Tech student files complaint for Internet scam

A Texas Tech student filed complaints to Tech police after he was victimized by an international Internet scam promising him \$1 million, Tech police said.

The scam asked for the student to send payments to the overseas account and would in return send \$1 million. The student never received the money and soon learned he was tricked, Tech Assistant Chief of Police Jimmy Tillinghast said.

He said the student replied to Internet junk mail that read, "You have won a million dollars!" and after the student sent some money to an overseas account, they replied and asked for additional funds from the student.

"These are the sad facts of the Internet," Tillinghast said. "People need to be careful and never send money to people or businesses they do not know."

He said it is highly unlikely the Tech student will ever receive his money back because it would be

impossible to find the source of the scam.

"There is nothing we can do," Tillinghast said. "Where would he start?"

Tillinghast said nowadays it is riskier to transmit personal information over the Internet because it is an easy target for a scam.

"The main point is, if it looks too good to be true, then it is probably not the truth," he said.

Bomb explodes, kills at least 12 people in Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A car bomb targeting Iranian pilgrims struck near a Shiite shrine in the holy city of Kufa on Thursday, killing at least 12 people and wounding 37, police said.

The bomb exploded about 7:15 a.m. near the shrine of Maitham al-Tamar and yards from the Kufa mosque. Twelve people were killed and 37 wounded, including several Iranian pilgrims visiting the holy area, police Capt. Salim Ghanim said.

Kufa and its twin city Najaf, 100 miles south of Baghdad, are in a relatively peaceful area of Iraq, but pilgrims traveling to holy sites have been targeted. A mortar barrage hit the mosque in August 2004, killing 27 people and wounding 63.

Attacks on houses of worship have stoked tensions between Shiite and Sunni Muslims, especially after the Feb. 22 bombing of a Shiite shrine in Samarra, an act that triggered reprisal attacks against Sunni mosques and clerics.

'Young' and talented

Eli Young Band plays Wild West

Mike Eli and the rest of the band members of the Texas-based, alternative-country group the Eli Young Band, have influences as wide as the state they come from.

It's difficult, if not impossible, to put one label on the group, which has a wide array of songs under their belt despite being out of college for a few years.

"Our influences are all over the place, from Paul Simon to Led Zepelin," Eli said. "We just like good music."

The best way to describe their sound, and the members that make up the band, is by listening to their music.

Like their lyrics say, they're just some 'small town kids driven by rock music with some honky-tonk in the mix.' They've got fan followings in almost every college stop along the southern United States, and later this year they'll be heading back to the studio to cut their third album.

"(College towns) are the foundation of what we do," Eli said. "We're only out of college a couple of years. They're our fans."

Eli and the rest of his band have

a solid fan base in most all college towns, but their big break did not come from a Lubbock, or an Austin, or a College Station. It came from Dallas.

The band finally found their big break during a concert at the Gypsy Tea Room. Miranda Lambert, the country artist they were opening for, gave producer Frank Liddell the heads up about this up-and-coming band. "It's one of our most memorable shows because it was our turning point," Eli said.

Mostly just being able to perform on a nightly basis is the memory for Eli. He said he felt lucky to be able to able to get to do this for a living.

Friday night the band will perform in Lubbock, but it will not be the first time the group has made a pass through the Hub City. They've been playing in Lubbock for basically their entire careers.

"We played at Blue Light for the first few years," Eli said. "During that time people had to get used to us and our music. Now, it's been pretty cool playing in Lubbock."

In August, Mike Eli and the rest of the band's first live album will hit the shelves.

'Going in a different direction'

Smith parts way with Tech, ready for new position at SUNY

Former Texas Tech Chancellor Dr. David R. Smith had his nomination for president of Upstate Medical University unanimously approved by the State University of New York Board of Trustees June 27.

Smith served for nearly five years as Tech chancellor beginning in July 2001 until his resignation from the position in February 2006. After stepping down as chancellor, Smith remained in the Tech system as an instructor of pediatrics at the Health Sciences Center.

As for his resignation in February, Smith said he felt it was his time to step down.

"It's a new board," Smith said. "They are looking at going in a different direction."

Smith said he and his wife Donna Bacchi, who worked also as a professor of pediatrics at the Health Sciences Center, were given an opportunity to pursue more options because their children had moved out of the house and are making their own careers.

Prior to obtaining the chancellor position in 2001, Smith served for more than five years as President of the Health Sciences Center and Dean of the School of Medicine and Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences.

At the SUNY Upstate Medical Center, Smith said his duties would be similar to those he contributed to while employed at Tech.

"Obviously, I'll be the CEO in addition to working with the state legislature and in Congress in Washington, and private fundraising," Smith said. "The only thing we don't have are coaches like Marsha Sharp and Mike Leach."

