill on a particular instrument, Leali said.

"Rocky La Rue's is a place where people aren't familiar — this is new to them," he said. "I like it because it's an atmosphere where people can have fun.

Also not uncommon is a featured vocalist who sings along with the jazz band, Leali said. Sometimes, one of the band's trumpet players will lend his voice, also.


"It's live jazz, it's free and it's pretty good," she said. "We're here 'till they kick us out or it's all over, whatever comes first."
