it seems the pattern of life for a bird may go something like this: from ed to chick to chicken to ... fuel? Robert E. Babcock, a professo of chemical engineering at the University of Arkansas, said his research team has developed a create biodiesel fuel. Babcock said the
pocess involves reacting the chicken fat with alcohol and blending with diesel fuel. for biodiesel fuel, which formerly for biodiesel fuel, which formerly among other sources, Babcock said Soybean oil poses economic prob lems like being expensive to use. "Chicken fat looks promising and it looks like it will either be as economical or more economical
(than soybean oil)," he said. "It is matter of availability of the chicken fat. There are a lot of economics
involved."