The SUNY Upstate Medical Center instructs 1,200-plus students in four colleges - Medicine, Graduate Studies, Health Professions and Nursing.

According to a press release from the Health Sciences Center, the Upstate Medical Center in Binghamton, N.Y., is a "community-based branch campus for clinical medical education. The State University of New York is the largest comprehensive university system in the United States, educating more than 414,000 students in 7,669 degree and certificate programs on 64 campuses."

The release also stated the University Hospital attends to 140,000 patients each year.

"We have many grateful patients, so we will be working with them," Smith said. He also added that a children's hospital is slated for construction on the Binghamton campus.

Smith is replacing former President Dr. Gregory L. Eastwood, who stepped down at his position on June 1. Currently, he is serving as interim president of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

Upon his departure, Smith said the most difficult task involving his latest employment is leaving his friends in Lubbock.

"It was a difficult decision," Smith said. "I have a deep regard and respect for faculty at Tech and the Health Sciences Center."

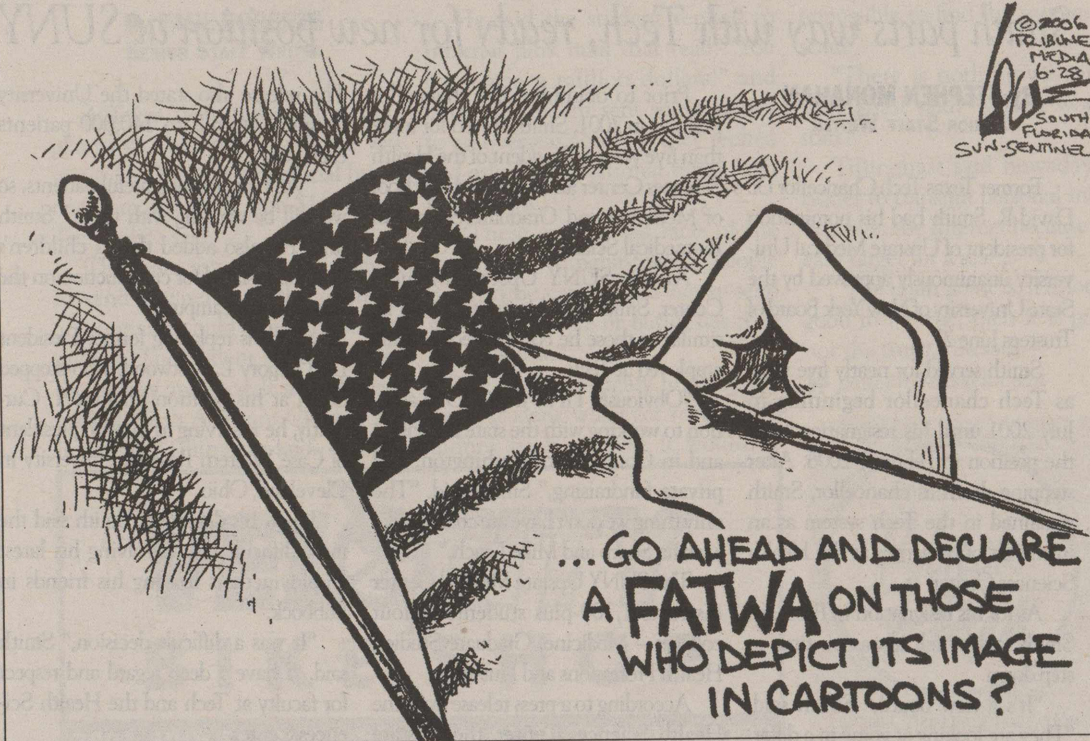

Returning from the backcountry is always jarring. My husband and I have dubbed the experience as re-entering the "fake world." That is, the constructed world we have created for ourselves out of the raw materials of the wilderness.

This isn't entirely a negative outlook — we enjoy hot showers when we get back as much as anyone — but there is something surreal about suddenly being able to turn a faucet and watch water magically appear, to watch cars fly by at 70 mph after you just spent four hours going eight miles uphill.

Being encircled by so much concrete convenience is a way of

life, and not one we think of or appreciate often enough. I hardly ever think about where the water used by my washing machine comes from or what forest the wood floors of my home came. I rarely marvel at the fact that I can buy cilantro and lettuce in the middle of the summer even though they are cool season crops.

As a culture, we are surrounded by an astounding display of wealth and modern amenities. And despite our enormous and disproportionate slice of the pie, we are always consuming more. We are a materialistic society.

One thing I appreciate about backpacking, aside from the un-

paralleled beauty and strange sensation of both peace and adventure, is that the physical act of hiking and living out of a tent sets these issues in perspective. You realize how little you actually need and how lucky and blessed you are to have such phenomenal luxuries like electricity, cars, newspapers, nice clothes, cappuccinos, etc.

