Lubbock man indicted for mother's murder

A Lubbock man was indicted by a Lubbock Grand Jury for the murder of his 57-year-old mother.

John Thornton, 33, was arrested April 30 for stabbing his mother multiple times.

Police found Glenda Williams Thornton, 57, on her bedroom floor with numerous stab wounds.

Police initially responded to a call from Glenda Thornton's son, John. He said two men had broken into his home at 3707 East Fourth St. and murdered his mother during a burglary attempt.

Throughout the course of questioning John Thornton, police gained enough evidence to arrest him for the murder of his mother.

He is charged with one count of murder. The maximum penalty for the charge is life in prison and a possible \$10,000 fine.

Lubbock PD rescues baby, arrests suspect

Lubbock Police rescued a kidnapped four-day old baby after she was missing for less than 30 hours.

Police arrested 33-year-old Stephanie Lynn Anderson Jones, who claimed to be a nurse at University Medical Center named Lisa Stewart, for the kidnapping, and she is being charged with kidnapping an infant.

Priscilla Nicole Maldonado is back in her mother's care after a detailed investigation by police found the baby in a car seat underneath a car port at Savoy Condominiums in the 300 block of Detroit around 7:30 p.m. Monday. Police said she had been in the heated car for 30 to 60 minutes before she was rescued, but she did not suffer any injuries.

It all started when police received a tip from Amarillo stating Jones was a possible suspect.

Sgt. Scott Farmer of the Lubbock Police Department said they had been flooded with tips and phone calls from throughout the nation. Once they found a few leads that developed into one, police decided to pursue Jones.

Farmer said they decided to ask Jones and her husband a few questions concerning the baby abduction.

After several answers from Jones and her husband that did not line up, Jones finally gave in and drove the police to where the baby was.

"She kept trying to lie to us, saying

she did not know where the baby was," Farmer said. "Fortunately for us, she was not a good liar."

He said they finally found the baby in the car at the Savoy apartments and were worried she was

injured in the hot weather, which was around 104 degrees when the baby was found.

"When our officers arrived, they were worried. The baby was not moving," Farmer said. "One officer picked her up and rushed her to his car and placed her in front of the air conditioner."

He said once the baby began to move around again, the officers were extremely relieved.

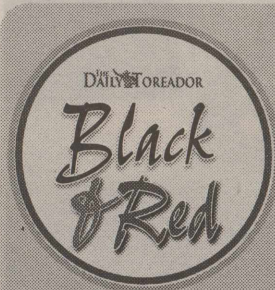
Lubbock Police proceeded to inform Erica Ysasaga, the baby's mother, her newborn child was found and in good health. The Amber Alert was canceled shortly after 8 p.m. Monday.

"The family was ecstatic," Farmer said. "They were so happy to have the baby back in their arms."

Police believe Jones' husband was not involved and have not charged him with anything.

Police said Jones' motive was simple. "She wanted a baby and felt this was the way to obtain one," Farmer said.

Hookah smoke settles in Lubbock

Josh Bidwell sat sandwiched among five girls gathered around two pipes with two-foot arms and curves like Mulholland Drive. Of the six college students, who represented various schools from Texas State to Baylor, only two didn't have virgin lungs when it came to the newest trend in College Town, USA.

Hookah, which has been around for hundreds of years, has been washing over every college town from Austin to Eugene, Ore. Hookah bars have popped up on in most cities in Texas from San Antonio to Dallas, and, as of early May, Lubbock.

After taking his first puff of the hookah pipe, Bidwell sits back and passes the arm to the next in line.

"I think I'm going to stick with

cigars, but I like it," he said.

The House of Hookah bar in Lubbock lives its life from around 11p.m. to a little after 1 a.m., owner Daniel Lloyd said.

Lloyd, a junior technical engineering major from San Antonio, waits with two of his employees in the back of the bar, puffing on an arm from one of the pipes. He is young, but not in the experience kind of way. He is barely able to buy a stiff drink at a bar, but already owns his own.

"It was kind of a spontaneous thing," he said. "I'm from San Antonio where there're a lot of hookah bars, and I wanted to bring the idea to Lubbock."

