Alberto prompts evacuation on Fla. coast

CEDAR KEY, Fla. (AP) — More than 20,000 people along Florida's Gulf Coast were ordered to clear out Monday as Alberto — the very first tropical storm of the new hurricane season — unexpectedly picked up steam and threatened to come ashore as a hurricane.

Forecasters posted a hurricane warning for the Gulf Coast and a tropical storm warning from north of Daytona Beach to the Georgia-South Carolina line, saying the storm could hit on Tuesday morning. Gov. Jeb Bush signed a declaration of emergency allowing him to call up the National Guard and put laws against price gouging in place.

"We're talking about powerful forces of nature," Bush said. "People need to take this very seriously."

If Alberto came ashore as a hurricane, it would be the earliest hurricane in 40 years to hit the United States, according to the National Hurricane Center. The earliest on record is Alma, which in 1966 hit the Florida Panhandle on June 9 — the ninth day of the

hurricane season.

The tropical depression that produced Alberto formed on Saturday, nine days after the June 1 start of the season. Forecasters over the weekend were confident it would not become a hurricane.

But the storm's winds accelerated with startling speed from 50 mph to 70 mph in just three hours Monday. The minimum wind speed for a hurricane is 74 mph. Forecasters said Alberto could become a weak Category 1 hurricane, which means winds of 74 mph to 95 mph.

"We were surprised, but we've been surprised before," hurricane specialist Richard Pasch said. "The center in disorganized storms can re-form and jump. We try to tell emergency management officials that storms can be stronger by one category than what we predicted."

At 4 p.m. Monday, Alberto was centered about 145 miles southwest of Cedar Key and was moving northeast at about 10 mph. Its top sustained winds remained at 70 mph.

Passenger detained following threat

DALLAS (AP) — Authorities detained a passenger accused of making a threat on a Southwest Airlines flight from Albuquerque, N.M., to Dallas Sunday night, an airline spokeswoman said.

Brandy King, a spokeswoman for Southwest, said authorities searched the plane after it landed at Dallas Love Field and found nothing.

King said the threat was made on Flight 45, which carried 137 passengers. She said the plane arrived on time.

Logan Williams, who was on the flight, told Dallas-Fort Worth television station KTVT that a man sitting about four rows away from him said there was a bomb on board a short time before the plane began its final approach to Dallas.

Justices OK lethal injection challenges

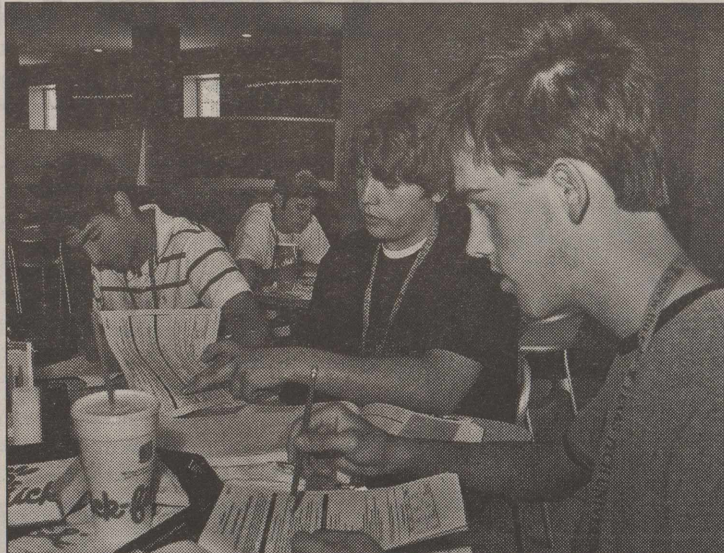
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court made it easier Monday for death row inmates to contest the lethal injections used across the country for executions and to get DNA evidence before judges in a pair of rulings that hinted at fresh caution on capital punishment.

The decisions, both written by moderate Justice Anthony M. Kennedy, ease the rules for longtime prisoners to get their cases back into court and could add years to their appeals.

"Today's decisions are further evidence of the Supreme Court's increasing discomfort with many aspects of the death penalty system," said Steven Shapiro, national legal director of the American Civil Liberties Union.