It is freeing to know that, although these conveniences are sometimes nice, they are in no way necessary. These objects will not sustain if all the concrete were stripped away; they will not nourish us as family, adventure and love do.

That is my lesson from the real world.

Reasons why America doesn't watch 'football'

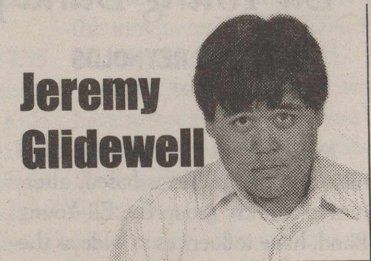

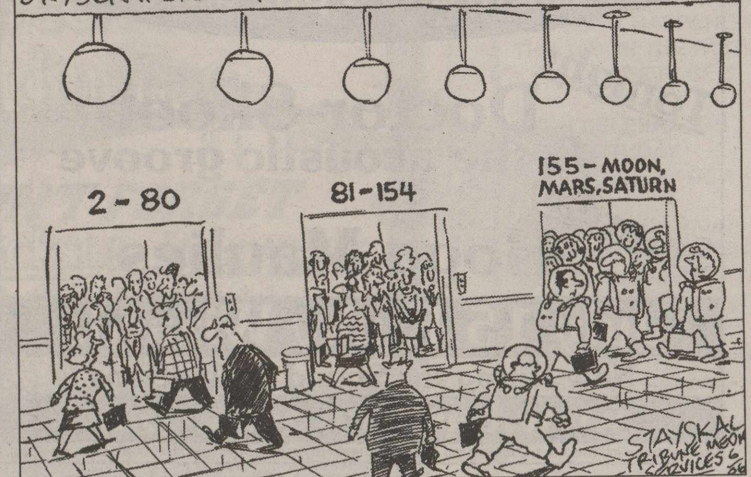

3 charged with stealing Coca-Cola trade secrets to appear in court

ATLANTA (AP) — Coca-Cola and Pepsi are usually bitter enemies, but when PepsiCo Inc. got a letter offering to sell Coke trade secrets, it went straight to its corporate rival.

Six weeks later, three people were to appear in federal court Thursday to face charges of stealing confidential information, including a sample of a new drink, from The Coca-Cola Co. and trying to sell it to PepsiCo Inc.

"Competition can sometimes be fierce, but also must be fair and legal," Pepsi spokesman Dave DeCecco said. "We're pleased the authorities and the FBI have identified the people responsible for this."

The suspects arrested Wednesday include a Coke executive's administrative assistant, Joya Williams, who is accused of rifling through corporate files and stuffing

documents and a new Coca-Cola product into a personal bag.

Williams, 41, of Norcross, Ga., and 30-year-old Ibrahim Dimson of New York and 43-year-old Edmund Duhaney of Decatur, Ga., were charged with wire fraud and unlawfully stealing and selling Coke trade secrets, federal prosecutors said.

Bush marks birthday in low-key way

WASHINGTON (AP) — After months of fretting about getting older, President Bush turned 60 on Thursday.

"Let me just say this: it's a lot younger than you think," the president said as he accepted birthday greetings from a Canadian reporter during a news conference with Canadian Prime

Minister Stephen Harper.

Bush celebrated his birthday with friends on Tuesday at a White House party on Independence Day and there weren't supposed to be any festivities on Thursday. Still, the occasion was expected to be noted in a long day of meetings and public appearances, including a press conference with Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper.

Fla. court rejects \$145 billion award in trial

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Supreme Court on Thursday rejected a \$145 billion punitive damages award against tobacco companies for injuring smokers, saying it was excessive. The award had been the largest ever by an American jury.

The justices also approved an appellate court ruling that it had been a

mistake to certify a class-action lawsuit representing an estimated 300,000 to 700,000 ill Floridians. The certification led to the huge jury award for punitive damages in 2000.

The suit led by a pediatrician, Dr. Howard Engle, was filed in Miami by the husband-and-wife legal team of Stanley and Susan Rosenblatt.

Shuttle crew prepares to dock with space station

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Space shuttle Discovery fired maneuvering jets and began its final approach to the international space station Thursday, winding down a two-day journey from Earth.

Cmdr. Steve Lindsey fired the jets about nine miles from the space station. Radar from the shuttle began tracking the location of the orbiting space lab traveling 17,500 miles per hour as Discovery began narrowing the distance to the space station.

Lubbock FD trains for 'high-rise' emergencies

Lubbock Firefighters spent the last week of June on the Texas Tech campus at Coleman Hall training for high-rise firefighting.

The firefighters spent six eight-hour days practicing 'high-rise' techniques in the 12-story residence hall, Lubbock Fire Department Lt. Mark Ethridge said.

The crews put in overtime Tuesday night and Saturday morning to ensure they were prepared.

