Purcell decides not to appeal after third loss

Tom Purcell, the three-time convicted pheasant hunter, has decided not to appeal his conviction to the 7th Texas Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

County Clerk Sherri Harrison had received a certified letter from Purcell of Roanoke, Texas asking that the \$1000 he posted to appeal his trial from Justice of the Peace Court to County Court be used to pay his \$500 fine and \$186 court costs with the balance be returned to him.

Purcell's letter states "I will need a copy of receipt of the above-mentioned transaction to add to the documentation I will be sending to the Texas State Board of Judicial Conduct in support of the complaint I will soon be filing against (Judge) Cox."

Purcell was found guilty of illegally cleaning a pheasant first by Justice of the Peace Herman Morrison which he appealed and asked for a trial by jury.

The six-person jury found Purcell guilty in less than five minutes and set the maximum fine of \$500 plus costs.

Purcell then appealed to County Court. A six-person jury found him guilty again and County Judge Marilyn Cox fined Purcell the \$500 and \$186 in costs.

In a recent E-mail, Purcell informed the *Journal* he and a friend would be hunting pheasants in Kansas this year.

Council hears complaints

A small group of citizens expressed their views about the Muleshoe Police Department at the Tuesday morning City Council meeting.

Mary Ann Daniel told the council that she came to the council meeting because Mayor Victor Leal had not returned her calls.

Leal disputed her claims. She also told the council she had written to the governor to get help to stop police harassment of some citizens in Muleshoe.

The letter from the Governor's office referred Daniel back to the city to express her "dissatisfaction to the mayor and members of the city council."

Sunny Guzman said that Texas Ranger Dusty McCord and Police Chief Don Carter are "too good of friends" for McCord to effectively investigate the police department.

Guzman said, "Its like having the fox guard the hen house."

McCord recently found the police department not at fault in a incident between the police and Daniel's husband, Luis.

Councilman Juan Chavez told the group he was just one council member, but he suggested the city appoint a citizen's committee to hear and investigate complaints against the police department.

Although there was support in the people who came to complain about the police, there was not much enthusiasm by the council.

Mayor Leal said he didn't believe in too many committees, but people were always welcome to come to the council with their questions and complaints. The council told the group they could get the agenda and bring the request for a police review committee to the council.

In other city business, the council agreed to support the Muleshoe High School Family Community Service Class plans to beautify Muleshoe.

The council told the Texas Migrant Council the City would do the best it could to maintain the streets in front of the office until money was available to pave it.

Max King, Pat Angeley and Mark Morton were reappointed to the Muleshoe Economic Development Board.

Grants from the city's hotel/motel tax funds were granted to Muleshoe Sports Academy for \$3512.67, the Ladies Golf Association tournament for \$3997.15 and \$2230.46 for the Rotary Club Labor Day Roping event.

The council voted for a resolution suspending the Atmos Energy rate increase.

Cubs claw Mules for second district loss

The Mules owned a 15-14 advantage at intermission over the Brownfield Cubs. The two teams swapped interceptions to start the third period but neither team could gain an advantage during the period.

The Cubs took over on downs on their 28 and used a heavy dose of Mason Becker up the middle to put the Mules away. Becker gained 52 of the 72 yards on just six carries in the Cubs' final scoring drive.

Becker was stood up at the goal line on the scoring play and Andrew Cruz hit him in the back and pushed him into the end zone. The two-point conversion pass from Andrew

Sides to Trent Sellers sealed the game for the Cubs at 22-15.

The Mules scored first on a six-yard "hammer" play, by Danny Bonilla and Miguel Nuñez added the PAT. The Mules led 7-0 with 5:31 remaining in the opening period.

Brownfield answered with a 15-yard Sides to Sellers toss. Sellers broke a tackle and raced 40 yards for a 55-yard scoring strike. The PAT failed and the Cubs trailed 7-6.

The Mules were moving the ball down field and picking up yardage in large chunks. Becker ripped the ball away from Landon Sheets and outran the stunned Mules 70 yards.

New fees cause strain for local dry cleaners

Terome and JimElla Clemmons of Lambert Cleaners will be bearing the burden of a new law which adds a fee on the purchase of dry cleaning supplies beginning January 1, 2004.