The vote was unanimous in allowing condemned inmates to make special federal court claims that the chemicals used in executions are too painful — and therefore amount to unconstitutional cruel and unusual punishment.

Hebron teacher's arrest raises questions about law

DALLAS (AP) — The arrest of a high school teacher for allegedly having sex with an 18-year-old student has raised questions about the age constraints of the state's three-year-old law criminalizing student-teacher sexual relationships.

Amy McElhenney, 25, was arrested May 25 and charged with having an improper relationship with a student. The Spanish teacher and former Miss Texas contestant faces up to 20 years in prison, if convicted.

But some lawmakers say the Hebron High School student's status as a legal adult should exempt McElhenney from

the felony charge.

State Rep. Helen Giddings, D-Dallas, wrote the Texas law in 2003 that criminalizes sex between educators and students. But she said she wanted the law to apply only to students 17 and younger — uncomfortable with making sex between two legal, consenting adults a felony.

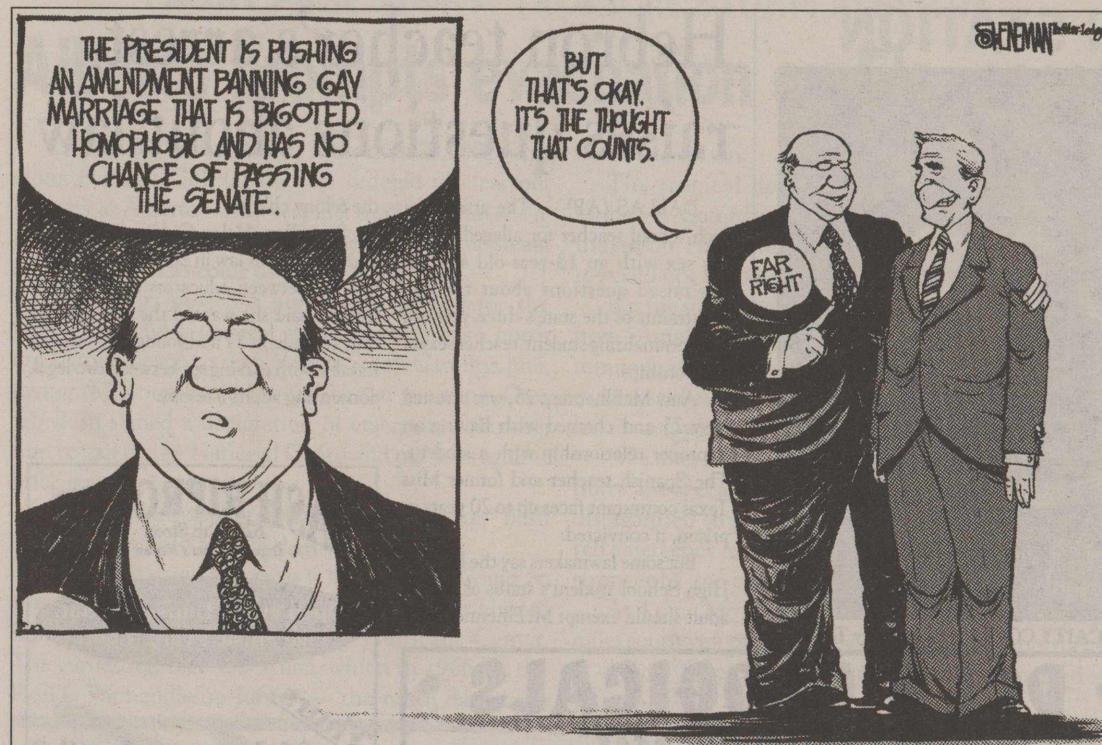

Politics of gay marriage

(U-WIRE) ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Like clockwork, Republicans have begun to unleash their usual meaningless issues to bring their base out to polls this fall to ensure their continued dominance of both houses of Congress. On June 7, the Senate rejected a constitutional amendment banning gay marriage. Bitterly divisive, the amendment failed to move out of an initial phase of debate with 49 votes for it and 48 votes against it. While 60 votes are required to send the amendment to the states for ratification, the amendment fell short of even a sizable majority.

