SPCAA assists families in home purchase

South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. (SPCAA) Community Services Division has received notification of a grant from Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs in the amount of \$200,000 for Homebuyer Assistance. The assistance is for closing costs and down payment, not to exceed \$5,000, for low-income residents of Bailey, Cochran, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum counties.

"In the past two years we have assisted 23 families in purchasing a home, but there are over 300 enrolled in the program who are actively working toward home owner-

ship," said Judy Norton, program specialist, who has worked with the Homebuyer Assistance program for the past three years.

Norton, who received her bachelor of science degree in sociology from ENMU in Portales, lives in Muleshoe but

commutes to the SPCAA home office in Levelland.

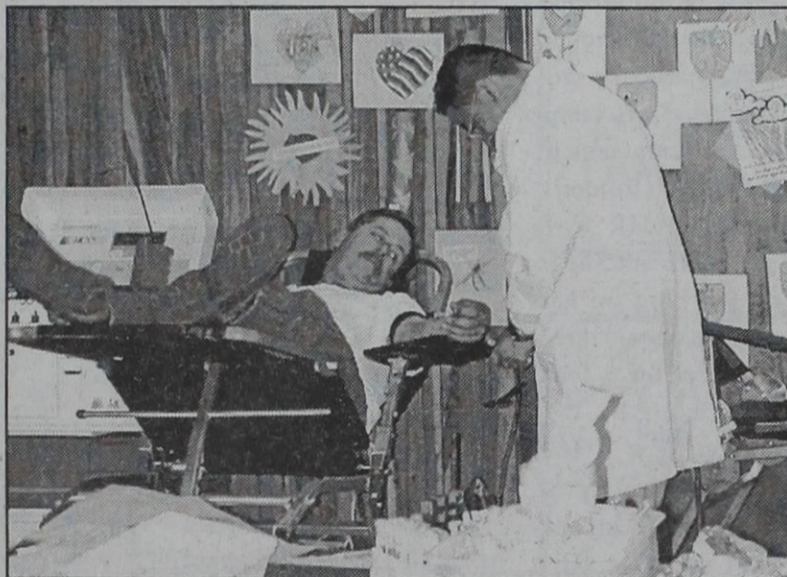
According to Norton, to qualify for this assistance, families must meet the income guidelines for their family size and they cannot have owned property in the past three years. "About 97 percent of the fami-

lies who apply qualify for this program," said Norton.

The program offers more than just financial assistance. Pre-purchase counseling is given to clients, including topics on readiness to buy a home, selecting, financing, budgeting and credit, and maintaining a home and finances. The program also offers post-purchase counseling, including topics such as delinquency intervention to ensure a family will not lose their home.

"Many people who think they have bad credit may not necessarily have bad credit," said Norton. "There may be incorrect information on the credit report or people may

Hospital District board meets

The board of directors for the Muleshoe Area Hospital District met August 21 for their monthly meeting.

Board members present were Buck Campbell, president; Mike Miller, vice president; Arline Phelps, secretary; Lary Hooten and Ronnie Dent.

Employees of the district present were Jim Bone, CEO; Sharon Novak, CFO; Bill Saxton, Park View Administrator; LeShea Mason, administrative assistant; and Kathy Smallwood, MDS coordinator for Park View.

Campbell called the meeting to order and the minutes of the last meeting were presented and approved.

Campbell called for an open forum at which time Smallwood came forward to explain the tile and MDS system. MDS stands for minimum data set. This is a care plan that is set up for each resident in Park View. The tiles are documentation of the daily activities for each resident.

Apparently, the information recorded in the tiles had been inconsistent among different staff members. Smallwood explained

think because they have paid bills a few days late, then they have bad credit. Late payments do not go on a credit report until they are 30 days late."

The program teaches clients how to read credit reports, how to correct mistakes and how to handle valid adverse credit information.

After the credit issues are taken care of, the family can begin the process of buying a home. According to Norton, the buying family chooses the bank, the realtor and they shop for the homes themselves. "We can help identify some in the area if we are asked but there is no list that we work from," said Norton. "Also we work with the real estate agent and the lender to see that they shop for something they can afford. We will not let them get in over their heads."