"These eight-hour days were extremely labor intensive for our crews," Ethridge said. "But, it is important, so we are able to save those on the top floors."

This has been evident in the past when fires broke out in Gates Hall recently and in Coleman in 2000. The firefighters were called upon to utilize their high-rise training, Ethridge said.

The training consisted of several different scenarios by placing the fires in different locations on different floors.

"One scenario is a fire in a third-floor kitchen. Another scenario is a dorm-room fire on the fourth floor," Ethridge said.

For additional safety for Tech students, water sprinklers were added to every residence hall room making Tech the first university in the state with sprinklers for all the residence halls.

"This is a very big deal for the Lubbock Fire Department," said Ethridge. "To have sprinklers working 24 hours a day, seven days a week is extremely important."

Tech Senior Safety Officer Walter James said this is important for the safety of Tech students living on campus. He said life safety will increase, and the possibility of injuries from a residence hall fire will decrease.

"In the U.S., there has not been a death from a fire in any university dorm room that contained a sprinkler," James said.

He said most fires in residence halls begin in the rooms.

"I think it is an important fact that all the rooms contain a sprinkler, and it should be a good recruiting tool for concerned parents.

Ethridge said this strengthens the collaboration between the Lubbock Fire Department and the Tech campus.

"We deeply appreciated the Tech community allowing us to utilize the facilities for our training," Ethridge said.

'Devil'-ishly delightful

It's been 16 years since Mike Nichols unveiled his rags-to-rags story "Working Girl." The movie starred a young Melanie Griffith, an unwrinkled Harrison Ford and a vicious Sigourney Weaver.

Now, after a flood of chick-lit novels that have invaded bookstores across the country, an updated version of Nichols' story dares the runway of cinema. "The Devil Wears Prada," a novel by first-time author Lauren Weisberger, is the latest film to be based on one of the more popular books of the last five years.

"Prada" is nowhere near what Nichols created, but overall it's an excellent film.

The movie takes the audience into the world of fashion, or at least the fashion magazine industry. This is not a second-rate reality show on MTV where the main character wonders if she is going to get the internship at Teen Vogue, while she stares at herself on the cover of it.

"Prada" takes the never sleeping world of fashion magazines and

throws in a girl who has no fashion sense, and basically hates anyone who does.

Anne Hathaway stars as Andy, the fish in the bowl of piranha. She is accepted as an assistant to a woman who is known for one thing, killing off assistants.

Meryl Streep plays the "devil" that wears the Prada. She takes Andy as her assistant because she thinks Andy has the two qualities that her other assistants desperately lacked — brains and hard-work ethic.

Working a year for Streep would open any door in the journalism world for Andy, so she decides to stick it out through the early morning phone calls, countless coffee trips and requests for unpublished manuscripts of the new Harry Potter book.

The film takes the wit and humor that was grown on the small screen on "Sex and the City" and adds younger faces and more realistic situations.

I liked the fact that the screenwriter did her research on the magazine business before starting the writing process. She knows the world, and not just the models and the designers, but the page layout, the photo shoots and how everyone, from the businessmen on Wall Street to little miss independent buying her clothes at a corner shop, is affected by what is worn on the runways in Paris and Milan.

The characters are what make the film great. Everyone is unique and, more importantly, believable. Andy goes from a fresh-from class journalist to someone she never wanted to be: the person who doesn't stand out in the fashion world.

'24' and 'Grey's Anatomy' among top Emmy nominees

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Stalwart suspense drama "24" and "Grey's Anatomy," the hit hospital drama that focuses as much on its interns' love lives as medicine, were among the top nominees announced Thursday for the Emmy Awards.

The leading nominee, with 16 bids, was the miniseries "Into the West."

In a major reversal from last year's awards, neither "Lost" or "Desperate Housewives" received best-series nominations. Both won last year.

"Honey, I got nominated. It's hilarious, it's unbelievable," Julia Louis-Dreyfus, who helped announce the bids that included her own for "The New Adventures of Old Christine," told her husband, writer-producer Brad Hall, over the phone.

"My skin feels like it's buzzing," she told *The Associated Press*. "Or maybe that's from all the coffee I've been drinking since 1 a.m."

A number of acting bids went to stars of shows that have left the air, including Frances Conroy and Peter Krause of "Six Feet Under," Geena Davis of "Commander in Chief" and Martin Sheen, Allison Janney and Alan Alda of "The West Wing."

"Will & Grace," which ended its eight-year run last season, received a warm farewell with 10 nominations, the most for a comedy series.

Among the nominated reality series were ratings phenomenon "Ameri-

can Idol" and "The Amazing Race."

"24," with what many considered its strongest season, led all series with 12 nominations, followed by "Grey's Anatomy" with 11. Both received best drama series bids and were joined in the category by "House," "The Sopranos" and "The West Wing."