But the mere fact that more senators voted to deprive gays of rights granted by the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution is ridiculous. Because the debate is framed as a struggle to “save” heterosexual marriage, those who wish to allow gays to marry are put on the defensive and cannot make their own

attacks against oppressive religious puritans who want to reverse society to a pre-Enlightenment stage.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., expressed my feelings perfectly after the vote: “Why is it (that) Republicans are all for reducing the federal government’s impact on people’s lives until it comes to these stinging litmus test-issues, whether gay marriage or end of life, (when) they suddenly want the federal government to intervene?”

Is the right of gays to marry specifically mentioned in the Constitution? Nowhere in the Constitution does the phrase “and gay marriage shall not be prohibited” appear.

But the following passage from the 14th Amendment intrigues me when I confront those who oppose gay marriage:

“No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny

to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.”

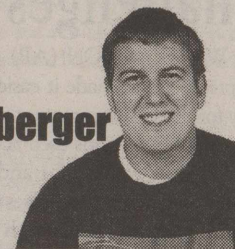
So, are gays to be excluded from “equal protection of the laws”? In *Lawrence v. Texas*, when the high court struck down anti-sodomy laws, Justice Sandra Day O’Connor wrote in a concurring opinion that the law, because it outlawed only gay sodomy and not heterosexual sodomy, did not qualify for the rational-basis test and thus violated the Equal Protection Clause. Banning gay marriage is a similar constitutional exercise to the Texas anti-sodomy laws. If only gay marriage is banned and not straight marriage, it is only a matter of time before such bans will be tested in front of the court.

But this is all hypothetical conjecture. The issue we are all forgetting is probably the most important one of all. Unlike abortion, where a logical argument exists to ban it — though I disagree with such an argument — banning gay marriage has no logical basis.

Liberal Christians

A state of mind with mixed beliefs

I use an alarm clock-radio to wake up, tuned to the hip-hop station in an effort to start my day off as “crunk” as possible. However, last week, in a mystery yet to be solved, instead of opening my sleepy eyes to the sweet melodic voice of Lil’ Jon, my radio was somehow tuned to Dr. James Dobson of Focus on the Family’s talk show.

He was interviewing President Bush’s press secretary Tony Snow (formerly of Fox News and further proof that the White House and “the fair and balanced news network” have been secretly dating since 2000), and the topic was attempt No. 2 at passing an amendment banning homosexual marriage. Dobson and Snow discussed how critics who claim that the senate has only reintroduced this measure as an effort to increase the president’s poll numbers and assist those nervous Republicans seeking re-election are mistaken. They said this is a matter of personal conviction for the president, and he is doing what is right as a Christian.

Of course, there is a lot of evidence to the contrary. This comes at a time when Bush and his counterparts are suffering from a profound lack of confidence from the American people. The amendment had been on the docket since 2005 and only now is being reintroduced. It will almost definitely fail again, and the effort distracts from more significant concerns, chief among them the war in Iraq where news reports of misconduct on the parts of U.S. soldiers are creating even more doubt about why we are there.

The question that came to mind though, is why is it that Dobson, Pat Robertson and Jerry Falwell are who most regard as the representatives of the Christian political movement? Last year when Robertson called for the assassination of Hugo Chavez, Dr. Rev. Michael Eric Dyson appeared on Real Time with Bill Maher and asked why it was conservative religious commentators who garner all the media attention? Politi-

cally liberal Christian scholars like Dyson, Dr. Rev. Walter Wink and Dr. Rev. Marjorie Hewitt Suchocki produce intelligent commentaries on current events that are passed over by the media for the more sensationalist soundbytes by nuts like Dobson, Falwell and Robertson.

There are Christian leaders who recognize that banning homosexual marriage, denying a woman’s right to have an abortion and allowing the Ten Commandments to be posted in public schools would violate the establishment clause of the constitution. They know that the “wall of separation” between church and state is meant to preserve the integrity of both, and that the principles of the Bible should be spread not by forcing them on the public through laws, but by evangelists using their freedoms of speech and religion in the private sector.

If nothing else, I want it known that “conservative” and “Christian” are not mutually exclusive terms. There are lots of people, like myself, who are Christians and politically liberal. By the conservatives laying claim over the largest religion in the world, they alienate people from Christianity. The reality is, neither side perfectly represents the ideas of the Bible and perhaps it is best left that way. As for who is actually right and wrong, well, only God knows for sure.