Norton is in the process of training Donna Ulrich to take over this particular program because she is being moved to a different area in the agency. Ulrich formerly worked for MHMR with similar programs and she is currently working on her bachelor of science degree in social work at Texas Tech University.

Currently, the Homebuyer Assistance program has not helped anyone in Bailey County to purchase a home because there are not enough applicants.

chase a home because there are not enough applicants.

"To solve this dilemma, we will be holding an orientation for Bailey County on September 18 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. in the Community Room of Muleshoe State Bank. Childcare will be available and anyone interested is invited to attend," said Leonor Arrieta, who has been a Bailey County SPCAA Center worker for 11 years.

If an interested person is unable to attend this orientation, he or she should call their local SPCAA center. Residents of Bailey County should call Leonor or Janie at 272-7537. Bilingual assistance is available. The Bailey County Center is at 804 W. American Boulevard.

"To apply for any program offered by the agency, a person needs to bring social security cards and proof of income for all persons in the home," said Arrieta. "If they meet the requirements for the homebuyer program, then I will set up an appointment for them with Donna."

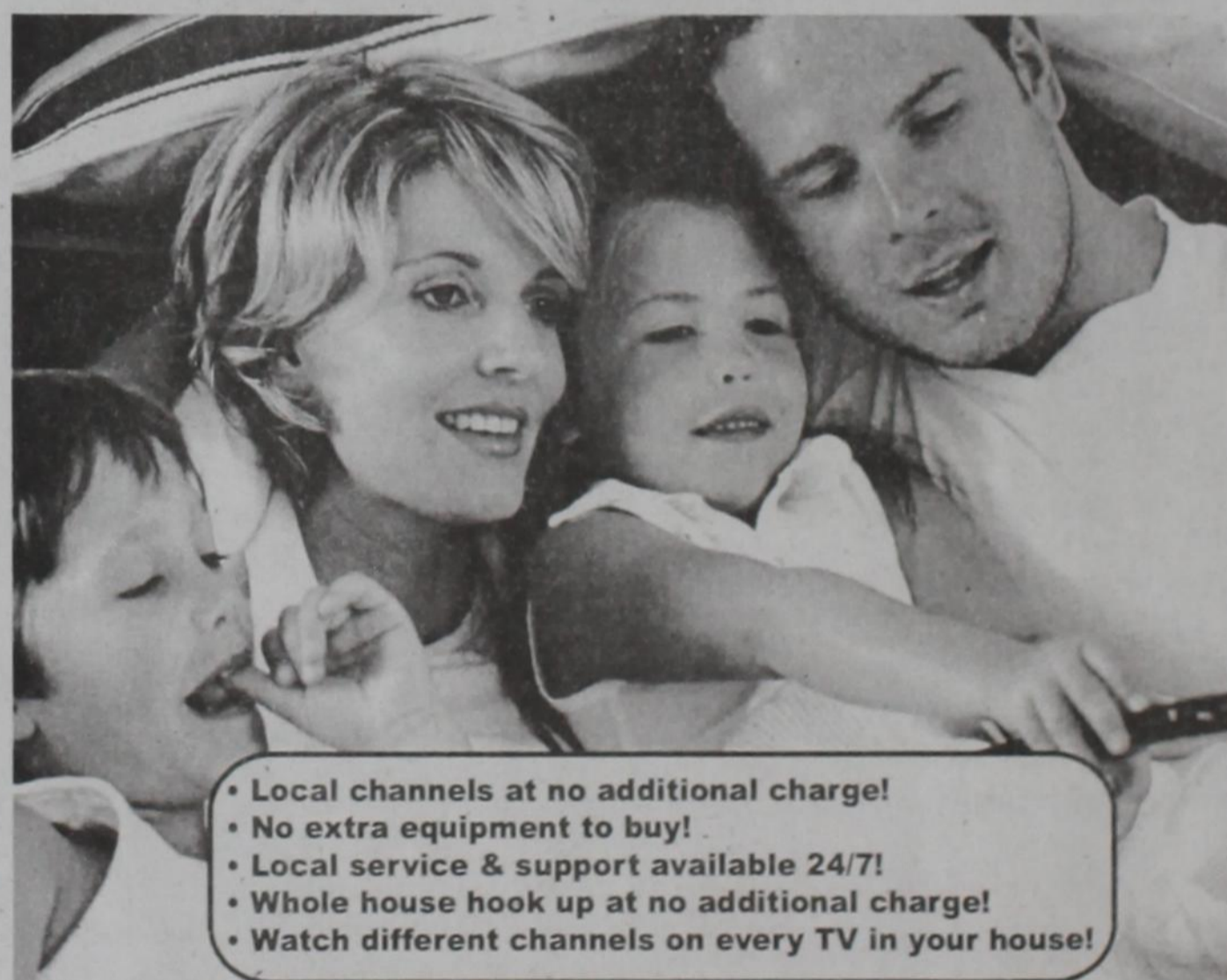

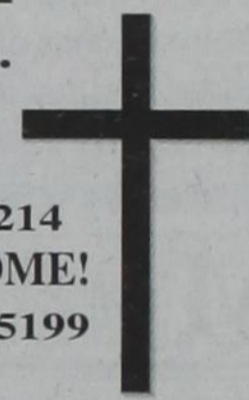

seconded by Dent and approved by all present.

The board voted to table the discussion of adoption of medical staff by-law revision until next month.

Phelps made a motion to adopt the proposed budget of \$12,765,898 and the board voted to approve the recommended budget for fiscal year 2003-2004.

Novak gave the financial reports for the previous month stating that revenues remained above budget and expenses were also above budget. She also reported over \$30,000 in bad debt this month.

The board voted to establish the tax rate of 25 cents per evaluation for fiscal year 2004. Bone stated that the rate is lower than most districts and it has been the same since 1989.