For "24," Kiefer Sutherland received a best-actor bid. Among the "Grey's Anatomy" stars recognized were Golden Globe winner Sandra Oh and Chandra Wilson, with supporting-actress nominations. The show was shut out of the best-actress and actor categories.

"I'm so happy for our show. My family is here, so I got hugs right away, and the cast is here, so we're hugging on each other. Maybe we can go have a really expensive dinner," Wilson said in a phone call from Milan, Italy, where she and the cast are promoting the show.

The comedy-series nominees were "Arrested Development," "Curb Your Enthusiasm," "The Office," "Scrubs" and "Two and a Half Men."

Among the networks, longtime Emmy powerhouse HBO was the front-runner with 95 nominations, followed by ABC with 64, CBS with 47, NBC with 46 and Fox with 41.

The stars of "Desperate Housewives," which lost its status as critical darling in its sophomore season although it held its ratings, were missing this year from the lead acting category. The stars of "Lost" met the same fate.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Some pop stars want fame and money. "American Idol" winner Taylor Hicks just wants to ride the tour bus.

Hicks gets to do just that on a cross-country tour that kicked off Wednesday in Manchester, N.H. The tour, which reunites Hicks with castmates from the fifth edition of the hit Fox show, ends Sept. 24 in Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

"I've always wanted to be on a bus. ... My home has been on the road since even before 'American Idol,'" the 29-year-old Alabama native told AP Radio in a recent interview.

As a struggling musician en route to his next gig, Hicks had hoped to travel on his own tour bus one day.

"You would see buses on the road in Alabama going to their next destination, and I would always dream about being on one and now I have the opportunity," he said.

These days, Hicks says he prefers to travel rather than stay at his Birmingham apartment.

"It's been there and it's been nice to come home, but (I'm) only there for a few days and I'm on the road," he said. "So a tour bus with some good, cold

LONDON (AP) — J.K. Rowling has received an honorary doctorate from Aberdeen University for her support of research into multiple sclerosis.

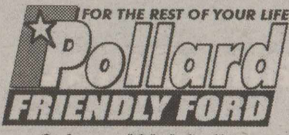

'It was difficult'

Crow talks about splitting from Armstrong and battling cancer

NEW YORK (AP) — Sheryl Crow says it was difficult to be apart from ex-fiance Lance Armstrong after she was diagnosed with breast cancer earlier this year.

"It was difficult, you know," Crow tells Vanity Fair magazine in its August issue. "I know he wanted to be there."

Crow and Armstrong announced their breakup in February. The 44-year-old rocker says the split was "devastating" for both of them.

"I do think about Lance every day," she says. "And I think about his kids every day."

When Crow learned she had cancer, she contacted the seven-time Tour de France champion, who was on a solo road trip from Lake Tahoe,

Calif., to Oregon.

"When I got that news, I can't even describe it," says Armstrong, who is a survivor of testicular cancer. "It was the cruelest twist. ... I actually turned around to make the drive to L.A. We talked along the way and she said, 'You know, I just don't think that's a great idea.'"

According to Armstrong, Crow told him she felt "it would be hard on her in trying to manage the breakup and the diagnosis. And I totally understood."

The singer, who underwent surgery in late February, denies speculation that Armstrong, who has three children from a previous marriage, didn't want to start another family.

"It would be easy to say this is

all about my wanting to get married and have kids but it was never that simple," she says. "It was much deeper than that."

Says the 34-year-old Armstrong of their split: "We were at different points in our lives."

Crow says her romantic relationships never seem to lead to the altar.

"I think that if I wanted to be married I would be married by now," she says. "And, for whatever reason, I haven't done it. I've picked people who've helped me to not make that happen."

Crow will begin a tour with John Mayer on Aug. 24 in Pittsburgh. A portion of the proceeds will be donated to The Breast Cancer Research Foundation.

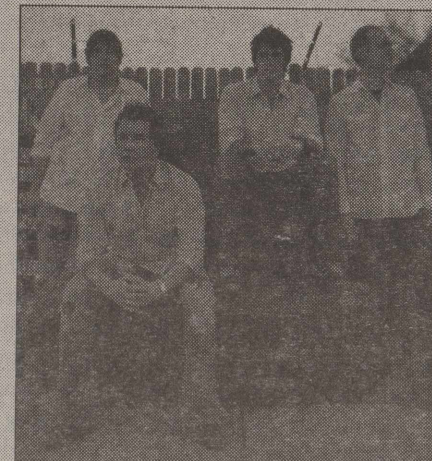

As I was hiding inside my mattress fortress I constructed in the bathtub to protect myself from the impending asteroid that nearly annihilated planet Earth early Tuesday morning, I compiled this list of who I believe should start the Major League Baseball All-Star Game this Tuesday night in Pittsburgh, Penn. Sadly, I did this of instead thinking about how my family, friends and myself would survive had the impending rock collided with our heavenly planet. But anyway, here they are.

