### Hostage-taker wounds officer, turns on self

DALLAS (AP) — A man took a woman hostage in an airport hotel room Wednesday and shot through the wall at police, hitting one officer and sparking a standoff before apparently killing himself, authorities said.

Dallas Police spokesman Lt. Rick Watson said the woman had two gunshot wounds as she emerged from the room about three hours later and told officers the man had shot himself. Their relationship and what sparked the shooting weren't immediately clear.

### Landmark deal could limit greenhouse emissions

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) California would become the first state to impose a limit on all greenhouse gas emissions, including those from industrial plants, under a landmark deal reached Wednesday by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and legislative Democrats.

The agreement marks a clear break with the Bush administration and puts California on a path to reducing its emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases by an estimated 25 percent by 2020.

### Israel rejects demands to lift air and sea blockade

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel on Wednesday rejected demands from visiting U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan that it immediately lift its sea and air blockade of Lebanon and withdraw its forces once 5,000 international troops are deployed.

Prime Minister Ehud Olmert indicated Israel would only allow free movement after the full implementation of a U.N.-brokered cease-fire that ended 34 days of fighting between Israel and Lebanon's Hezbollah guerrillas that killed 854 Lebanese and 159 Israelis.



# Football game commuters must pay for shuttles

Tech kicks off its first game of the football season Saturday and this year commuters can expect to pay an additional cost for shuttle service, parking officials said.

Michael Lopez, the visitor relations manager for University Parking Services, said the cost of the shuttle is the only difference in parking regulations this year.

Students who do not live on campus, Lopez said, as well as other people attending the football games who are not Red Raider Club members, must pay \$5 for a shuttle service from the commuter lots north of United Spirit Arena and the lots west of Indiana to Jones AT&T stadium.

Students and faculty who regularly park in other commuter lots, such as the one near Jones AT&T stadium, Lopez said, may not park in those lots on game days.

Students who live in residence halls must park in their specified hall lots.

"If you're on campus," Lopez said, "stay put." Faculty may park in the parking lot between the administration building and the Student Union Building, Lopez

Heather Medley, administrative business assistant for university parking services, said in order to make parking easier on football game days and every day, university parking services now provides a parking radio station that can be

The challenge came during a freewheeling, 2 1/2-hour news conference and only two days before a U.N. Security Council ultimatum demanding Iran roll back its suspect nuclear program.

# Former Honolulu mayor visits Hub City

Former Honolulu mayor Jeremy Harris emphasized building sustainable cities in a speech Tuesday at the American Institute of Architects 150th anniversary celebration at the Merket Alumni Center.

Brian Griggs, chancellor of the institute, said the institute is giving back to the community with the gift of architecture in honor of their 150th anniversary.

Griggs said the Lubbock American Institute of Architects will embark on three projects. He said they will build a community design strip, have an open design competition with the Lubbock Habitat for Humanity and sponsor several advocacy and awareness luncheons.

Harris said all cities have the same problem of building too many roads.

"We have to build cities for the people and not the automobile," Harris said.

He said architects can build a sustainable city by building it for the people, preserving agricultural land and open spaces by utilizing smart growth design, and creating an efficient transportation system.

In his speech, Harris talked about sustainable community. He said architects took out roadways that were right next to Waikiki beach and put in walkways and a park. Architects designed medians with plants and trees to break up the five-lane roads, he said.

Harris said Lubbock has a lot of potential because of its leadership.

## Judge Tosses 'Grossly Excessive' \$50 Million Award in Vioxx Case

\$50 million compensatory damage award in a federal Vioxx case this month was "grossly excessive," and a new trial must be held to decide suffered a heart attack after taking the painkiller, a federal judge ruled-Wednesday.

Merck said it was pleased with the decision on the damage award, order a new trial on whether it was liable in the case as well.

Merck was liable in the case was reasonable, but he said no reasonthe effects of the heart attack that Gerald Barnett suffered in 2002. after 2 1/2 years on the drug, entitled him to \$50 million in compensatory

Jurors found Aug. 17 that Merck is liable for Barnett's heart attack because it negligently failed to warn him that its since-withdrawn drug increased the risk of heart attacks, and that it actively hid such dangers.

Barnett's attorney, Mark Robinson, said he had not heard about the Barnett, 62, of Myrtle Beach, S.C.

# AWUL soldier says he will surrender

Army Spc. Mark Wilkerson clutched to desert." the steering wheel of his pickup truck pockets stuffed with cash, his eyes darting nervously between the rearbefore him.