House Bill 1366, which became law on September 1, 2003, requires that all dry cleaning facilities and dry cleaning drop stations be registered with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). This registration will need to be renewed annually. The registration fee, which can be anywhere from \$250 to \$2500, is determined by the income of the

facility, according to JimElla.

"We will probably have to pay somewhere in the middle," she said. She will not know how much the fee is until October 30, when the TCEQ will send her a bill. The fee will be due before November 30. After the bill is paid, the TCEQ will issue her a registration number which will be required in order to purchase the dry cleaning supplies.

In addition to the registration fee, an extra \$5 per gallon will be added to the purchase of dry cleaning products. For the Clemmons', this translates into an expense of \$1650 every six weeks, as opposed to the \$550 they are

currently spending for supplies.

An extra \$15 per gallon will be added to the price of Perchloroethylene (perch). "We don't use perch," said JimElla. "We use a petroleum solvent instead and it isn't as difficult to clean up."

"What happened is some guy who owns a lot of cleaners spilled the "perch" and it cost a lot of money to clean it up since it is bad for the environment," said Terome. "The TCEQ decided to tax everyone so they can afford to clean up spills in the future."

"The money goes into a "slush" fund," said JimElla.

"If anyone spills the 'perch,' then that money can be used to clean it up."

The other local dry cleaners, Sparkle Cleaners, will not have to pay all of the extra fees because their clothing is sent to Clovis to be cleaned. "They will have to pay an annual fee for having a drop station though," said JimElla.

The Clemmons', who bought out Woodie Lambert in 1983, cannot afford to stay open without raising their prices some.

"I'm trying to do what is right for me and my customers," JimElla said. "We will have to raise most items about 25 to 50 cents but we will still be competitive."

"We [the business] should be OK just raising prices that much," continued JimElla. "We will have

to pay some of the extra cost out of our pockets and pass on some of it to our customers, as much as we hate to do that."

The new prices at Lambert Cleaners took effect on Monday, October 20.

FSA offers assistance

Bailey County livestock producers who have suffered grazing losses caused by natural disasters will find some relief through the Livestock Assistance Program (LAP) offered by the USDA, Farm Service Agency (FSA).

"This program provides additional relief to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses due to severe weather and related causes," said Kim Hanlin, County Executive Director.

The LAP sign-up period ends October 24, 2003.

"LAP is intended to address the needs of producers who were not adequately covered by the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP), but producers cannot receive payments under both programs for the same loss," said Hanlin.

Hanlin added, a producer's LAP payment will be reduced by the amount(s) the producer received under 2002 Cattle Feed Program, Livestock Compensation Program, regardless of whether the LAP payment is for 2001 or 2002.

Authorized by the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, LAP provides \$250 million, nationwide, to livestock producers for grazing losses that occurred in either 2001 or 2002.

Under LAP, a producer's grazing land must be located in a county that was declared a primary disaster area under a Presidential or Secretarial declaration. The county must have been approved after January 1,

2001, and a designation requested no later than February 20, 2003, and subsequently approved. Contiguous counties are not eligible.

For those counties designated as a disaster area for 2001 or 2002, additional LAP eligibility criteria must be met for each year. A county must have experienced an average of 40 percent or greater loss of normal precipitation for four consecutive months during the applicable year and suffered at least a 40 percent grazing loss for three or more consecutive months in a calendar year in order to be eligible for that year. A county may meet eligibility for both 2001 and 2002; however, a producer in that county may receive a LAP payment for only one of the years.

Although LAP is a grazing loss program, payments are based on the lesser of the calculated pasture value or the value of the livestock feed allowance multiplied by the producer's maximum grazing loss. The eligible amount is 50 percent of the loss amount. A producer must have control of adequate grazing land to support the eligible livestock.

During 2001 or 2002, a livestock producer must have suffered a 40 percent or greater loss of grazing production for three or more consecutive months due to drought, hot weather, disease, insect infestation, flood, fire, hurricane, earthquake, severe storm or other natural disasters.

The 2003-2004 influenza season has arrived in several areas in south and southeast Texas. Now is the time to receive your flu vaccination. It takes approximately twenty-one days for the vaccine to take full effect. To be prepared for the holiday season, it would be wise to receive your vaccine as soon as possible. The Center for Disease Control in Atlanta predicts that those people who get the flu this season may become seriously ill. The American Academy of Family Physicians encourages all persons 65 or older to receive their influenza vaccine. The academy advises women who are three to nine months pregnant to receive flu vaccines, and children 6 months to 18 years of age, college students, teachers, nurses, doctors, all medical personnel and employees, nursing home residents, persons with pulmonary conditions,

asthma, diabetes, HIV, and personnel of large and small companies.