NL Starters

Pitcher: Tom Glavine — Mets: After a dismal 2005 campaign, the 40-year-old southpaw is 11-2 with a 3.43 ERA and 78 strikeouts, and he has not lost a decision since April 24.

Catcher: Michael Barrett — Cubs: He is not receiving the starting nod because of his haymaker to the face to White Sox catcher A.J. Pierzynski. Barrett's .886 OPS leads all NL catchers while batting .310 with nine jacks and 31 RBI.

First Base: Albert Pujols — Cardinals: Despite missing a couple of weeks with a strained oblique muscle, "Phat" Albert remains among the NL leaders in batting average (.314), home runs (28) and RBIs (73). Ryan Howard of

the Philadelphia Phillies is also a solid choice to start, but his .280 batting average has him watching the first couple of innings from the bench.

Second Base: Chase Utley — Phillies: I hate to snub Florida's Dan Uggla from the starting lineup, but he edged out his Florida counterpart with 16 home runs and 49 RBI while batting .305.

Third Base: David Wright — Mets: I know St. Louis' Scott Rolen is a prime selection at this position after rebounding from an injury-plagued 2005 season, but Wright's 18 homers and 68 RBI, helps solidify this starting spot.

Shortstop: Jose Reyes — Mets: The man is a speed demon and has a high home run count at the leadoff spot with eight. Despite his knack for the long ball as of late, Reyes has managed to keep his average around .300. His 109 hits and 12 triples are best among NL shortstops. Did I mention his 37 stolen bases?

Left Field: Carlos Lee — Brewers: Sure, Washington's Alfonso Soriano would be perfect here, but he has had some adjustment problems with moving from second base to left field. As for Lee, his 25 home runs and 70 RBI are among the NL leaders in batting.

Center Field: Carlos Beltran — Mets: I know Beltran is another Met on this list, but he has already surpassed his home run (24) and RBI (65) totals from 2005. His 1.009 OPS has him second in the NL behind the Astros' Lance Berkman.

Right Field: Lance Berkman — Astros: Despite playing a lot of the season at first-base, he has played a fair share of games at right field. He deserves to be a starter and mammoth sluggers Pujols and Howard occupy first base. He is tied for the major league lead in RBI with 76 and has belted 24 home runs while batting .317.

AL Starters

Pitcher: Jose Contreras — White Sox: The Twins towering duo of Johan Santana and rookie Francisco Liriano is tempting, but give Contreras has won 17-straight decisions dating back to last season. He is 9-0 this season with a 3.31 ERA and 71 strikeouts.

Catcher: Joe Mauer — Twins: I hope Cubs fans have been paying

attention because in one-half of a season, Mauer is proving he was deserving of being the top pick in the 2001 draft (Cubs drafted injury-prone Mark Prior with the second pick). Mauer is batting a major-league leading .391 with six long balls and 43 RBI.

First Base: Paul Konerko — White Sox: I am snubbing Boston's David Ortiz, Cleveland's Travis Hafner and Chicago's Jim Thome because they all have one thing in common — they are designated hitters. He is batting .318 with 21 home runs and 67 RBI while scoring 53 runs.

Second Base: Mark Loretta — Red Sox: Two reasons why Loretta gets the nod — he has topped the 100-hit margin and the Yankees' Robinson Cano is on the disabled list. Loretta has hit three homers with 34 RBI, and his .308 average is third among AL second basemen.

Third Base: Alex Rodriguez — Yankees: Had Boston's Kevin Youkilis remained at third instead of switching to first he would be here, not A-Rod. However, Rodriguez is nearing .300 in batting and is on pace for his usual 40-plus home run 100-plus RBI season.

Shortstop: Miguel Tejada — Orioles: I know Yankee shortstop Derek Jeter is a good choice, but Tejada's power numbers contribute

more to starting at this position than Jeter's batting average. Tejada has belted 17 homers with 58 RBI while batting .311.

Left Field: Carl Crawford — Devil Rays: Because Boston's Manny Ramirez is going to rest his sore knee and not participate, Crawford gets the start here. He leads all AL left fielders with a .322 average with 12 home runs and 45 RBI. His 32 stolen bases and seven triples highlight Crawford's speed.

Center Field: Gary Matthews, Jr. — Rangers: Matthews, Jr. has provided the Rangers with phenomenal numbers at the lead off spot. His .331 average is tops among AL center fielders and he also leads the AL with 29 doubles, and I believe he had arguably one of the greatest catches this decade last weekend versus the Astros.

Right Field: Ichiro Suzuki — Mariners: His .351 average is fourth in all of baseball and second in the AL. He has knocked in 31 with six home runs. He is on pace for another 200-plus hit season — which would be his sixth straight.

