Border checkpoint to open in Laredo

LAREDO (AP) — U.S. Border Patrol Chief David Aguilar and other dignitaries were to be at the grand opening Friday of the largest of U.S. Customs and Border Protection's 39 inland southern border checkpoints to date.

The six-lane, \$15.5 million station will be located 29 miles north of the border on Interstate 35. It will replace the current station, which is 15 miles inland and was built in 1988

Rosa Nelly Hernandez, assistant chief patrol agent in Laredo, said the old checkpoint is too small to accommodate the increasing volume of traffic from Laredo, which borders Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, and is the largest inland checkpoint in the

NATION Sobriety drug wins federal approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — A once-amonth injection to treat alcoholism won federal approval Thursday, expanding availability of a drug previously sold only in daily pill form.

The Food and Drug Administration approved Vivitrol, spokeswoman Laura Alvey said. Cambridge, Mass.-based Alkermes Inc. will make the injectable form of the drug, also known as naltrexone. Cephalon Inc., of Frazer, Pa., will market and sell it.

The companies hope monthly injections of the drug, to be administered at a doctor's office, will prove an easier regimen for alcoholics to follow than the daily pill. The drug is to be used in conjunction with counseling or group therapy.

Pakistani forces kill al-Qaida terrorist

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — An al-Qaida member wanted for his suspected role in the bombings of U.S. embassies in East Africa was killed by Pakistani forces in a raid near the Afghan border, a Pakistani Cabinet minister said Thursday.

Egyptian Mohsin Musa Matawalli Atwah, 45, who was on the FBI's list of most-wanted terrorists, was killed along with at least six other militants in a raid led by helicopter gunships late Wednesday in the remote North Waziristan village of Naghar Kalai, near the Afghan border, the minister said on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the situation.

Military reports from the field indicated that Atwah had been killed in the attack, along with the militants.

Health insurance program for children seeing drastically declining enrollment

exas' Children's Health Insurance Program, better known as CHIP, has seen dropping enrollment in figures so drastic that a spokesperson for the Texas Health and Human Services Commission estimated the program has shed 30,000 children since Dec.1.

The insurance program stands as the Lone Star State's health insurance program for children whose families' incomes are dually too high to qualify for Medicaid and too low to afford private health insurance coverage, said Gail Randall of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. The friend, John Sean Adams, 24, met the first officer at the house.

When they went inside, Adams stopped halfway down the basement steps and yelled, "They're all dead! All six of them are dead!" the affidavit stated.

Police found several bodies wrapped in sheets and blankets and piled on the basement floor, one of them with obvious head wounds, according to the affidavit. One body was at the bottom of the steps wrapped in a comforter secured with a phone cord. The affidavit also described blood in the rooms and bone fragments.

Police searched the property for fingerprints, weapons, a hammer and phone cord, as well as anything wrapped around the victims' necks.


Another member of the band, who keeps a job at Berklee is Dennard. He started playing the drums at a young age and has a resume that reads like the guest list at the Grammy's.
