### Maples found innocent of conspiring to falsify logs

McALLEN (AP) — The owner of the bus that exploded and killed 23 people during the Hurricane Rita evacuation was acquitted Tuesday of one safety violation charge but was convicted on two lesser counts.

James Maples, 65, was found not guilty of conspiring to falsify logs but convicted of poorly maintaining his fleet and not requiring drivers to fill out vehicle inspection reports. His company, Global Limo Inc., which was also on trial, was found guilty on all charges.

"We thought that was a victory, a victory to the Good Lord," said Maples, a former professional football player who appeared relieved by the outcome.

### Miami Herald publisher resigns

MIAMI (AP) — The Miami Herald's publisher resigned Tuesday, saying "ambiguously communicated" personnel policies resulted in the firings of three journalists at its Spanish-language paper who were paid to appear on U.S.-government broadcasts aimed at promoting democracy in Cuba.

Jesus Diaz Jr., the papers' publisher since July 2005, had dismissed two El Nuevo Herald reporters and a freelance contributor who had been paid by Radio Marti and TV Marti.

### Two U.S. troops killed in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) -Gunbattles in Afghanistan left two U.S. troops and at least one NATO soldier dead, officials said Tuesday, as the Western alliance prepared to assume military command over the country from the U.S.-led coalition.

One NATO soldier was killed and another was presumed dead when insurgents attacked a patrol in Kandahar province in southern Afghanistan on Tuesday, a statement by the alliance said.

# KINKY AS A PIRAJE

Gubernatorial candidate visits Tech, discusses upcoming election

Introduced as "the man who is breathing life into the Texas governmental system," gubernatorial candidate Kinky Friedman walked on stage to greet a crowd of more than 400 Tech students in the Allen Theatre on Tuesday.

The event, planned by the campus organization Techsans for Independence, showcased Friedman and allowed for questions from the crowd as well as autographs and photo opportunities afterward.

After congratulating the crowd for the Tech win over Texas A&M, Friedman said he fell asleep in the last three minutes of the game. He said when he woke up, he saw coach Mike Leach talking.

"I saw the coach saying, 'Every once in a while a pirate can beat a soldier,' and that is going to happen on Nov. 7," he said.

Some issues Friedman discussed on stage included illegal immigration, corruption in Austin, education and the importance of independent candidates, with jokes and stories peppered throughout.

Friedman said he believed this campaign marks the first time in 150 years an independent candidate has the chance to become governor. The last independent governor of Texas was

# Regents closer to naming chancellor

The Texas Tech Board of Regents conducted an executive session meeting Tuesday afternoon to discuss the future of the chancellor position, which has not been permanently filled since former Tech Chancellor Dr. David Smith resigned in January.

Regent Mark Griffin and Student Regent Chad Greenfield were the only members of the board present while the regents joined the meeting via conference call.

"What's happened today is the board, really for the first time since the search began, went over the qualifications," Griffin said. "It was more clarification and getting down to the strengths and weaknesses."

He said while the discussion covered the topic of a new chancellor, it was not in any way a process of elimination for the candidates. "It really was just a wide-ranging

## Bush supports Hastert call for investigation

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP) — President Bush said Tuesday he was "shocked and dismayed" at disgraced lawmaker Mark Foley's behavior and supports House Speaker Dennis Hastert's call for a full investigation.

"This investigation should be thorough and any violation of the law should be prosecuted," Bush said while campaigning for Republican lawmakers in California.

Some, including a Washington newspaper, have called for Hastert to resign, but Bush expressed confidence in the speaker's ability to resolve the matter, calling him a "father, teacher, coach."

"I know Denny Hastert. I meet with him a lot. He is a father, teacher, coach who cares about the children of this country," Bush said. "I know that he wants all the facts to come out." Bush took no questions. And as

he stepped toward his motorcade, the president ignored a shouted question directly asking whether Hastert should resign.

The president spoke after Hastert brushed aside any suggestion of resignation Tuesday as House Republican

# Former nurse pleads no contest to killing 10 patients

FORT WORTH (AP) — A something to her." former hospital nurse pleaded no contest Tuesday to killing 10 patients nearly six years ago. by injecting them with a drug used to temporarily halt breathing.

