Skilling says he and Lay never broke laws

HOUSTON (AP) — Former Enron Corp. Chief Executive Jeffrey Skilling spoke up Wednesday for company founder Kenneth Lay in his third day on the witness stand in the pair's fraud and conspiracy trial, saying they were a "good team" that committed no crimes.

Even though most counts pending against him and Lay allege crimes that occurred at different times before Enron crashed in scandal in December 2001, an erarching conspiracy count alleges they participated in a sprawling effort to portray Enron as strong when they knew accounting tricks hid bad news and weak ventures.

Outside of court, Skilling's lawyer, Daniel Petrocelli, said he expects to finish initial questioning of Skilling on Thursday.

Smithsonian to spotlight Star-Spangled Banner

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American flag that "so proudly we hail'd," the inspiration for the Star-Spangled Banner, will be the focal point of an \$85 million renovation at the National Museum of American History.

It was on Sept. 14, 1814, that Francis Scott Key peered through the smoke surrounding Baltimore's Fort McHenry after a 25-hour British bombardment and saw the huge American flag was still flying.

The museum will close Sept. 5 and reopen in the summer of 2008 with a new flag room for displaying the historic 15-star

Iran vows to ramp up uranium enrichment

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran intends to enrich uranium on a scale hundreds of times larger than its current level, the country's deputy nuclear chief said Wednesday, signaling its resolve to expand a program the international community insists it halt.

President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad said Tuesday that Iran for the first time had succeeded on a small scale in enriching uranium, a key step in generating fuel for a reactor or fissile material for a bomb. The U.N. Security Council has demanded that Iran stop all enrichment activity because of suspicions the program's aim is to make

Saeedi said Iran has informed the International Atomic Energy Agency that it plans to install 3,000 centrifuges.

Fat food fast: Two chains are fattier in U.S.

(AP) — The great virtue — or perhaps the great drawback — of McDonald's and KFC is that the food is pretty much the same all over the world. But a new study suggests the fries and the chicken served in the United States may have more artery-clogging trans fats.

The chief reason, the researchers say, is the type of frying oil used: partially hydrogenated vegetable oil, which is high in trans fats.

A Danish study of the fast-food chains' products around the world found remarkably wide variations in trans fat content from country to country, from city to city within the same nation, and from restaurant to restaurant in the same city.

At a New York City McDonald's, a large fries-and-chicken-nuggets combo was found to contain 10.2 grams of the trans fat, compared with 0.33 grams in Denmark and about 3 grams in Spain, Russia and the Czech

At KFCs in Poland and Hungary, a large hot wings-and-fries order had 19 grams of trans fats or more, versus 5.5 grams for wings

ALTERNATIVES TO TRANS FAT

Food companies are looking into several options for replacing trans fat. Almost any fat is better than trans fat, so anything is a start, but some options are still better than others.

- Butter and animal fat: Still high in satu-

rated fat and cholesterol. Coconut and palm oils: Still more conducive to heart disease than vegetable oils rich in mono- and polyunsaturated fats.

Fully hydrogenated vegetable oil: Semi-soft fat that is trans free and can be used for margarines, baking and other types of cooking.

Traditional liquid vegetable oils: One of the healthiest alternatives, these spoil and don't have as long of a shelf life. - Fat substitutes: Some companies are us-

ing corn, soy or oat fiber to make products that taste and feel like fat to the mouth, but act like a fiber for the body.

Later, the judge rejected prosecutors' request to display a running presentation of the names and photos of nearly all the 2,972 victims of Sept. 11. Prosecutors were instead allowed to show one large poster with the pictures of all but 92 of the victims.

Moussaoui pleaded guilty last year to conspiring with al-Qaida to fly planes into U.S. buildings. A week ago, the jurors ruled him eligible for the death penalty even though he was in jail in Minnesota on 9/11. They decided that lies he told federal agents a month before the attacks led directly to at least one death that day by keeping agents from identifying and stopping some of the hijackers. Now they must decide whether he deserves execution or







Former Texas Tech student sentenced to 10 years in largest child pornography case yet by Cyber Crimes

federal prison on Friday after the Cyber Crimes Unit allegedly found a large amount of child pornography on his computer, police officials said.

Investigators found 13,664 sexually explicit images and videos of child pornography on 23-year-old Cole Cosby's computer, making it the largest child pornography case ever investigated by the Cyber Crimes Unit, a division of the Texas Attorney General's Office, Laurie Saathoff, a spokesperson for the office said.

The images and videos included children involved in sexual

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott issued a news release describing the efforts of the Cyber Crimes unit to crack down on child pornography.

"Stockpiling child pornography is a child sex crime that will not be tolerated in Texas," Abbott said in the news release. "The case against Cole Cosby is one of most disturbing cases ever investigated by my Cyber Crimes Unit. We will continue our vigorous pursuit of these offenders, and I am deeply grateful to the state and federal authorities who worked to bring this man to justice. I am pleased he will spend a long time behind bars for his despicable actions."

