AUSTIN (AP) - Veteran newsman Walter Cronkite was honored Tuesday with a moon rock from NASA in recognition of his decades covering the space program.

Cronkite, who anchored the CBS Evening News from 1962 until his retirement in 1981, is the first non-astronaut and only non-NASA individual to receive the Ambassador of Exploration Award.



NATION **U.S. House approves** coin to honor Braille

WASHINGTON (AP) - Louis Braille, the inventor of the most widely used reading and writing method for the blind, will be featured on a commemorative U.S. silver dollar.

Under a House bill passed by voice vote Tuesday, the U.S. Mint will issue 400.000 silver dollars commemorating Braille in 2009, the bicentennial of his birth. Funds raised from a \$10 surcharge will go to the National Federation of the Blind to promote Braille literacy.

"Blind people today would be far less likely to achieve the goals of independence and productive living without the positive contribution of Louis Braille," said Rep. Bob Ney, R-Ohio, a co-sponsor of the bill.

WORLD Inmate killed in Afghan prison riot

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) - A spasm of violence broke a fragile truce at Kabul's main prison Tuesday as rioting inmates tried to push down a gate and police fired on them, killing one and wounding three, officials said.

Outside the jail, women beat the ground as their children wailed, fearful that loved ones in the facility have been killed in the three-day standoff.

"Oh, my son, are you alive?" cried 60year-old Zubaida Gul.

At least five inmates have been killed and 41 wounded since the uprising began late Saturday.

The prisoners have made a range of demands, including a general amnesty for an unspecified number of inmates.

One of three new starters in the Texas Rangers' rotation this spring, Eaton is eager for the chance to prove that while his strained middle finger wasn't.

Before injuring the finger on his pitching hand June 15 in his first loss in two months and shortest start all season, the right-hander was 9-1 with a 3.18 ERA for San Diego. Eaton twice went on the disabled list after that, was 2-4 in his last nine starts and didn't pitch for the Padres in the playoffs.

"You don't want to show it as `well, that was just two months of freakish stuff as opposed to two months of what he's going to do for the rest of his career,' " the former first-round draft pick said. "And I see strides, just in the 'pens and stuff that those days are coming closer to fruition again."