Hookah, as Lloyd described it, is a water pipe for smoking flavored tobacco. The difference between puffing on a two-foot arm of smoke and a three-inch stick of it is less nicotine and less tar. Lloyd said there is only .05 percent nicotine

in hookah tobacco, so it does not have the after taste or cling to clothing, as cigarettes tend to do.

"I don't know how well the trend will keep up," Lloyd said.

The America public is a fickle one, he said, so there is always a chance college students will turn away from the flavored tobacco experience for something else two months from now. But, considering the practice has been around for a few hundred years, Lloyd will take another gamble in August and open a second hookah bar in Lubbock.

Unlike the New Orleans jazz feel of his current bar, the new one will lean more towards the traditional far-Eastern style of decoration and feel, and it will be a lot closer to the Texas Tech campus.

His current bar is on Buddy Holly Avenue in the Depot Entertainment District, but Lloyd is aiming for a place within a block

of the Tech campus when he opens his second bar.

Megan Laing, a student from Baylor, said the Lubbock hookah bar is not the first one she has been to, and she keeps coming back because of the price and the

product. "We like it because it's not harmful like cigarettes and it has flavor," she said. "I like to go with my friends; it's something to do that is a little cheaper."

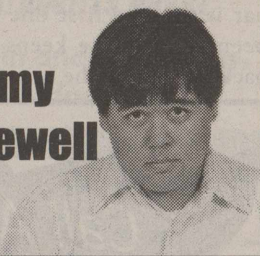


Northern neighbor now a threat

Lubbock man confesses to killing Rogers

A reported confession by a Lubbock man already accused of murder may solve a two-year case of a missing Lubbock teenager.

Joanna Rogers had been missing since May 4, 2004. She was 16 years old at the time of her disappearance. Her parents last saw her after coming home from a day's work at Subway on 82nd Street and Akron Avenue. The next day, her parents entered her bedroom to find Joanna missing. She left no evidence of where she went. Her keys and purse were left in her room, which appeared untouched without a trace of forcible entry, according to Sheriff Detectives.

On Wednesday, reports indicate Joanna's parents were informed of a confession by Rosendo Rodriguez III. He claimed to be the one who abducted and murdered Rogers. Reports claim Rogers' body can be found in a suitcase in the Lubbock landfill.

Chief Deputy Paul Scarborough of the Lubbock Sheriff's Office said this new information will be used for further investigation.

"We have been and will continue to investigate any and all information that comes into our office," Scarborough said. "The next step is to see where this new information leads us."

He added he could not get into the specifics of this case because it is an ongoing case, and a gag order prevents law enforcement from giving out any information to media outlets.

This confession comes at a time when Rodriguez was negotiating a plea bargain with Lubbock District Attorneys. The plea bargain could mean Rodriguez would receive less jail time in return for his confession.

The District Attorney's office declined to comment on the case.

Rodriguez has been in jail since September when he was arrested for the murder of a Lubbock woman. Twenty-five-year-old Rodriguez is accused of killing Summer Baldwin in September,

then placing her remains in a suitcase and dumping it at a landfill north of Lubbock, according to reports. Baldwin was pregnant at the time.

Police were able to link Rodriguez to Baldwin's murder through the barcodes of the suitcase. The barcodes matched a purchase by Rodriguez at a local Wal-Mart store, along with a purchase of latex gloves.

In December, police named Rodriguez as a suspect in the disappearance of Rogers.

The link between Rodriguez and Rogers went public during Rodriguez's bond reduction hearing in late December, according to reports. Lubbock Sheriff's Office said during Rodriguez's bond reduction hearing, a Lubbock police officer was being interrogated on the stand, and mentioned a link between Rogers and Rodriguez through each others' computers.

Tech, CCCCD ink deal to help prospective Raiders

Prospective students, who are looking for a higher education at Texas Tech but are not quite ready for the leap to the university level, will now have an alternative option to earn credit at Tech while attending a community college.

Enter the Red Raider Bound program, a consecutive admission agreement between the Collin County Community College District and Tech, allowing eligible students to receive course credit, while guaranteeing those students admission into the university.