Vickie Dawn Jackson, 40, will be sentenced to life in prison, the maximum sentence she faced if she had been convicted by a jury.

Authorities have not offered a motive for the slayings.

Defense attorney Bruce Martin said Jackson decided to enter the plea because her adult daughter was on the state's witness list.

"She has never admitted guilt and she was never convicted by a jury," Martin said. "And her daughter never had to testify

Lt. Gen. H. Steven Blum, chief of the National Guard Bureau, said the results for the 2006 budget year that ended Sept. 30 were the best since he took the post more than three years ago, and he said the outcome was far brighter than was forecast a year ago when the Guard fell 20 percent short of its recruiting goal.

"While we're being stretched and while we're being stressed" by the demands of simultaneous wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, "we still are demonstrating on encouraging others to join. The judges adjourned July 27 to consider their ruling, and had been expected to announce it Oct. 16.

Court spokesman Raid Juhi told the Associated Press a session will be held Oct. 16, but it "will not be for the verdict. It's for the judges' review of the evidence." He did not say when the verdict would be issued.

A court official, speaking on condition of anonymity because he was not allowed to release the information, said the verdict could be put off until late October or early November.





### FTC approves Lockheed-Boeing rocket deal

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Trade Commission said Tuesday it has approved the joint venture between defense contractors Lockheed Martin Corp. and Boeing Co. to launch government satellites, removing a final barrier to the long-delayed proposal.

While the commission concluded that the \$1.06 billion partnership between the nation's two biggest defense firms could unfairly muscle out competitors, it said that concern was outweighed by the national security demands for a reliable and cheaper way to send military and other satellites into space.

The so-called United Launch Alliance, or ULA, was proposed in May 2005 to resolve a long-standing dispute between Lockheed and Boeing, then the two major suppliers of rockets for government launches.

It also came after Boeing was stripped of \$1 billion in launch contracts and suspended for 20 months from launches by the Air Force after accusations that it used thousands of sensitive documents stolen from Lockheed to gain an edge in the bitter rivalry. Boeing later agreed to pay \$615 million to end a Justice Department probe of the case.

The FTC decision "brings the ULA closer to the goal of meeting the government's need for reliable, lower-cost launch services for national security, civil and scientific payloads," Boeing spokesman Dan Beck said.

Lockheed spokesman Tom Jurkowsky, calling the decision good news, said the two companies still needed to complete reams of legal documents before the deal closes.

ULA will be a 50-50 venture between the two companies, each providing a \$530.7 million stake. It is planned for Denver and would combine launch services for Boeing's Delta and Lockheed's Atlas rockets, known as expendable launch vehicles. The venture is expected to save about \$150

million annually. The government already had few contractors to choose from. Maryland-based Lockheed and Chicago-based Boeing are the only domestic suppliers of medium to heavy rockets. California-based Northrop Grumman is the only other major competitor in the domestic space launch vehicle business, according to the FTC.

The FTC set conditions on the deal such as requiring ULA to not favor Lockheed and Boeing on issues such as who makes the satellites that are launched and other contracting issues. It also requires ULA to guard trade secrets closely.

## Dow Jones average reaches new heights

NEW YORK (AP) — The Dow Jones industrial average finally reached new heights Tuesday, extending Wall Street's seven-year recovery with a record closing level after climbing into uncharted territory in trading earlier in the day.


The index of 30 blue chip stocks ended the session at 11,727.34, wiping out the previous record of 11,722.98.

Earlier, the Dow crossed its old trading high of 11,750.28, rising up to 11,758.95. Both of the previous records were set Jan. 14, 2000.

While investors welcomed the Dow's latest achievement, it comes at a time the stock market is more conservative, even more muted, than the Wall Street of early 2000. Then, investors were still piling exuberantly into high-tech stocks. In 2006, the market's gains come only after investors' careful parsing of economic data and corporate earnings reports.

Tuesday's advance came on the second straight day that oil prices fell sharply, helping to calm fears about inflation and possible interest rate increases.