Muleshoe area citizens can receive their flu vaccines at their family medical doctor's clinic or at the Muleshoe Outpatient Clinic. Residents of Farwell can go by the Farwell Medical Clinic to receive their flu vaccine. Remember, there may be medical reasons people cannot receive the flu vaccine. Medical personnel will advise everyone about risks before vaccinations.

The flu vaccine is preventive medicine that can prevent those vaccinated from becoming seriously ill. Those interested may still get the flu or have flu like symptoms, but the risk of becoming seriously ill or hospitalized is greatly reduced. Please take advantage of this opportunity and get the flu vaccine in the next two-three weeks.

Four athletes anticipate World Championships

USA Gymnastics Trampoline and Tumbling hosted its last team trial for the World Championships to be held in Hannover, Germany at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. recently.

Four athletes from the Acrospirit team that trains at Muleshoe Sports Academy attended the competition, making the USA Team. 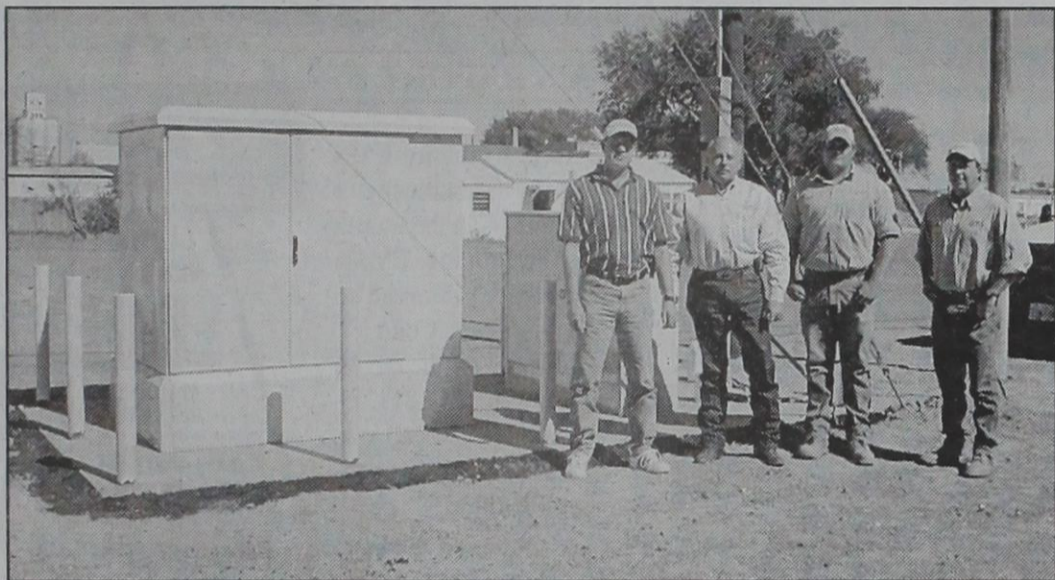

JV Mules preserve winning streak

The JV Mules extended their winning streak to seven by dumping their counterpart from Brownfield 33-8. The win moves the Mules to a 7-0 season and 2-0 in district.

Against the Cubs of Brownfield, the Mules rushed for 331 yards and Logan Caddell completed five-of-nine passes for another 119. The 450-yard total is the best offensive night of the year for the Mules.

Jarad Flores got the call 20 times and rushed for 241 yards and three TDs. Ely Villa had two receptions for 75 yards and Garrett Behrends added 20 yards with one catch.

Erwin Lewis, an inside line backer, had six solo tackles; one special team tackle, caused a fumble and intercepted a pass for the Mule defense. Myles James had four solo tackles, one assist, a fumble recovery and an interception.

James' fumble recovery came early in the first period to give the Mules possession at mid-field. Flores got the call and raced off tackle for 50 yards to give the Mules a 6-0 lead with 8:12 remaining

in the first period.

On the ensuing kick, the Mules tried an on-side kick. A Cub scooped up the ball and raced 50 yards for a TD that briefly gave Brownfield an 8-6 advantage.