Bone recommended Dr.

Ryan Johnson for surgery department medical director. Phelps made a motion to appoint Johnson for that position; it was seconded by Dent and approved by all present.

Saxton gave the administrative report for Park View. He reported 72 residents—21 private pay and 51 medicaid/hospice residents. He also reported that Medicaid decreases next year will be three to three and a half percent, according to the state association.

The new director of nurses for Park View starts work September 1. Jan Seltzer is from Post and her key area is labor control and costs. She should be able to help the nursing home to decrease its over budget expenses, according to Saxton.

"I think she has a strong idea of the number of staff it takes to provide the necessary level of care," said Bone who

sat in on Seltzer's interview.

Apparently, the reason Park View's expenses are over budget is due to the amount of contract labor needed in order to run the facility. Saxton reported that as of September, the facility will no longer need contract LVNs, which will drastically cut expenses. Also, the hospital hopes to hire more local CNAs through the CNA classes offered by the hospital. This will further decrease the need for contracting nurses from out of the area.

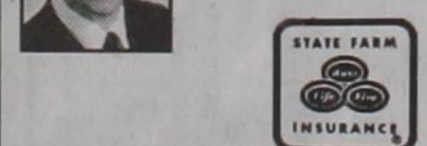
The board went into a closed session to discuss physician contracts and later the meeting was adjourned.



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OPEN LETTER TO GOVERNOR PERRY

Governor Perry as a fellow Texan I am questioning our state leadership. The following outline states some of my immediate concerns.

- (1) Texas became a Republican state when the Republican Party earned the confidence of the Texas voter through strong leadership and running on a sound people's platform. The leadership worked among the citizens of this great state to seeking out their concerns for our state as well concerns they had for our nation. 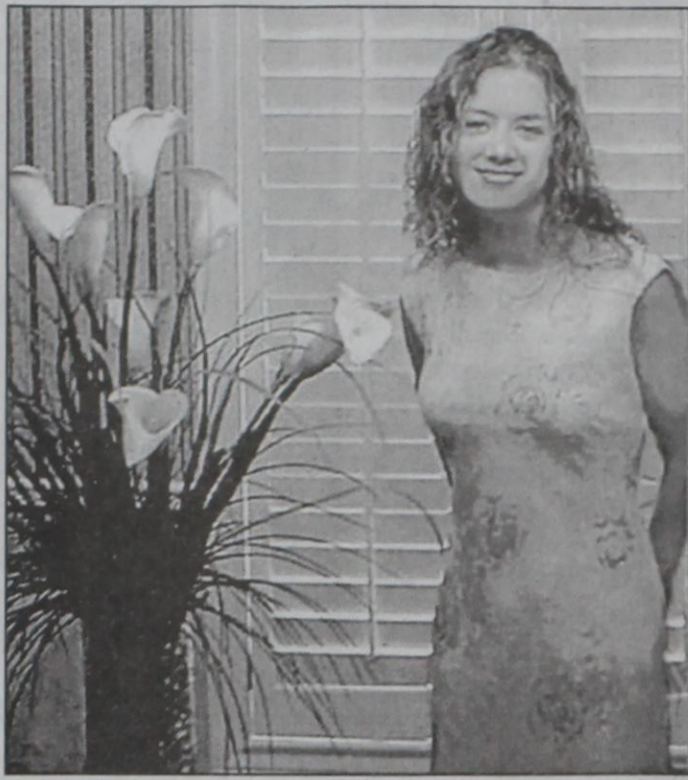

