Schools reject incentive grants

AUSTIN (AP) - A handful of Texas schools are rejecting thousands of dollars in state money intended to reward teachers for high test scores in low-income areas.

Teachers have resisted the merit-pay program, which was approved in legislation in May and has been touted by Gov. Rick Perry, saying it fosters animosity and raises the stakes of the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills.

"A lot of our staff felt this would be a distraction to what we have our minds set to do: raise TAKS scores and improve student achievement," said Bea Cantu, principal at Bellaire Elementary School in Hurst, one of at least 21 schools that will send back \$90,000 in grants.

Rice: I don't recall alert about attack

SHANNON, Ireland (AP) — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said she cannot recall then-CIA chief George Tenet warning her of an impending al-Qaida attack in the United States, as a new book claims he did two months before the attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. "What I am quite certain of is that I would remember if I was told, as this account apparently says, that there was about to be an attack in the United States, and the idea that I would somehow have ignored that I find incomprehensible," Rice said.

Solana presses Iran on nuclear plans

LEVI, Finland (AP) — The EU foreign policy chief said he was resuming talks with Iran's top nuclear negotiator and warned Monday that the time for continuing negotiations on Tehran's atomic program was limited.

But Javier Solana denied he was running out of patience.

"We don't have an infinite length of time in front of us," he told reporters. "I'm not tired and I'm patient because I think that what we have at stake is very important."

TAKING EDUCATION HIGHER

Whitmore meets with other West Texas administrators to discuss future

Texas Tech President Jon Whitmore attended a conference on Monday to discuss the future of higher education with other West Texas educational leaders as well as members of the Lubbock community.

The "Solutions for Our Future" forum allowed West Texas universities to show how their involvement in a new advertising campaign designed to demonstrate how colleges and universities serve the public could affect federal and state funding for education.

Eugene Anderson, associate director of the National Initiatives American Council on Education, said American education is slipping behind the other world leaders, and his agency was searching for a new way to generate awareness when the campaign was formed.

"The U.S. is currently ranked ninth in the amount of high school educating a larger share, they're going to have a more educated society." He said the most people are shocked to learn that the U.S. is so far down better.

the list of countries that do the best job educating their populations. "The notion is that we are a world leader," he said. "Our position in 10 or 20 years could really be threatened."

Ronnie Sparks, a representative of the GSD&M advertising agency, said the new campaign is a great start to raising awareness about the educational crisis he believes America is now facing.

"The campaign was designed to be on the national level, but it can be retooled to work regionally," Sparks said. "The same things it takes to rattle somebody about higher education on the regional level is the same as the national level."

He said the West Texas Campaign Coalition, which includes Lubbock Christian University, South Plains College, Texas Tech University, the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and Wayland Baptist University, has set the standard for localizing the national effort.

"I haven't seen anybody take our campaign and use it like they have here," he said. "It's (the campaign) template material but it really goes beyond the ads. It's the spirit and the sentiment behind the message.'

Foley in rehab during FBI investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former Rep. Mark Foley, under FBI investigation for salacious e-mail exchanges with teenage congressional pages, has checked himself into rehabilitation facility for alcoholism treatment and accepts responsibility for his actions, his attorney said Monday.

The attorney, David Roth, would not identify the facility, but told The Associated Press in West Palm Beach, Fla., that Foley had checked in over the weekend.

"I strongly believe that I am an alcoholic and have accepted the need for immediate treatment for alcoholism and other behavioral problems," Foley, a Republican, said in a statement, Roth told

In scorching language, House Republican leaders on Monday condemned Foley's actions as they tried to contain the damage to the party five weeks before midterm elections.

"Congressman Foley duped a lot of people ... He deceived the good men and women in organizations around the country with whom he worked to strengthen child predator laws," Speaker Dennis Hastert told reporters. "I have

Two officers responded to a call on Saturday at 5:33 p.m. to investigate the assault claim, which occurred at Chitwood Hall.

Sgt. David Parker with Tech police said a thorough investigation was made and revealed no wrongdoing.

"It was a false alarm," Parker said. "The claim that was made was simply not true, and no sexual assault occurred."

He said he expected Housing and Residence Life to make a statement about the incident later this week to ease students' worries.

"I know that a lot of students were very upset by the whole thing," he said. "We want them to know that nothing happened."



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

Students' failure on civics test points to dismal future

ast week, the Intercollegiate Studies Institute's American Civic Survey Program released findings indicating the outright incompetence of American college students on questions relating to civics and U.S. history. Indeed, your average college senior could only manage 53 percent on the 60 question survey, which on a conventional grading scale would be an F.

According to Christopher Barnes, a member of the faculty of the University of Connecticut who helped develop and administer the survey, this wasn't an end-all test of American civics. Rather, it was an attempt to bring together a core set of questions which would encompass a broad range of topics.

Since the discovery, scientists have already made RNA interference a standard lab tool for studying what genes do. And they're working to use it to develop treatments against a long list of illnesses, including asthma, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, flu, Parkinson's and Huntington's diseases, and age-related macular degeneration, a major cause of blindness.

'This has been such a revolution in biomedicine, everybody is using it," said Thomas Cech, president of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, for which Mello is an investigator.

"It's so important that people almost take it for granted already, even though it was discovered fairly recently," said Cech, who won a Nobel in 1989 for RNA research.

Nobel prizes are generally awarded decades after the work that they honor, so a prize now for a finding published in 1998 is striking.

But it's appropriate, said Bruce Stillman, president of the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory in Cold Spring Harbor, N.Y., because the work "is recognized now as one of the really revolutionary changes in the way we think about how genes are controlled."

Genes produce their effect by sending molecules called messenger RNA to the protein-making machinery of a cell. The messenger RNA directs that machinery to produce a particular protein.

In RNA interference, certain molecules trigger the destruction or inactivation of the messenger RNA from a particular gene, so that no protein is produced. Thus the gene is effectively silenced.



spread out. Crime's not as centralized as it ever was in Overton." Clifton Wilkinson, vice president of

business development for McDougal Companies, said the master plan for redevelopment in the Overton district was created in 1999. Construction began later, after the company was able to purchase the land that once held single-family homes.

Wilkinson said the company's reason behind wanting to redevelop the district had nothing to do with crime.

"We wanted to revitalize downtown and build a gateway from Tech to downtown," Wilkinson said.

One of the problems with the district, he said, was the majority of home-owners did not live in the neighborhood. Only 45 of the 900 homes were inhabited by

More residences, including condominiums, single-family homes and student apartments, as well as new businesses like Ragin' Cajun restaurant, have made plans to open in the district, Wilkinson said. Construction, he said, is ahead of schedule and is set for completion by the end of 2008.

Wilkinson said the neighborhood and land already have increased in value. McDougal Properties bought the 325-acre plot of land for about \$26 million. The estimated value of the area after completion is \$500 million.

"It's already a better neighborhood," he said. "This benefits the city as new income, benefits the university and downtown and brings a new look to the city for visitors and football games."

Jack Davis, of Jack Davis Western Wear across from Tech on University Avenue, said he has seen many changes since his parents opened the doors for business in

He said the business had been burglarized before the recent redevelopment of the district.

"We went through periods of shoplifting," Davis said. "It's decreased since those houses moved out."

Davis said he can already see the changes the new development has brought to the neighborhood surrounding the business.

"We've been here probably longer than anyone else," he said. "We sure would like it for people to feel comfortable again."

Davis said he looks forward to the changes to business the redevelopment will bring.

"New business draws new customers," he said. "I want the more 'hot places' that draw not only people from campus but town people back here as well."


