Tejano singer rejects plea bargain in sex abuse case

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A Tejano singer accused of drugging and molesting a 13-year-old girl rejected a plea bargain Monday and was sent to jail until he can post bond.

Joe Lopez, the 56-year-old former lead singer of "Grupo Mazz," had been expected to plead guilty to first-degree injury to a child and accept a sentence of four months in county jail followed by 10 years probation. The plea would have been instead of a trial on two child sexual abuse charges that was set to begin with jury selection Monday.

Runway route changed a week before crash

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) - Investigators in the Comair jet crash that killed 49 people are looking into whether changes made to a taxiway during a repaving project a week ago confused the pilot and caused him to turn onto the wrong runway.

Federal aviation officials said Monday they were also looking at such things as runway lights, markings and signs for clues to what could have misled the pilots, as well as anything else that changed the configuration or appearance of the airport.

Shiite clash with Iraqi forces south of Baghdad

DIWANIYAH, Iraq (AP) — Shiite militiamen battled Iraqi forces for 12 hours Monday, leaving at least 40 people dead and underlining the government's struggle to rein in an anti-U.S. cleric. The U.S. announced nine soldiers killed over the weekend in separate fighting.

The fighting in this southern city dominated a day that saw at least 19 people die in two suicide car bombings in Baghdad -one outside the Interior Ministry and one on a line of cars waiting for fuel at a gas station.

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — Prosecutors abruptly dropped their case Monday against John Mark Karr in the slaying of JonBenet Ramsey, saying DNA tests failed to put him at the crime scene despite his insistence he sexually assaulted and strangled the 6-year-old beauty charges dating to 2001.



Hurricane season for 2006 forecasted to be above normal

The 2006 hurricane season is forecasted to be less less severe than the original prediction released severe than last year's.

According to the Climate Prediction Center Web site, the National Weather Service has predicted a high probability of an above normal 2006 Atlantic hurricane season, but does not expect a repeat of last year's recordbreaking season. The 2005 hurricane season had 28 named storms, 15 of which became hurricanes. The Web site reported the updated 2006 hurricane season prediction calls for a seasonal total of 12 to 15 named storms, with seven to nine becoming hurricanes and Team deployed Monday morning to research three to four becoming major hurricanes. A major hurricane is classified as a Category 3 or higher.

Jerry English, a representative of the Lubbock affiliate of the National Weather Service, said he believes the reason last year's hurricane season was publicized was because there were so many direct hits from the storms.

"Although this season is starting off kind of mild, we don't want to fall asleep on it," English said. Larry Tanner, a research associate for the Wind

Science and Engineering Research Center at Texas Tech University, said he believes the 2006 hurricane

season will be less severe than last year. "Ernesto is only the fifth named storm of the season," Tanner said, "and by this time last year, we were

The Climate Prediction Center reported the updated forecast issued Aug. 8 predicted May 22. Since the season is still expected to be above normal, most of the named storms and hurricanes will form over the tropical Atlantic Ocean between August and October.

Richard Peterson, a professor of atmospheric sciences at Tech, said he believes even though we have not had a lot of storms yet, that does not mean we will not have a huge flurry all at once.

Peterson said the Tech Hurricane Intercept Tropical Storm Ernesto and are headed for Shreveport, La. Peterson said the team has had a lot of success in the past and will continue to research storms during the 2006 hurricane

The Climate Prediction Center Web site reported it is currently not possible to confidently predict the number or intensity of land-falling hurricanes, or whether a certain location will be impacted by a hurricane this season. For that reason, residents in coastal regions and government agencies should be prepared for a hurricane. The 2006 hurricane season began June 1 and will

Hurricane Katrina Timeline

Friday, Aug. 26, 2005 Three Days Prior to Katrina's Louisiana Landfall Saturday, Aug. 27, 2005 Two Days Prior Sunday, Aug. 28, 2005 Day Before landfall

- 8:30 p.m. An empty Amtrak train leaves New Orleans, with room for several hundred potential evacuees.

