Honda spokesman Sage Marie said there have been no crashes or injurises linked to
the isue in the popularselling vehicle. the isue in the popularselling vehicle.
The "vast majority" of the 25,298 vehicles under recall in the United States have not yet been sold, Marie said. A dealer inspecting the vehicles discovered
the problem in late September and rethe problem in late September and re-
ported it to the automaker, leading to an interal investigation, he said. Honda redesigned the sedan for the
2006 model year and it continues to post 2006 model year and it continues to post
strong sales figures. The Japanese automaker sold 23,911 Civics in October, up 14 percent from last October, according
to Autodata Corp. The company sold 257,749 Civics in
the first nine monhts of fhis year, down 1.2 percent from 262,958 sold dast year.

Jim Reckner, director of the Tech Vietnam Center, said he is proud of the young men and women who are in Iraq and Afghanistan.
"Unlike the media, they believe in what they are doing," Reckner, a Vietnam veteran, said
This year's Veterans Day dually honors all U.S. veterans in the nation's war-peppered past and marks the $60^{\mathrm{dh}}$ anniversary of the end of World War II.
"One of the things that that means is that our veterans from World War II are rapidly passing from the scene," Reckner said. "They grow fewer in number every day and every hour."
One day, that whole generation will be gone and all the messages that their service and dedication brought only will be distant memories, he said. Veterans Day is a time to preserve such memories. The younger generation could focus a little bit of their attention on all the men and women who have served and sacrificed to make our country what it is," he said.
Phil Price, a Vietnam veteran and former infantry platoon leader, said the stories of soldiers from past wars paint an important picture for today's youth.
"Most veterans had their lives interrupted immediately upon graduation," he said of the Vietnam War. "I think it's the freedoms that veterans from all wars have given this generation that we should think about."

Behind the myth: Chickenpox

The old saying that states once
a person gets chickenpox, he or she a person gets chickenpox, he or she never will get it again may only be
true for some people. true for some people. Dr. Kelly Bennett, medical direc-
tor for Texas Tech Student Health Services, said it is possible for students who have had the virus to get chickenpox if they have not had the virus or if the childhood case they suffered was mild.
"If you
"If you have a rip-roaring case of
the chickenvox, get chickenpox, youre
gtudents who have get it again," she said.
Students who have not had chickenpox or have not had the chickenpox vaccine should be immuni against the virus, Bennett said.
"I can attest to that," she sa " "I can attest to that," she said. "Having it as an adult sucks."
Chickenpox, or herpes v is a cousin of the herpes virus, Benis a cousin of the herpes virus, Ben-
nett said. Symptoms of chickenpox include high fever, upper respiratory complications and nausea. "The thing about chickenpox is
they come out in cross", she said they come out in crops," she said.
Shingles, a common form of Shingles, a common form of the
chickenpox disease found in adults, is chickenpox disease found in adults, io Bennett said.
"Shingles is chickenpox; it's just coming out is one patch of skin in-

Chickenpox is characterized by Chickenpox is characterized by itchy blisters that begin to form on
the trunk of the body and spread to the limbs, Bennett said. The blisters pop during the weeklong progression

Topical treatments can be apTopical treatments can be ap-
plied to chickenpox blisters, Bennett said, but steroid ointments should be avoided because they can decrease ones immune system, leaving them open to pneumonia or the risk of
hospitalization. Oatmeal baths and calamine
otions are beneficial, Bennett said. However, Caladryl lotion should not be applied to chickenpox because it
contains Benadryl contains Benadryl.
Immunity to Immunity to chickenpox can with the virus, Bennett said, because once the body is infected with a virus, antibodies are manufactured and put on reserve.
However, However, if a case of chickenpox is mild, and the virus returns from its
dormant state in the nerve endings of dormant state in the nerve endings of antibodies may not be strong enough to defeat the virus, Bennett said. In the early 1990s, an antiviral medication called Acyclovir was developed to help combat the chick-
enpox virus, Bennett said. The medi enpox virus, Bennett said. The medi-
cation does not cure the virus, lessens the severity of chickenpox. Then, in the mid ' 90 s , a chicken. pox vaccine was developed, Bennett pox vaccine was developed, Bennett
said. The vaccine is administered to children when they turn 1 . Those who have had the chickenpox vaccine can still contract
the virus, Bennett said, but the case the virus, Bennett said, but the case
likely will not be as bad as it would be without the vaccine. raxely will develop pneumonia or become ill enough to end up in the hospital, Bennett said. Jennifer Sheridan, a senior public relations major from Sherman,

The athletic department chooses the marching band or to high-dollar onors and alumni. Anderson said this problem is intopensi fied because bands must purchase 1.5 tickets for each student to accommodate large instruments.
For Texas Tech, that equals 640
tickets each at full price, and because tickers each at full price, and because

for 35 percent of travel expenditures. for 35 percent of travel expenditures.
The Big 12 's policy is different from the policies in the Pac-10 and the Big East. In those conferences, a
special area is carved out for visiting bands that doesn't count against the pre-determined ticket allocation. If the Big 12 adopted a similar
policy, Anderson said it would allow Tech and others the chance to see some of the Big 12 North's majestic and historic stadiums.
"'d love to get up to some of those
places, and the tickets have been a primary reason we haven't gone," would open the door for additional possibilitities with travel." Right now, Anderson said the
only feasible travel opportunities are to schools in the old Southwest conference. When Tech, Texas, Texas
A\&M or Baylor face each other the A\&M or Baylor face each other, the