Bonds' trainer sent to jail

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds' personal trainer is back in prison after refusing to testify to the federal grand jury investigating the San Francisco Giants' slugger for perjury.

Greg Anderson, who served three months in prison after pleading guilty last year for his role in the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative steroid scandal, was held in contempt of court and taken to prison Wednesday.

Anderson was led out of U.S. District Judge William Alsup's courtroom by two deputy U.S. marshals and taken to the Federal Correctional Institution in nearby Dublin.

But his stay may be short.

That's because Anderson will be set free once the grand jury's term expires, which will occur within weeks, Alsup said.

Anderson was initially ordered in March to testify to the grand jury investigating whether Bonds perjured

himself when he testified to the original BALCO grand jury in December 2003 that he never knowingly used steroids or other banned performance enhancing drugs.

"Every person, even the President of the United States as held by the Supreme Court, has to give testimony," Alsup said in ordering Anderson to prison.

Alsup denied Anderson's request for bail or to remain free while his attorney, Mark Geragos, appeals the decision.

"You have done a masterful job of postponing this day of reckoning," the judge told Geragos, "and if you wait a few more weeks, the grand jury will go away."

Geragos said Anderson won't testify and will be released once the grand jury's term expires.

While Geragos, the federal prosecutor and the judge all hearing the case

said the grand jury's term will expire soon, all declined to comment exactly when that will be.

Geragos said outside of court that "there are things in your refrigerator" with a longer shelf life than the grand jury's term.

The Giants said Bonds would have no comment on the development. Bonds' attorney, Michael Rains, didn't immediately return a phone message seeking comment.

Geragos argued that Anderson shouldn't have to testify because of the numerous leaks about grand jury testimony in the original BALCO case have made their way into print and a book by two *San Francisco Chronicle* reporters.

"Jail is not going to have any coercive effect," Geragos said outside federal court. "He is not going to cooperate with a grand jury that is leaking like a sieve."

NCAA announces future basketball tourney sites

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Boston, Indianapolis, Glendale, Ariz., and Memphis, Tenn., will host regionals in 2009 for the NCAA men's basketball tournament.

Philadelphia, Miami and Minneapolis will hold first- and second-round games in 2009, along with Kansas City, Mo.; Portland, Ore.; Greensboro, N.C., and Spokane, Wash.

The opening-round game will remain at Dayton, Ohio, which also will host first- and second-round games in 2009. The Final Four will be at Detroit, a decision announced three years ago.

The committee unanimously approved a first-weekend return to New Orleans in 2010. It's the second time since Hurricane Katrina the tournament will be played in New Orleans, a longtime host of Final Fours.

"Nothing more strongly illustrates

our support of the area than to assure New Orleans regularly hosts rounds ... when possible," committee chairman Craig Littlepage said.

Other 2010 sites are: Providence, R.I.; Jacksonville, Fla.; Oklahoma City; Milwaukee; San Jose, Calif.; Boise, Idaho; and Buffalo, N.Y.

The regionals in 2010 will be played at Syracuse, N.Y., St. Louis, Salt Lake City and Houston. The Final Four is in Indianapolis.

St. Louis also will host the women's Final Four in 2009, and the 2010 women's finals will be in San Antonio.

The women's regional sites in 2009 are Berkeley, Calif.; Oklahoma City; Raleigh, N.C.; and Trenton, N.J. The first- and second-round games that year will be at Albuquerque; Baton Rouge, La.; College Park, Md.; Columbus, Ohio; Duluth, Ga.; Lubbock, Texas; Los Angeles; and Piscataway, N.J.

Armstrong drops defamation lawsuits in France

PARIS (AP) — Lance Armstrong dropped defamation lawsuits in France after winning three legal battles elsewhere over doping accusations.

Donald Manasse and Christian Charriere-Bournazel, Armstrong's lawyers in France, said Thursday the seven-time Tour de France champion had instructed them to "dismiss all pending actions."

That means a trial set to start in October against the authors of the book "LA Confidential: The Secrets of Lance Armstrong" will not proceed. The book accused Armstrong

of using banned substances, a claim he has always denied.

Armstrong recently settled a libel case against Britain's Sunday Times newspaper over a June 2004 article that referred to the book, written by Pierre Ballester and David Walsh. The settlement followed a pre-trial ruling by a High Court judge in Armstrong's favor. Two other recent rulings also vindicated Armstrong.

"Mr. Armstrong considers that his honor and reputation have been re-established for all people who examine the facts in good faith, and that no further purpose

is served now in pursuing other actions in defamation," the lawyers' statement said.

Armstrong was hounded by allegations that he used performance-enhancing drugs during his record Tour wins from 1999-05. He is now retired from cycling.