Saathoff said the former Tech student must register as a sex offender and serve 20 years of supervised release after his term is

completed. Cosby is banned from dating anyone under the age of 18 without approval of federal probation officers.

According to the news release, the U.S. Attorney's Office A former Texas Tech student was sentenced to 10 years in and prosecutors from the Cyber Crimes Unit worked together to obtain the maximum sentence possible for the former Tech student after he pled guilty to one count of possession of child

The unit has made 76 arrests of online predators and obtained 39 convictions of men since Abbott took office in December

Casts cast off modern medicine

CHICAGO (AP) - The black Velcro bandage strapped on 3-year-old Ben Crotty's left arm looks like a Rollerblader's wrist guard, but it's really a mini medical

It's today's answer to the cast.

Once almost a childhood rite of passage, plaster or fiberglass casts were the method of choice for fixing broken bones. But now, doctors around the world are increasingly shunning cumbersome casts in favor of more cutting-edge options for both kids and adults: splints, special boots, metal plates, rods and

For Ben Crotty's broken wrist, it was a removable splint.

The trend is most common among adults, who often develop swelling and pain and sometimes permanent stiffness. "We often refer to this as 'cast disease.' I say, 'Good riddance!" said Dr. John Fernandez, an or-

Support for the modern technique on kids was bolstered by a Canadian study last month in the journal Pediatrics. It showed that in children aged 6 to 15 with wrist fractures like Ben's, those who wore removable splints for three weeks had better physical function during treatment and afterward than those treated with plaster casts.

The splinted kids also escaped cast-related problems: Four youngsters sought emergency room treatment for wet casts and one for removing a pencil placed under the cast.

As an ER doctor at Chicago's Children's Memorial Hospital, Steve Crotty, Ben's dad, is all too familiar with some of casts' nastier complications.

Casts that aren't waterproof can get moldy, and Crotty said he's "seen maggots crawling out of casts" that kids got wet.

So when Ben's doctor offered a splint as an alternative, his dad readily accepted.

"This is nice because he can take a bath and we just take it off," Crotty said.

Ben broke his wrist in mid-March when he

tumbled down the family's stairs. "I fell down and I hurt myself, and I cried

and I cried and I cried," Ben explained. Some physicians still hesitate to put splints

Ben said he didn't like his splint "because

7, three weeks after his injury. Advances in splints have revolutionized treatment of wrist fractures in the past few years, Fernandez said.

Ben's splint was removed for good on April

"Splints now are custom-molded to the body with thermoplastic material allowing a custom fit to immobilize and support without the constriction of the cast," Fernandez said. "These are not the 'off-the-rack' splints you buy at the pharmacy," he said. They're "more like a custom-tailored suit."

For some kids, though, casts are still

Sarah Bond, 11, a suburban Chicago fifth-grader, suffered the same kind of injury as Ben during a recent basketball game and was offered a splint, but she chose a pink fiberglass cast instead.

"It's fun to have a cast because your friends get to sign it," Bond said.

The cool factor is much bigger in kids, and the look on their faces when you say they don't need a cast is pretty bad," said Dr. Matthew Bueche, a pediatrician at Naperville's Edward Hospital.

Dr. Stuart Hirsch, an orthopedic surgeon in Bridgewater, N.J., says he gets around that disappointment by offering kids a white sock-like device that fits over splints and can be written on with a felt-tipped pen, telling patients to have their friends sign that.







New Orleans wastes a big green opportunity

Every day, trucks rumble down Gentilly Landfill, a municipal dump in the swampiest part of piled up on the curbs throughout New Orleans.

With large-scale home demolitions now beginning, there are no comprehensive, citywide plans to salvage and recycle building materials — things such as cypress and cedar boards, bricks, cinderblocks and roof tiles.

"We don't have the time,"

said John Rogers, the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality's recycling specialist. He cited the sheer volume of debris created by Katrina — 30 years' worth of the stuff,

officials say.

But environmentalists say that in the seven months since Katrina hit, there has been plenty of time for city, state and Federal Emergency Management Agency officials to draw up contracts to recycle debris, buy recycling equipment and put people to work sorting through the rubble.

"I'm getting woken up every hauling off cedar beams, good stuff," complained Oliver Houck, a Tulane University environmental law professor. "Once again, we're a day late, a dollar short."

Katrina generated about 25 leaves, dead bushes - or enough to fill the Louisiana Superdome nearly twice. Some of that is being incinerated, and some is being used as cover at landfills.

In the Ninth Ward, a nonprofit recycling center called the Green Project is bustling these days, selling cut-rate lumber, furniture, lamps and other material taken from demolished homes and debris piles.

Doors have become hot commodities, said Sean Wilkerson, a morning with demolition crews 33-year-old donor who drove up with a load of wooden doors he had picked up on the streets. "All the doors (in the city) were kicked down by pet rescuers. Everybody's looking for doors."

As landfills grow higher, environmillion cubic yards of "green mentalists worry that Louisiana is waste" — tree limbs, trunks, creating new problems for itself.