The Cubs drove from their 34 to the Mules' 41. Pedro Bustillos broke through to put pressure on the Cub passer and allow Cody Clark to plow him under for a one-yard loss. The play by Bustillos and Clark forced the Cubs to give up the ball on downs.

The Mules marched from their 40 to the Cub 39. Caddell connected with Ely Villa running a fly pattern for a 34-yard gain. Caleb Heinrich started off tackle and broke outside for the final five yards and a TD. Heinrich also scored the two-point conversion to put the Mules on top to stay.

Lewis' interception came with eight minutes left in the first half. Facing fourth and 11 on the Cub 34, Caddell rolled out and delivered a strike as he was hit. Behrends went high in the air to pull in the ball to give the Mules a first down on the Cub 16.

Flores plunged in for the final four yards to give the

Mules a 20-8 lead at intermission. Neither team could score in the third period but early in the final frame Caddell found Villa open for a 10-yard toss. Villa caught the ball on the Cub 10 and sprinted into the end zone.

The Mules' final score came on a 90-yard dash by Flores and he added the PAT kick. The Mules will have no game this week because Dimmitt does not have a team. The Mules return to action when they host the Lubbock Cooper Pirates in two weeks.

Freshman Mules down Cubs

The Freshman Mules caged the Brownfield Cubs 30-6 to keep their district record spotless through two games. The Mules seem to be slow starters and it only took the Cubs five plays to jump in front of the Mules 6-0.

The Cubs threatened to score again near the end of the first period. D.J. Robertson chased down a breakaway Cub on the Mule three-yard line to save a TD. The Cubs picked up a yard on first down before Robert Garza and Chance Garrett held them for no gain on second down.

Following an incomplete pass on third down, the Brownfield quarterback rolled right on an option play only needing two yards for a touchdown. Eric Washington raced from his inside line-backer position to drop the quarterback for a three-yard

loss.

The Mules strung together an 11-play, 95-yard drive to tie the game at 6-6 with just over six minutes left in the first half. Tony Guzman and Robertson provided most of the punch on the ground. Robertson hooked up with Dustin Barker for an 11-yard toss to keep the Cubs off balance. Washington picked up the final 22 yards on a quick hitter up the middle.

The Mule defense stalled a Cub drive with Matthew Richards and T.J. Brantley crashing in to set the Cubs back four yards. Guzman blitzed on two passing downs to sack the quarterback for losses of 10 and nine yards.

The Mules took over on downs on the Brownfield 49. Robertson found Barker open over the middle for a seven-yard catch. Barker outraced the Cubs to paydirt and Guzman carried in the two-point conversion to put

the Mules on top 14-6 at intermission.

The Cubs' opening drive of the second half ran out of gas on the Mule five. Guzman took a pitch from Robertson around the end and broke three tackles as he raced 95 yards for a touchdown. Guzman added the two-point conversion.

The Mules' final tally came after forcing the Cubs to give up the ball on downs on the Mule 40. The Mules faked a punt and Robertson found Barker open for a 35-yard gain to keep the Mule drive alive.

Washington blasted up the middle for the final 20 yards and Timothy Conner carried in the two-point conversion to end all scoring.

The Mules will have a rematch with Lubbock Christian High School's junior varsity team following the Muleshoe Junior High games Thursday night.

