Man freed after 12 years in prison

EL PASO (AP) — A man granted a new trial after serving 12 years in prison was freed after the murder charge against him was dropped.

The El Paso District Attorney's Office dismissed the charge Monday because of inadequate counsel in the first trial and a lack of physical evidence connecting Alejandro "Alex" Hernandez to the murder of Robert A. Cobb, a homeless man who was stabbed and beaten to death with a steering column

Earlier this summer, a state appellate court overturned Hernandez's 1994 conviction and ordered a new trial.

BARTOW, Fla. (AP) — A former Department of Homeland Security press aide pleaded no contest Tuesday to charges that he had sexually explicit online conversations with someone he thought was a 14-year-

Brian J. Doyle, 56, could face up to five years in prison under the plea agreement accepted Tuesday. He also faces at least 10 years' probation at sentencing scheduled for Nov. 17, and must register as a sex offender. He resigned from the department shortly after his April 4 arrest.

Thailand's military ousts prime minister

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) -Thailand's army commander ousted Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra in a military coup Tuesday night while he was in New York, circling his offices with tanks, declaring martial law and revoking the constitution. A military spokesman said army Commander-in-Chief Gen. Sondhi Boonyaratkalin would be acting prime minister. Sondhi, a Muslim in this Buddhist-dominated country, is known to be close to Thailand's revered monarch, King Bhumibol Adulyadej.

Lubbock mayor, Tech officials discuss possible relocation of A&M game to Dallas

By ANDREW GLOVER STAFF WRITER

ayor David Miller met with the Texas Tech athletic director, Gerald Myers, and associate athletic director, Craig Wells, to discuss the economics of the Texas Tech versus Texas A&M football game and whether it should be held in Lubbock or

Myers said Tech would get approximately \$4 million a year if the game was in Dallas compared to \$2 million every other year in Lubbock. "Playing a game like that creates a strong media presence," Myers said. "We have 50,000 alumni

in Dallas, so they would also have a strong presence." Myers said athletic department officials are thinking about implementing benefits for students if the

game moves to Dallas, which could include discounted student ticket prices. The athletic director said the game hasn't been moved yet, and there is still time for discussion before a decision is made. "We would discuss the location of the game with the administration and regents," Myers said.

"We haven't talked contracts with anyone in Dallas or the Aggies." Wells said athletic department officials already have talked about ways to increase revenues during football season. The athletic department raised season ticket prices this season. The increased ticket

prices did not cause an increase in student fees to attend athletic events, Wells said. "We have an agreement with the Student Government Association on how much the students

should pay in athletic fees," he said.

White House, Senate seek agreement on detainees

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top Senate Republican opposing President Bush's plan for handling terrorism suspects expressed tempered optimism Tuesday that the two sides could reach an accord on that key piece of the administration's anti-terror agenda before the November elections.

Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman John Warner, R-Va., declined to discuss the latest White House offer, which was sent to Capitol Hill late Monday. Warner said only that discussions were "constructive" and that he held "ray of optimism" an agreement would come soon.

Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, in New York for meetings at the United Nations, predicted Tuesday that President Bush and Congress would find language for interrogation and treatment of terror suspects that "gives the professionals, the people who actually interrogate, clarity on what is legal and what is not."

"I do believe that the president and the Congress can work together to get a law that allows us to get the information we need legally and within our treaty obligations to protect the American people and to protect people abroad," Rice said on NBC's "Today" show. "Nobody wants us to give up the methods and the program that has produced information that stopped attacks on the U.S. and abroad." While no details have been

divulged, the change in rhetoric was in stark contrast to last week when the two sides began counting votes and turned to the press to plead their case. And it came amid indications that Bush's plan was in increasing trouble in the both chambers of the GOP-run Congress. 'We share the president's goal

of enacting legislation preserving an effective CIA program to make us safe, upholding Geneva Convention protections for our troops, and passing constitutional muster," said Sen. Lindsey Graham in a statement Monday.

Graham, R-S.C., helped lead the charge against the administration's bill, alongside Warner, chairman of the Armed Services Committee, and John McCain, a prisoner of war in the Vietnam War.