Tech President Jon Whitmore said Red Raider Bound advising helps the student transfer into a proper program with the needed amount of credits.

"We have a very good record of transferring community college students to Tech," he said.

Whitmore said students who meet the proper criteria would be concur-

rently admitted into Collin County and Tech. After finishing their term at Collin County and successfully completing the appropriate courses, those transfer students will not have to reapply to the university.

According to a Collin County Community College Press Release, students in the program will have the guidance of a Tech counselor to make sure the transferring of the students' credits will be flawless and the university will guarantee students the opportunity to attend the earliest orientation and registration for summer and/or fall classes.

Whitmore said the program is mostly a way to streamline students who qualify to Tech, but they can remain within their community before they are ready to attend the university.

"Our goal at Texas Tech University is to encourage successful community college students to attend Texas Tech," Whitmore said. "It's more of a way to facilitate a connection within the schools."

U.S. airstrike kills most-wanted al-Qaida terrorist al-Zarqawi

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Abu Musab al-Zarqawi, al-Qaida's leader in Iraq who led a bloody campaign of suicide bombings and kidnappings, has been killed in an air strike, U.S. and Iraqi officials said Thursday, adding that his identity was confirmed by fingerprints and a look at his face. It was a major victory in the U.S.-led war in Iraq and the broader war on terror.

Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki said al-Zarqawi was killed along with seven aides

Wednesday evening in a remote area 30 miles northeast of Baghdad in the volatile province of Diyala, just east of the provincial capital of Baqouba, al-Maliki said.

Loud applause broke out among the report-

ers and soldiers as al-Maliki, flanked by U.S. Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad and U.S. Gen. George Casey, the top U.S. commander in Iraq, told a news conference that "al-Zarqawi was eliminated."

Big 12 names new championship sites

The Big 12 Conference announced Monday that San Antonio and Kansas City, Mo., will host the conference football championship and men's and women's basketball conference tournaments.

San Antonio will host the 2007 Big 12 Football Championship at the Alamodome. In 2008, Kansas City will host the men's tournament at the Sprint Center, which is scheduled to open during the fall of 2007, and the women's tournament will be hosted at Municipal Auditorium.

It will be the third time the Big 12 Dr. Pepper Football Championship are to be played in San Antonio and the eighth time for the Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Championships returning for Kansas City.

Big 12 Conference Commissioner Kevin Weiberg said in a media teleconference that both San Antonio and Kansas City are applicable sites to hold these major events.

"San Antonio has served as an outstanding site for our previous two occasions when we have been there," Weiberg said. "The city does a tremendous job of major events. They have a state-of-the-art domed facility. We very much look forward to be in San

Antonio for 2007 for football.

"We're also excited to be back in Kansas City for the men's and women's basketball championships and in particular, in the inaugural year of the new Sprint Center in Kansas City."

San Antonio previously hosted the football conference championships for the '97-'98 season and again in '99-00.

Kansas City hosted the first six seasons of the Big 12 men's and women's basketball tournaments from 1996 through 2002, and most recently for the 2004-05.

"Kansas City has been a very important host for Big 12 championships over the years," the

Big 12 commissioner said. "In fact, it has hosted more of our major events than any other city in our region."

The 2006 football conference championship is devoted to Kansas City, Mo., at Arrowhead Stadium, while Oklahoma City is to host the 2006-2007 basketball championships for the first time.

Currently, the Big 12 has not decided on any future sites for the two sports.

Weiberg did mention interest in using the new Dallas Cowboys stadium, after its completion, as a prospective site, but no negotiations have been made.

Five players were selected on day two of the draft including pitcher Josh Tomlin (Cleveland), Joey Calendar (Tampa Bay) and basketball standout Jon Plefka (Los Angeles Angels).

It is not known whether any of the juniors, Plefka, Odom and Tomlin will accept contracts from the team that selected them.

Bobby Evers jump of 23'-10.75" in the long jump was good enough for an 18th place finish, but he missed qualifying for finals in the event.

Lacy Wilson came in 15th place in the prelims of the high jump. She cleared

5'-9.75" and missed the cut for the final round.

Events resumed Thursday and will continue through Saturday with CBS coverage on Cox Channel 7.
