FDA panel votes to recommend mostserious warning on some ADHD drugs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ritalin

deficit hyperactivity disorder should carry the strongest warning that they may be linked to an increased risk of death and injury, federal health advisers said Thursday.
The Food and Drug Administration advisory panel voted in favor of the "black box" warning atter hearing about the deaths of 25 people, includ-
ing 19 children, who had taken the ing
drugs. The vote was $8-7$, with one. abstention.
 Furberg, a professor of public health
sciences at the Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center, said it