The Senate Armed Services Committee last week passed the senators' proposal by a 15-9 vote, with mostly Democratic support. The president's measure would go further, allowing classified evidence to be withheld from defendants in terror trials and allowing coerced testimony. Bush also favors a narrower interpretation of the Geneva Conventions that would





Pope has nothing to be sorry about

giving a paper at the University of Regensburg only affirms the violent and irrational nature of the extremist sect of the Muslim religion. Even if the Pope had explicitly referred to Islam as an inherently violent religion, the irony of the Islamic response is overwhelming. Announcing that "the West is doomed" is hardly a convincing rhetorical response when one is upset at being called violent.

Note that I am referring to the Islamic extremists who, having misunderstood what the Pope said, have responded in a violent manner. I am not criticizing mainstream Islam, which has accepted the Pope's apology (though I hardly believe that he should have apologized at all), after realizing the misunderstanding. The Pope's paper had almost nothing to do with Islam at all, and the violence therein only came up when a medieval text was quoted to make a different point entirely. The thesis of the Pope's paper was regarding faith and rationality; that there must be some objective standard for interpreting religious scripture and the like — this standard being namely ancient Greek illuminate the general idea of the dialectic between faith and rationality was one of violence and religion.




The response by radical Islam to a largely misrepre- such violence is a prime instance of misusing a correct sented comment that the Pope made in passing while metaphysic to interpret religion. The larger point was that an irrational interpretation of any western religion permeates and is a byproduct of modern and post-modern philosophy. The Pope used violence in radical Islam as an example not to take a cheap shot at modern day Muslims, but to illuminate a centuries-old fallacy in religion in general. In fact, the bulk of the Pope's paper is a criticism of modernist Christian theology, not Islamic ethics.

> When the Pope summed up his thesis with the following, "The decisive statement in this argument against violent conversion is this: not to act in accordance with reason is contrary to God's nature," his point was a much larger one than radical Islam is wrong in using violence. However, had the Pope given an entire paper, or written 10 books, criticizing the violence of radical Islamists, he surely shouldn't apologize, but should be praised from all sides, especially the side containing peaceful Muslims who are lumped into the sad stereotype of Islamic sadism.





Two Tech freshmen arrested for felonies

Two Texas Tech students were arrested Monday afternoon on campus in relation to a felony arrest warrant issued by the Lubbock County Sheriff's Office.

Mathew Ezell and Billy Delp, both freshmen, were served warrants and taken to the Lubbock County jail after being escorted from campus by Tech Police and a Lubbock County Sheriff.

Roland Ponce, a deputy sheriff rests were made in response to a report filed about the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

"The charge is a felony," Ponce said. "It's basically like a car theft.'

One student, Delp, was arrested during class. Delp was called down from his seat in the biology lecture hall shortly after his introduction to cinema class began and was taken by police through the basement into the Biology building before being removed from campus.

The officers were assisted by members of the biology department because the class was held

in their facility. Andrew Johnson, a freshman from Colleyville and a friend of

Delp, was sitting next to Delp

when the arrest was made.

"I really had no idea. I really didn't think that they would take people out of class," Johnson said. "I thought it was school related. I didn't think it had to do with law enforcement."

Delp was contacted but declined to comment.

Maj. Gordon Hoffman with the Tech Police Department said the arrests were made by the Lubbock County Sheriff's office and Tech police were only present to offer assistance to the Sheriff.

Parents accused of kidnapping pregnant daughter

SALEM, N.H. (AP) - AMaine couple accused of tying up their 19-year-old daughter, throwing her in their car and driving her out of state to get an abortion were upset because the baby's father is black a Maine sheriff said Tuesday.

Katelyn Kampf, who is white, told Cumberland County Sheriff Mark Dion that her mother "was pretty irate at the fact that the child's father was black, and she had made a number of disparaging remarks about that," he said.

Katelyn Kampf escaped Friday at a Salem shopping center and called police, who arrested her parents, Nicholas Kampf, 54, and Lola, 53, both real estate developers from North Yarmouth, Maine.

The Kampfs were apparently taking their daughter to New York to try to force her to get an abortion there, police said.

The parents were arraigned Monday on kidnapping charges. The judge set bail at \$100,000 each and ordered the Kampfs to have no contact with their daughter. They posted bail Tuesday afternoon.

If convicted of kidnapping, the Kampfs face 7 1/2 to 15 years in prison. Dion said he expects to bring charges in Maine also, after investigators consult with the district attorney Wednesday.

Defense attorney Mark Sisti said Tuesday that a sworn statement by Salem police who interviewed both Katelyn Kampf and her parents said nothing about the father's race.

