### Jailed ex-officer, 5 illegal immigrants escape

LA VILLA (AP) — A former police officer held on drug charges and five illegal immigrants escaped from a privately run federal jail near the Mexican border by overpowering a guard then cutting through at least four fences, officials said Wednesday.

More than 60 local and federal law-enforcement officers using helicopters and bloodhounds were searching near the East Hidalgo Detention Center, about 20 miles north of the border.

"We're considering all six individuals very dangerous and armed," Hidalgo County Sheriff Lupe Trevino said.

### Fed leaves interest rates unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Reserve left a key interest rate unchanged on Wednesday as falling energy prices helped to restrain inflation pressures.

Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and his colleagues issued a brief announcement saying they would leave the federal funds rate, the interest that banks charge each other, at 5.25 percent. The decision represents a break for borrowers. It means that banks' prime lending rate, the benchmark for millions of consumer and business loans, will remain at 8.25 percent.

## Birth control patch unsafe By LIZ BOYD

The Ortho-Evra contraceptive patch may be an unsafe alternative to birth control pills, according the United States Food and Drug Administration's Web site.

Labeling for the patch was updated in November 2005 and is seen in bold on the packaging for the product, according to the FDA's Web site.

The patch exposes women to 60 percent more estrogen than typical birth control pills containing 35 micrograms of estrogen, according to Ortho-Evra's Web site.

Lonnie Donalds, pharmacist for CVS in Lubbock, said he hasn't seen a decrease in Ortho-Evra use since the labeling update.

bock," Donalds said. "The use of the patch has remained stable."

According the FDA's Web site, estrogen, which is present in all birth control pills and the patch, is linked to blood clots in the legs and lungs.

The presence of estrogen is also linked to other clotting problems such as strokes and heart attacks.

Donalds said women who use the patch are not verbally told about the change.

"Each consumer is given a patient information sheet," Donalds said. "They are expected to read this because it has all of the valuable information and risk factors they need to know about."

Donalds said he sees the patch distributed, but birth control pills are more widely used.

"The No. 1 form of contraceptive that I see is the pill," Donalds said. "But there are women who use the patch."

Smoking increases the chance for blood clots, stroke and heart attack while on any form of hormonal birth control, including the patch and the pill, Donalds said.

"Smoking does increase your chances beyond the initial risk," Donalds said. "The best thing is to not smoke and see your doctor regularly if you are on birth control pills or the patch."

Dr. Kelly Bennett, medical director for Student Health Services, said some women have risk factors they are screened for before taking hormonal contraceptives.

# Boeing wins new contract for border technology

WASHINGTON (AP) - Boeing Co. will be awarded an \$80 million government contract to provide new high-tech ways to catch illegal immigrants trying to cross U.S. land borders, officials said Wednesday.

The contract is the first part of a multibillion-dollar Homeland Security Department plan to help secure the Canadian and Mexican borders, beginning with a section of Arizona. The final bill's total is unknown, a department official said, because it hinges largely on whether Congress will approve spending about \$1 billion to build a fence on the Mexican border. Until then, the contract will be given to Boeing in phases, the department official said.

The Boeing contract was expected to be announced Thursday, according to a congressional aide and an official of the agency who spoke on condition of anonymity because the department had not yet made its announcement.

Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, the Republican chair of the Senate Homeland Security Committee, called the program "a vital element in the strategy to better secure our homeland by strengthening border security."

Homeland Security Department spokesman Jarrod Agen would not comment. Boeing spokesman Dan Beck also declined to comment pending a formal announcement from the government.

Chicago-based Boeing was among several major defense companies competing for the job. While other companies' proposals relied more heavily on using flying drones to patrol the border, Boeing focused on a network of 1,800 high-tech towers, equipped with cameras and motion detectors, that could feed live information to Border Patrol agents.

The Boeing-led team's victory was reported in several newspapers Wednesday, citing unnamed sources.

The contract, part of the Secure Border Initiative, is the government's latest attempt to use advanced technology to solve the illegal immigration problem, which lawmakers have called a national security issue. It received new attention in light of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. Homeland Security gave companies chasing the contract - including Lockheed Martin Corp. and Northrop Grumman Corp. - unusual freedom to come up with their own ideas for how best to apply new and developing technologies to the problem.
