George W. Bush called for jury duty in Waco

WACO (AP) — He's called the commander in chief and leader of the free world, but George W. Bush may have a new title: juror No. 286.

The president is among 600 potential jurors who have been summoned to report to court Monday in McLennan County, where he has a 1,600-acre

State District Judge Ralph Strother said he expects to get a response about the summons but doesn't expect Bush to show up in his court

"I don't think I'll be sending the sheriff out to bring the president in," said Strother, a Republican who has a grandson serving in Iraq. "It seems to me that the president has plenty of things to occupy his attention. Jury duty is a very important civic function, but running the country, I think, especially in wartime, takes priority over jury service."

White House spokesman Allen Abnev said Bush was not aware of the situation and had not received the summons. He declined to elaborate on how the president would handle the jury notice when it arrived at the White House.

New \$10 bills will be sprouting next spring

WASHINGTON (AP) — The trees won't be the only thing sprouting new colors come springtime.

Americans' wallets will have more red. yellow and orange as the first of 800 million redesigned \$10 bills start showing up in cash registers and ATM machines on March 2.

Government officials said Thursday that they had selected the March date to start distributing the more colorful \$10 bills, which will have shades of the new colors added to the traditional green.

The makeover of the \$10 follows colorization of the \$20 bill in 2003 and the \$50 billion last year.

The new \$10 will still feature Alexander Hamilton, the nation's first Treasury secretary, on one side, and the Treasury building on the other side.

But those two images will be joined by the Statue of Liberty's torch and the phrase "We the People" in red along with small yellow 10s and a subtle orange background.

Emily the cat flies back home from France trip

PARIS (AP) — Emily the cat is heading home, in style.

The wayward tabby from Wisconsin who disappeared two months ago and wound up traveling across the Atlantic to France boarded a Continental Airlines flight Thursday — in business class.

Travel conditions leaving Europe promised to be a bit more comfortable for Emily, who arrived as a stowaway in a cargo container after straying from home in Appleton, Wis.

"I don't think she'll drink champagne but I think she will be happy to rest," said Continental spokesman Philippe Fleury, at Charles de Gaulle airport to see Emily off. The airline offered to fly the cat home from Paris after her tale spread around the world and she cleared a one-month quarantine.

"This was such a marvelous story, that we wanted to add something to it," Fleury told AP Television News. A full-fare ticket for Emily's seat would normally cost about \$6,000 and the airline provided a company escort for the cat.

Three injured in shooting at reserve base, official says

FORT WORTH (AP) — Three sailors were injured in a shooting at a military reserve base Thursday during what investigators think was a suicide attempt by one of them, an official said.

A single bullet injured all three men at the Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base at Carswell. The gunman was in critical condition with a single gunshot wound to the neck; his supervisors received stitches and were expected to be discharged Thursday from the hospital, said Chief Petty Officer Eric Clement.

The gunman apparently tried to commit suicide when his two superiors attempted to stop him. As they struggled, the weapon went off, grazing the two supervisors and injuring the sailor, said base commander Capt. John McCormack.

The shooting happened around 12:20 p.m. inside an administrative building where all three worked, base officials said.

Initially, officials thought one of the sailors shot his two superiors and then turned the gun on himself.

Gates to the base, formerly known as Carswell Air Force Base, were closed briefly following the afternoon shooting but later reopened. Emergency vehicles could be seen surrounding a building near an air traffic control tower on the base.

Nearly 8,000 reservists from the Navy, Air Force, Marines and Texas Air National Guard are assigned to the base.

Texas has the second highest current death row population as of Jan. 1 with 447 individuals, according to the National Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty's Web site. California is first with 639 inmates.

She reviewed news accounts, Internet sites and appeals court decisions that include case histories, among other sources, to compile what she said is a conservative estimate of slayings.

"I just don't have time to go back and look for prior murders," said Hall, who assembled the list for a Justice For All Web site. "A lot of people are on parole for prior murders when they commit the murder that ends them up on death row. I know there's a lot more, probably two for one, I would guess."

Texas, which in 1982 became the first state to use lethal injection as its method of capital punishment, has carried out 355 executions. A convicted killer from North Carolina was set to become No. 1,000 early Friday unless the courts or that state's governor intervened.

Hall said it's impossible to calculate the toll taken on other people aside from the slaying victims.

"Anybody who witnesses the execution, the prison staff, jurors, judges, the court clerk and bailiffs, neighbors, co-workers, cousins - there's an unbelievable number of lives that each person who's murdered touches,' she said.

An anti-death penalty organization, the Death Penalty Information Center, in Washington, has labeled the nation's 1,000th execution a "somber







Texas Tech defensive back Dwayne Slay's never delivered a shot heard 'round' the world, but apparently he delivered a few heard 'round the conference.


The senior safety was selected the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year by the Associated Press Tuesday.

Slay finished the year with 101 tackles, good for third overall in the conference and top among Big 12 de-


Slay, also a member of the Big 12 Coaches' First-Team, set the conference record with eight forced fumbles, two of which came against Kansas State.



Her current works involve fabrics and text, however. Although she has been interested in textual art for a long time, she said she uses text against appearances. Her work shows off profanity and feminist messages hand stitched onto pillows and other items that appear to have come straight in Slaton at 25 S. Ninth St.

Eiche became very interested in text when one of her professors mentioned her work reminded her of Jenny Holzer, an artist who also creates text-based art. Ever since she has been concentrating on using various messages and themes in her art.

This show is not only a chance for Eiche to show her work, but also a chance for her to feature Emma Whitfill, a young artist and friend. Whitfill has donated works for her own section, as well as contributing work to the main display of the show, a young girl's room, decked out in pink and