"This whole race-card thing is ridiculous and objectionable," said Sisti, who represented both of the Kampfs for their arraignment Monday, but is now representing only Lola Kampf. "There wasn't any mention in the sworn affidavit to the court about race being a factor in any way, shape or form."

Sisti also maintained there was no evidence a kidnapping had taken place in New Hampshire. The sworn affidavit said Katelyn described talking cordially with her parents during the trip from Maine.

But Salem Police prosecutor Ryan McFarland said in court Monday the Kampfs had their passports, rope, a rifle and ammunition in the car. He argued they posed a danger if released and could flee the country.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Police charged two men Tuesday with shooting five Duquesne University basketball players after a school dance, and they accused a 19-year-old sophomore of helping get the men and their friends into the dance despite knowing some were armed.

Brandon Baynes, 18, was arraigned on five counts of criminal attempt told police, she became aware that at homicide. Prosecutors also filed charges of aggravated assault, criminal conspiracy and weapons counts against him and William Holmes, 18. A reckless endangerment charge was also filed against Holmes, who is still being sought.

Three players remained hospitalized following Sunday's shootings after the dance. The most seriously wounded, junior forward Sam Ashaolu, 23, was in critical condition with bullet fragments in his head.

Brittany Jones, accused of helping get some young men with guns into the party, was arrested Monday on charges of reckless endangerment, carrying a firearm without a license and criminal conspiracy. She was arraigned and posted bond Tuesday morning.

plaint, Jones — who is active with the Black Student Union, which sponsored the dance — got a call from a man asking whether he and his brother could attend. They arrived with four others, including Baynes and Holmes, about midnight, according to police.

They asked Jones whether they were going to be "patted down" before entering, officials said. The doorman reportedly told Jones partygoers weren't being searched, and the men went into the dance, police said.

According to the criminal complaint against Baynes, a witness at the dance reported hearing an argument and saw two men firing guns at the victims. Using driver's license photos, the witness identified one man as Baynes.

Baynes did not speak during the brief court hearing. His father said the teen was not guilty.

"My son never fired a gun in his life," A.J. Baynes said. He said his son knew Holmes, but he would not or trial, she's presumed innocent," he

> In interviews Monday with The Associated Press, several players said the shooter was a non-student unhappy that the woman he accompanied to the dance had talked with a player. The shooter and at least one other man followed the players when they left the dance to walk to their dormitory,

Jones' attorney, James Ecker, would not confirm Tuesday whether she was cooperating with authorities and would not comment on reports that authorities may drop charges if she provides information to the police.

"I can say she's spent a lot of time with police in the last couple of days, Sunday and Monday," Ecker said.

University president Charles Dougherty said he was grateful to police for the "swift arrest of the individual who may have been the shooter in the vicious attacks on Duquesne University students last Sunday morning."

A university spokeswoman said the school was examining the allegations against Jones and would act in accordance with school policy.

Besides Ashaolu, the other injured players were junior guard Kojo Mensah, 21; 6-foot-7 forward Stuard Baldonado, 21; junior center Shawn James, 23; and Aaron Jackson, 20, a guard who is one of only two returning players from Duquesne's 3-24 team last season.

Baldonado was in fair condition Tuesday with arm and back injuries; he likely won't play this season because his back injury will require two to three months of rehabilitation. He was expected to be released from the hospital by the end of the week.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — His mother crying in the courtroom O'Brien said. behind him, Maurice Clarett stood before a judge as a common criminal he was a king.

Gone was the glory of having led Ohio State to a national championship as a freshman tailback, along with the can't-miss prospect of an NFL career.

In their place stood a prison term of at least 3 1/2 years, the product of a plea deal Clarett took Monday as he was about to be tried on allegagunpoint.

"He was up here," Clarett's attorney, Michael Hoague, said minutes later, raising his arm up to eye level. "He got down here," he said, lowering his arm to his waist. "And he's going to be back up here again."

Clarett was sentenced to 7 1/2 years with release from prison possible after 3 1/2 years. He also agreed to serve five years of probation for the robbery outside a bar early on New Year's Day and carrying a concealed weapon.

For Clarett, still just 22, the plea bargain preserved the chance he in the town where not so long ago could one day resurrect a career he had tried to keep going until the night last month that he led police on a highway chase in a sport utility vehicle with four loaded guns. 