Monday, Aug. 29, 2005 Katrina hits

Dawn - Water has continued to rise overnight and is coursing through the city's central business district, still rising. Eventually, at least 80 percent of New Orleans is under water. Reports of looting surface.

Tuesday, Aug. 30, 2005

One Day After Katrina

- 3 p.m. With water still pouring into the city, officials report that the Army Corps of Engineers has surveyed the damage to levees and will soon attempt repair.
- 6 a.m. Katrina makes landfall on Louisiana coast as a strong Category 4 storm, with sustained winds of nearly 145 mph and predicted coastal storm surge of up to 28 feet.
- 8 a.m. A massive storm surge sends water sloshing up Lake Borgne and the lower reaches of the Mississippi River. Local officials immediately report flooding.
 9 a.m. The eastern part of the city and Bernard Parish are already flooded several feet deep, even before the eye of the storm has passed. Thousands of survivors are
- trapped.

 11 a.m. New Orleans is spared a direct hit, as the center of the storm passes over the Louisiana-Mississippi state line 35 miles away from the city. Katrina is still a strong
- Category 3 storm with 125 mph winds.

 Late Morning (exact time uncertain) The vital 17th Street Canal levee gives way, sending the water from Lake Pontchartrain into the city in a second, slower wave of
- flooding than inundates the downtown area. A full day will pass before state or federal officials fully realize what is happening.

 About 11 a.m. (exact time uncertain) Roughly five hours after Katrina strikes the coast, FEMA director Michael Brown sends a memo requesting an additional 1,000 rescue workers from the Department of Homeland Security within 48 hours and 2,000 more within seven days.
- Time uncertain Blanco calls Presdient Bush, saying, "Mr. President, we need your help. We need everything you've got." Bush later assures her that "help is on the way."

- Morning Bush participates in a half-hour video conference on Katrina with Vice President Cheney and top aides. Later, he boards Air Force One and flies over New Orleans on his way back to Washington.
- Late Afternoon Bush, back at the White House, holds a cabinet meeting on Katrina and speaks for nine minutes in the Rose Garden to outline federal relief efforts. He says FEMA has moved 25 search and rescue teams into the area.
- Time Uncertain Red Cross President Marsha Evans asks permission to enter the city with relief supplies, but Louisiana state officials deny permission.
- Evening In a special report, CNN Correspondent Adaora Udoji reports: "Three days after Hurricane Katrina, and the situation is getting more desperate by the minute. Thousands are still stranded in misery...They're surrounded by a crumbling city and dead bodies. Infants have no formula, the children no food, nothing for adults, no medical help. They're burning with frustration, and sure they have been forgotten."

City of Lubbock emergency response representatives and Red Cross authorities say they believe Lubbock is prepared to handle

Capt. Don Carter of the Lubbock County Sheriff's department said disaster plans are in place. Emergency plans include response from utility agencies and relief agencies.

"The City of Lubbock is prepared pretty well," Carter said. "We're as and hospital workers. The team ready as we can be for disaster preparation, response and recovery."

Kevin Overstreet, the managing single-family house fires. director of emergency management for the City of Lubbock and Lubbock County, said his department prepares for all types of emergencies, community. ranging from weather disasters to terrorism.

He said he believes the city is prepared to respond with all available resources, including the Red Cross, Salvation Army, and underground and above ground emergency operations centers.

"We are as prepared as any city can be," Overstreet said. "I'm very satisfied with the city and services we have."

One of the newest additions to Lubbock's response team, he said, is a regional mobile operation vehicle. The vehicle allows the city or county to run a command scene on the road. The vehicle has advanced weather and radio equipment as well as television cameras.

of preparation, Overstreet said, taught. are funded for the Department of Homeland Security by the state.

Overstreet said the city is prepared to work with utilities agencies and the Red Cross.

