WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush, stung by the rejection of his first choice, Monday in a bid to reshape the Supreme Court and mollify his conservative allies. Ready-torumble Democrats warned that Alito may be
an extremist who would curb abortion rights. an extremist who would curb abortion rights.

on that court for 15 years, and now has more prior judicial experience than any Supreme Court nominee in more than 70 years," Bush

Seven U.S. troops die to end bloodiest month since Jan. By ROBERT H. REID

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - Capping the bloodiest month for American troops since January, the U.S. military reported Monday that seven more U.S. service members were
killed - all victims of increainsly killed - all victims of increasingly sophis-
ticated bombs that have been become the ticated bombs that have been become the
deadliest weapon in the insurgents' arsenal. deaddiest weapon in the insurgents arsenal.
Bombs also claimed a toll Monday among civilians in Basca, Iraq's second-largest city and the major metropolis of the Shiite-dominated south, which has witnessed less violence than
Sunni areas. A large Sunni areas. A large car bomb exploded along a bustling street packed with shops and restau-
rants as people were enjoying an evening out rants as people were enjoying an evening out
after the daily Ramadan fast. At least 20 were killed and about 40 wounded, police Lt. Col. Karim al-Zaidi said.
Military commanders have warned that Sunni insurgents will step up their attacks in the run-up to the Dec. 15 election, when
Iraqis will choose their first full Iraqis ment since the collapse of Saddam Hussin's ment since the
regime in 2003.
To guard against such attacks, the military has raised the number of American troops in
Iraq to 157,000 Iraq to 157,000 - among the highest levels

Tech fundraising efforts improved, but totals remain below other Texas schools

The Texas Tech Fundraising
Committee has raised $\$ 9.3$ million more this year than they did in the previous fiscal year.
Fundraising increased from $\$ 56.6$ Fundraising increased from $\$ 56.6$
million in 2004 to $\$ 65.9$ in 2005. "This is the first year we have
set goals like this and have focused set goals like this and have focused
attention on achieving those goals,"
said Elizabert Hel said Elizabeth Haley, associate vice
chancellor for chancellor for college programs and
dean emeritus. dean emeritus.
She said the increase in funding is a result of being goal-oriented and

by the Chancellor's Office, the president, Tech deans and Tech Health Sciences Center deans.
Comparatively, the University of Texas raised $\$ 1.4$ billion according to an article in The Daily Texan.

McDonald's restaurant has decid-
ed to display nutritional information
for the majority of their food products
on the food wrappers beginning next
year, according to CBS News.
Nutritional information for Mc-
Donald's food has been avaiablabe for
years, said one McDonald's customer
service representative, but now, the
information is more accessible and is
more detailed.
Katy Reagan, a sophomore public
relations major from Austin, said she
believes more fast food restaurants
should follow McDonald'sexample
and display their nutritional informa-
tion so consumers can compare food
options and pick which restaurant
best suits them.
"I think that people are aware
that McDonald's food contains a lot
of calories and fat grams, but they
choose to eat it anyway because it's
convenient," she said.
Though hee ooes not eat at restau-
rants often, Reagan said if she were
to come face to face with a nutrition
label loaded with fat grams and
calories, she would seek alternative
sustenance.
The nutritional label sandwich
wrappers will make consumers more
conscious of what they are ingesting,
Reagan said, but in the long run,
those who eat McDonald's products
probably already are aware of the
food's nutritional content.