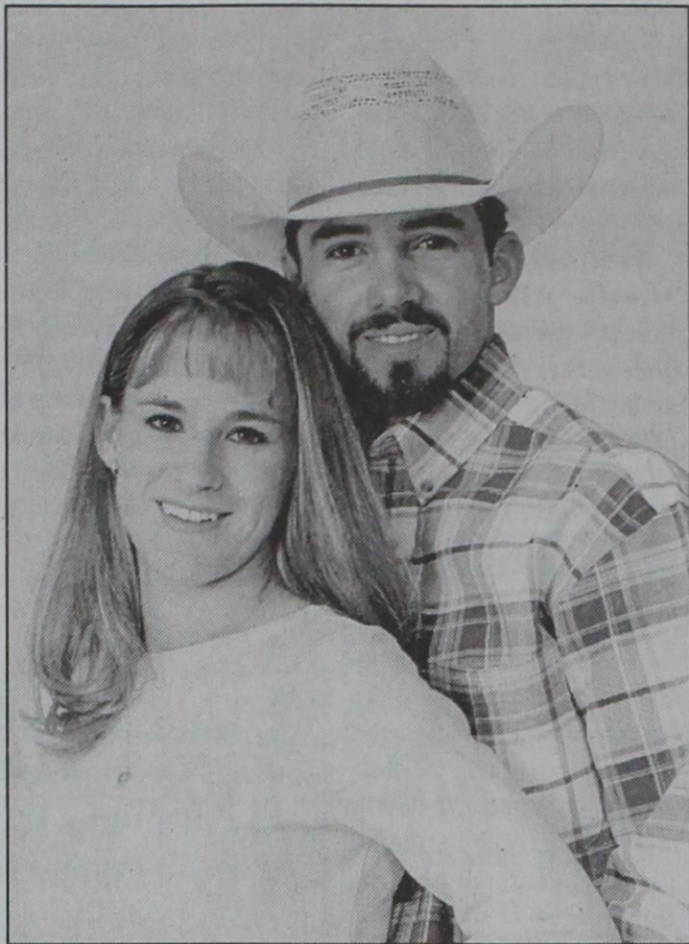

2004 ELECTION AND REFERENDUM: Voting Region Two

Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) will be conducting a referendum on the assessment of corn silage during the 2004 Biennial Election. Eligible voters will decide if an assessment of \$.037 per ton of silage, which is produced and sold in Texas, would be collected and submitted to the Texas Corn Producers Board. (This is based on \$.005 per bushel dry corn kernels with the factor for corn silage being equal to 7.94 bushels of dry corn kernels per ton of silage. This amount is based on factors that can be used by the Farm Service Agency when production has not been proven on a farm.)

According to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter A, Section 41.034, a person is eligible to vote in the referendum if he or she is, or for at least one production period preceding the date of the referendum, has been a producer of the commodity whose production occurs within the area described in the petition. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers, in which, this person would be required under the referendum to pay the assessment.

The purpose of our 2004 biennial election, which concentrates on three of its five regions, is to elect five new TCPB board members whose current members' seats have expired. There are a total of fifteen TCPB voting board members. These elections will be conducted in 58 Texas counties while the referendum on corn silage will be held in all

counties statewide. This referendum does not alter the assessment currently in place for dry corn kernels in Texas. Both proceedings are held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agricultural Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter A, Section 41.032.

In reference to the 2004 election, Voting Region Two consists of Andrews, Archer, Armstrong, Bailey, Baylor, Borden, Briscoe, Castro, Callahan, Childress, Clay, Cochran, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Hockley, Howard, Jack, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Mitchell, Motley, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Parmer, Randall, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Swisher, Taylor, Terry, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, Yoakum, and Young counties; and there are Three Seats open for election of TCPB board members in Voting Region Two.

A person is eligible to vote in the board election if he or she is, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of the board election has been a producer of, or caused to be produced, corn for commercial purposes. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers, if the person would be required to pay the assessment. For a producer to vote in this voting region and for this TCPB seat, such producer must reside within the counties stated above.

Any eligible voter-producer as defined above may place his

or her name in nomination to serve as a director on the TCPB. Nomination applications must be submitted to the TCPB signed by the applicant and ten other eligible voters.

Nomination forms will be available in all 58 counties where elections are to be held or can be obtained by writing TCPB, 4205 North I-27, Lubbock, Texas 79403. Please state your county of residence if you request a nomination form in writing. Nomination forms will be available November 4, 2003 and must be filed with the TCPB no later than December 19, 2003.

The election in three voting regions will be held by mail ballot along with the referendum question on the assessment of corn silage. Producers from all five regions are eligible to vote on this referendum of corn silage, which will be held statewide by mail ballot. As for the election, ballots containing the nominations of all persons who have validly filed petitions under Section 41.025 of the above state code will be available December 31, 2003. Ballots will be available at grain elevators in each of the appropriate voting regions, county agent offices in each of the 58 counties where elections are to occur, or by writing TCPB at the address stated above. For a ballot to be counted, such ballot must be postmarked no later than January 12, 2004. A voter must reside within a county contained within the voting region that the voter is casting his or her vote and a voter must meet the definition set forth above as a qualified voter. Voters may also vote for board members by "writing in" the name of any eligible persons.

Texas Corn Producers Board is

certified under Section 41.011 and Section 41.012 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this election and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture.