"Part of the Red Cross' plans are incorporated in our plans," he said. "Anytime we've called them, they're ready to go."

Leslie Mathews, the emergency services and health and safety director for the South Plains Regional Red Cross, said the Red Cross needs more volunteers to help prepare for a disaster, whether it is housing victims of a regional disaster or for a disaster such as flooding or a tornado.

'Are we prepared for our own disaster? We never know until the day it happens," Mathews said. "We're it. We need people to help us. Lots of people don't realize they want to volunteer until an emergency

Mathews said the Red Cross needs people to volunteer to do

things that seem less important but are necessary.

"We need people to do even 'silly things' like taking inventory on how many cots we have," Mathews said.

Mathews said there are many its own disaster, natural or man-things people can do to volunteer. The Red Cross offers free disaster training courses online and in person, she said.

Lubbock does not only prepare for tornadoes, Mathews said. The region is prone to flooding, straightline winds and grass fires.

If a disaster were to hit Lubbock, Mathews said, the City of Lubbock is in charge of primary disaster relief, but the Red Cross will assist and provide manpower. "There's a lot going on that people don't see," Mathews said. "Do we have enough cots? Do we have a way of transporting these cots? Do we have enough food? Do we have enough people to cook or do we have to cook?"

Since Katrina, Mathews said, the Red Cross wants to train all of the people who applied to volunteer. When these people are trained, she said, they can be instructors, Equipment and other means and more disaster courses can be





Karr's arrest vindication for JonBenet's parents, John and Patsy Ramsey, who had long been suspected in the killing.

On Monday, the attorney said: "From day one, John Ramsey publicly stated that he did not want the public or the media to jump to judgment. He did not want the public or the media to engage in speculation, that he wanted the justice system to take its course."

Wood said he still has great confidence in the district attorney. Patsy Ramsey died of cancer in June.

JonBenet Ramsey's aunt, Pamela Paugh, said she was disappointed there won't be a prosecution of someone in the case, but added: "I think our justice system worked as it was supposed to."

"We asked the DA to do her thing. She did it," said Paugh, who is Patsy Ramsey's sister. "My disappointment came about the end of December 1996 when we didn't have the killer then. We've had 9 1/2 years of disappointment and waiting."





Defensive line ready to defend Jones

Over the past three seasons, Texas Tech senior defensive linemen Ken Scott, Chris Hudler and Keyunta Dawson have pursued and tackled some of the most elite offensive foes in college football.

From the uprising of starting Oklahoma Sooner running back Adrian Peterson in 2004 to University of Texas quarterback and 2005 Rose Bowl MVP Vince Young, these Red Raider defensive frontmen know what premier players bring to the field in college football.


With the kickoff for the Red Raiders 2006 season less than a week away, these seniors hope their experiences will help anchor and solidify the Red Raiders as one of the top defensive lines in the nation.

"Man, it's fun playing with these guys, you know, we've been together for four years, so you're playing next to your brother," Hudler said. "You know them and you're family. It's fun to have those guys around you and it's good for the team to have all the older guys around with the experience so they can kind of share the experience down to the younger guys before they leave."

Dawson, Scott and Hudler team up with fellow senior defensive tackle Dek Bake and senior defensive end Seth injuries that sidelined them for the 2005 season. Between them they have accumulated 140 games, 339 tackles, 21 sacks, four forced fumbles with nine recoveries, 12 pass deflections and one interception.







Judge Susan Criss of the 212th District Court ruled Monday that Browne and BP Global refining and marketing chief John Manzoni must give depositions in the lawsuit filed by accident survivors and victims' families, said lead plaintiff attorney edge prior to March 23, 2005, Brent Coon.

A spokesman for the Londonbased energy company said BP will appeal the decision.

Neither John Browne nor John Manzoni have unique knowledge of the accident at the Texas City plant," said BP Americas spokesman Neil Chapman.