A million thoughts raced through his mind: What will my parents say? What if the police stop me? Did the soldiers who said they supported me and wished they could do this really mean it?

On Thursday, a year and a half after going absent without leave before his second deployment to Iraq, Wilkerson plans to return to Fort Hood to face his fellow soldiers and superiors.

"I would rather turn myself in now than live in constant fear that I do something stupid, that I get pulled over for a missing headlight or something and they find out I'm AWOL," said Wilkerson, 22, of Colorado Springs, Colo. "I'm ready to face the consequences. Whatever happens, I'm prepared for — at least I hope I am.'

Wilkerson, who said he never left the country but won't reveal where he was, has consulted with an attorney but does not know exactly what penalties he faces. Others have served time in military prisons.

Simple desertion has been decreasing in the military in recent years — about 2,500 troops last year simply didn't show up for work, down from almost 5,000 in 2001, according to the Pentagon public affairs office.

Francisco Tomas Martinez, whose son Army Spc. Francisco Gregorio Martinez was killed in Iraq last year, said he is not angry when troops desert, but "it breaks my heart."

The Fort Worth computer programmer, who has 10 years of military service, recently enlisted in the Air Force Reserve — despite believing that the U.S. should have had more international backing before invading Iraq.

"It's not a matter of agreeing politically. We're definitely in it now, and we need to unite as a nation," said Martinez, 42. "We're going to be in it for years to come. ... Once





# Sole survivor of Kentucky crash out of coma, condition improving

(U-WIRE) LEXINGTON, Ky. — Though he is improving, doctors would not say whether or not they expect the sole survivor of Sunday's plane crash to survive.

James Polehinke, the copilot of Flight 5191, is still in the intensive care unit at University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center, said Dr. Andrew C. Bernard, a UK trauma surgeon, in a news conference Tuesday night.

"I am unable to say for certain if he will survive," Bernard said, but did say that Polehinke's injuries are survivable and he expects the patient to continue to improve.

Polehinke arrived at the hospital Sunday morning in a coma, suffering from fractures in face, spine, pelvis, left leg, right foot, right hand, three ribs and a breastbone.

He also had a collapsed lung when he arrived at the UK hospital, but he did not suffer any burn injuries, Bernard for doctors to induce a coma a short time later.

# Revamped secondary ready to roam free

In 2005, arguably one of the most prolific and explosive players in Texas Tech football history created a name for himself in the community with his neck-jarring hits and historic run at the NCAA record for forced fumbles in a single season.

After Kansas State's visit to Tech last year, seemingly anyone who followed the Red Raiders' run to the 2006 AT&T Cotton Bowl knew him by one name: Slay.

Dwayne Slay, who roamed the secondary at free safety, made his mark at the Kansas State game with a devastating blow to quarterback Allen Everidge, forcing I can't wait." a fumble which was recovered

Slay finished the season with eight forced fumbles in 2005, but the single-game record was broken by Louisville defensive end Elvis Dumervil who had 10 last season.

Accompanying Slay last season in the starting secondary were senior strong safety Vincent Meeks nation.

Currently, as Tech enters the 2006 season, Huffman is the only returning starter to the secondary. Slay, Meeks and former team captain Nazruddin have departed from the collegiate level.

Replacing those three defensive catalysts and repeating their success may be a daunting task. But one newcomer to the starting defensive secondary received some rather worthy advice from the head-on collision that was Slay.

"Slay said close your eyes and go full head speed," sophomore free

safety and Slay's replacement Darcel McBath said. "Oh man, coming behind Slay, I've got some big shoes to fill. That's no doubt. He's a great player. I'm just trying to bring my part of the game to it, I mean I feel like I have some good things to offer."

Alongside McBath at strong safety will be junior Joe Garcia to help patrol the skies. Although Garcia started two games last season in place of Meeks, he said he is anxious to get back on the field and achieve some of his personal goals.

"I've got my own goals," Garcia said. "Just go out there and work hard. Last year I started the first two games so I know how that feels already. Going through the season I'll be used to it (starting), but it will be fun though,

Huffman said replacing the likes of Slay and Nazruddin may be rough, but the younger guys stepping in their shadows have the potential to live up to expectations.

"Those guys (Slay, Khalid), you know, definitely hard to replace them," the senior cornerback said. In 10 games last season, Parker made 21 tackles with three for loss, one interception and five pass deflections.