Two Raiders nab freshmen honors

Two Texas Tech Red Raiders were named to the Collegiate Baseball Magazine Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America team Thursday.

Consensus Big 12 Freshman of the Year Roger Kieschnick and Big 12 Freshman Pitcher of the Year Miles Morgan were both named to the 2006 team after turning in consistent inaugural seasons as Red Raiders.

Keischnick's 2006 campaign concluded with a .359 average, 14 doubles, two triples and nine home runs with 55 RBI's. Thanks to his stellar debut in collegiate baseball, the Rockwall native has been invited to the USA

National Team Trials in North Carolina where he will bid for one of 22 roster spots later this summer.

Morgan's 6-7 record in 17 starts put him in the upper echelon of pitchers on the Red Raiders' staff. He pitched 106 2/3 innings and finished 10th all-time in school history for strikeouts in a single-season with 103. Morgan will pitch this summer in the Cape Cod League for the Brewster Whitecaps.

Not since Josh Bard in 1997 have any Red Raiders been named to the Freshman All-America team.

Texas Tech senior Andrew Dresser became the sixth golfer in program history to receive PING All-American status after the announcement Friday by the Golf Coaches Association of America.

Dresser's peak performance in 2006 came at the Hyatt Plantation Club Intercollegiate, which he finished tied for first with teammate Floren.

He is the second player to receive third-team honors as Bryan Novoa was named to the team in 1996.

'Omen' proves originality in Hollywood running out

It seems Hollywood has run dry on creative ideas for the horror genre. Every horror movie from the John Carpenter blockbusters to the Wes Craven B-films is getting a makeover these days. Some still look like a pig, only now like a pig with makeup on, while others are close to, if not better, than their predecessor.

"The Omen," which was released last Tuesday, falls into the latter category.

Director John Moore follows a scene-by-scene playbook from the original film. This is not a shot-by-shot remake like Gus Van Sant's "Psycho." This is a scene-by-scene recreation. The script is written by David Seltzer, the writer from the original "Omen," hence why the film feels so familiar.

The movie stars Liev Schreiber as an ambassador in London with his wife, played by Julia Stiles, and their son, Damian, played by Seamus Davey-Fitzpatrick. Soon after moving

from Italy to London because of a promotion is when the movie switches into horror mode, starting with Damian's nanny hopping off the top of the house with a rope around her neck.

The deaths in the film are rather creative, sort of like the deaths in the "Final Destination" films. In the original, the deaths were plain without much thought, this time there is a series of events that lead up to the final death as if the person just happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Director Richard Donner of the original film was able to build more suspense than Moore. The scene with the monkeys in the zoo had much more creativity and suspense in the original.

Also, the Jerry Goldsmith's score of the original film is famous, while the score of this film is a little less than par. Good music can make or break a horror film. Look at "Jaws."

Like the original, the studio decided to

hire on a director who had done exclusively action films.

Moore, who just finished filming the remake to "Flight of the Phoenix," has a certain touch to his scenes that keeps the movie at a fast pace. There are a lot of scenes that were specifically drawn up to make young women jump into their boyfriends' arms and each of those moments come with such surprise that half the audience was screaming and then laughing soon after.

Another high point of the film was the nanny who is hired onto care for Damian. Mia Farrow, who knows a little something about getting a baby from the evil stork after her famous role as Rosemary in the 1968 horror film "Rosemary's Baby," plays the role of Mrs. Baylock.

Unlike the original, Farrow plays this role with a certain kind of motherly instinct that makes Baylock both kind and dangerous at the same time.

That being said, all the other casting in the film was just bad. Who thought up putting Schreiber with Stiles? Did they draw two names randomly out of a hat? These two do not go well together, but thankfully they don't have too much interaction on screen.

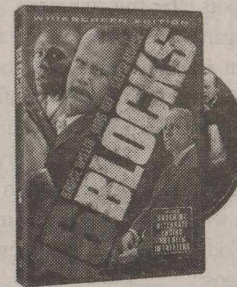
"The Omen" is a good film made up with spectacular scenery and special effects. I believe this is one of the few films that live up to the original.