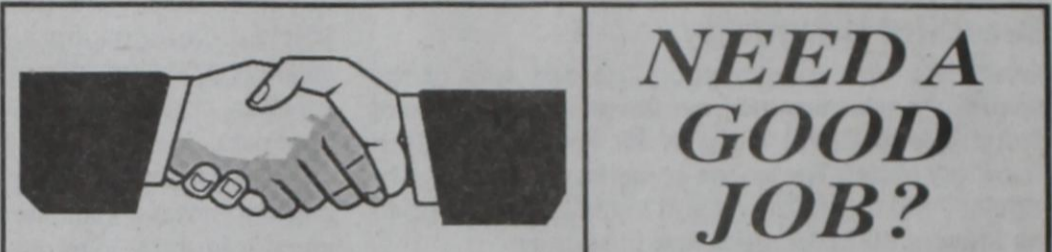

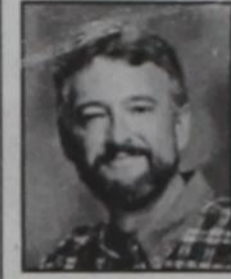

In *The Gathering Storm*, the first volume of his enthralling history of *The Second World War*, Winston Churchill writes that in 1932, that malignant little pustule of a human being, Adolf Hitler (Churchill calls him "the Corporal"), had beguiled thirteen million German voters. What that says about the collective wisdom of the fickle masses is not flattering, and I personally doubt that the masses in most other times and most other lands can lay

technological society we could adopt some system where each voter in our land voted for officials and laws simply by pressing a button on his computer. Away with Congress! We could run the land ourselves. (We'd certainly also do away with the electoral college in presidential elections and the masses in the big cities would always and forever trump the less populous masses in rural America.) Were we ever to become a "pure democracy," I'd be on the first boat back to England and "God save the Queen!"

Back to the story. Churchill says that when, in 1932, Germany's old Field Marshal von Hindenburg saw Hitler, he said, "That man for Chancellor? I'll make him a postmaster and he can lick stamps with my head on them." Hindenburg evidently recognized a pygmy when he saw one, but the people had spoken—very poorly. Every vote would become a vote cast for misery, murder, and bloodshed, but in 1933, "the Corporal," Adolf Hitler, became Chancellor of Germany. So much for the wisdom of the masses.

claim to much better judgment than the Germans of 1932. I know little about the style of government in Germany in 1932 and I think I'm almost as ignorant about the style of our own. (And many other factors conspired to darken history's pages with the likes of Hitler.) But, I'm thankful that we are a Republic, not a pure democracy. In theory, at least, our people elect the best and the brightest among us to represent us in government and enact the laws that govern our land. If we get bad laws and ineffective government, it's because "we the people" have elected too many of the wrong people to represent us. Our system certainly has its flaws, but, in my opinion, it is immeasurably better than a pure democracy. I suppose, theoretically, in our modern

And what about the church? How should God's people be governed? It was another of England's best prime ministers, Margaret Thatcher, who surprised me by saying this: "When God's people come together to take counsel, it is not to determine the will of the majority. It is to ascertain what is the will of the Holy Spirit." Speaking in Texan, not the King's English, I'd just say, "There's a passel of wisdom in that."