He recently sued to recover a \$5 million bonus for winning in 2004. The insurance company under contract to pay the bonus had withheld it because of accusations that Armstrong had taken drugs. An arbitration panel awarded Armstrong \$7.5 million.

Wimbledon final set

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Justine Henin-Hardenne is one victory from a career Grand Slam.

She defeated fellow Belgian Kim Clijsters 6-4, 7-6 (4) Thursday to reach the Wimbledon final and close in on the one major title missing from her collection.

The third-seeded Henin-Hardenne will face No. 1 Amelie Mauresmo or 2004 champion Maria Sharapova in Saturday's championship.

Henin-Hardenne reached the Wimbledon final in 2001, losing to Venus Williams. Since then, she has won three French Opens and one U.S. Open and Australian Open. By taking Wimbledon, she would become only the 10th woman to win all four Grand Slams.

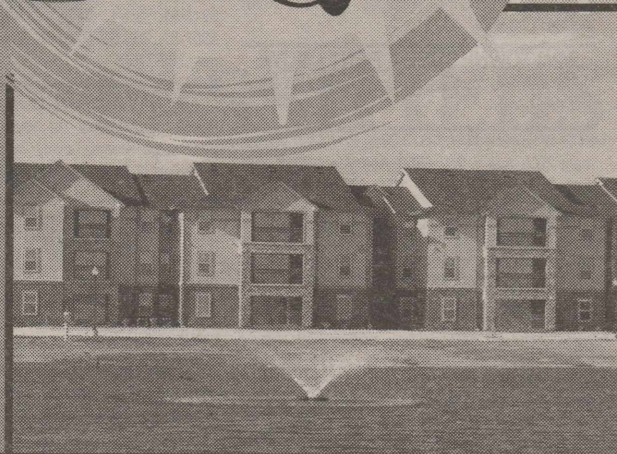
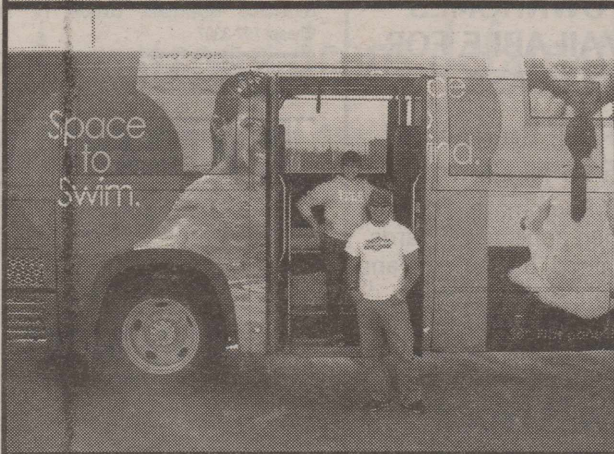
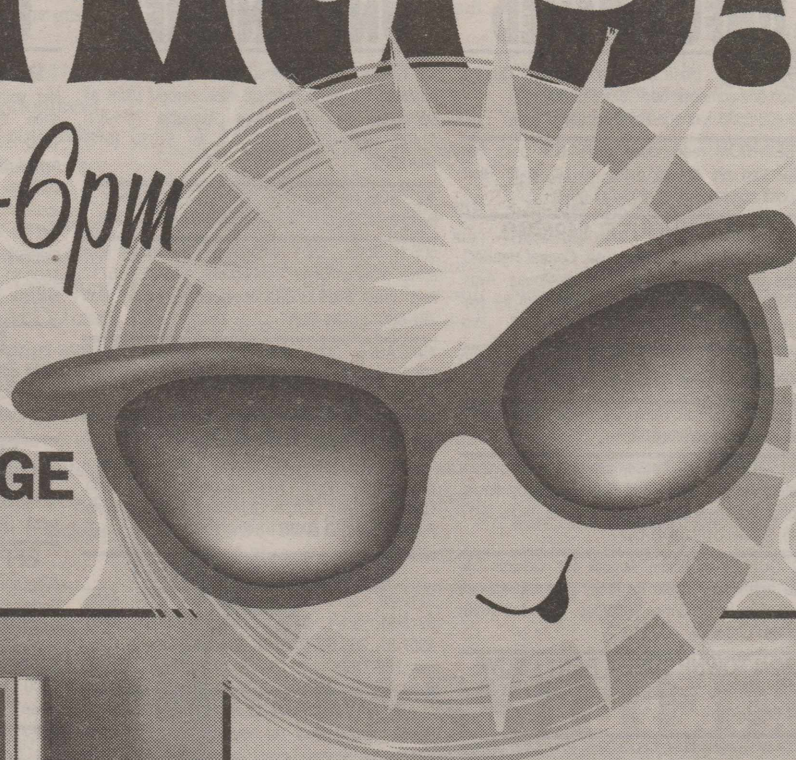
