Council discusses keeping immigrants out

FARMERS BRANCH (AP) - Council members were in a closed meeting with the city attorney Monday to discuss legal ramifications of proposals intended to keep illegal immigrants away from this Dallas suburb.

It was unclear whether the proposals, which would make English the official language of Farmers Branch and fine landlords and businesses that deal with illegal immigrants, would go to a vote Monday.

Opponents of the measures, meanwhile, collected signatures on a petition urging the city not to become the first in Texas to pass such strong anti-immigrant laws.

Administration: Detainees have no rights

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Bush administration said Monday that Guantanamo Bay prisoners have no right to challenge their detentions in civilian courts and that lawsuits by hundreds of detainees should be dismissed. In court documents filed with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, the Justice Department defended the military's authority to arrest people overseas and detain them indefinitely without access

U.S. warns Iraq to stop Shiite militias

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — The U.S. Central Command chief confronted Iraq's prime minister on Monday over how Iraqi forces would halt raging violence and signaled a possible prelude to shifts in American policy on engaging Iran and Syria. The meeting came as sectarian attacks killed at least 90 people throughout Iraq, 46 of them showing signs of torture. The U.S. military announced the deaths of four additional American soldiers.

Students rally support for local store battling Tech lawsuit

In reaction to a judgment passed down by a federal judge on Thursday Outfitters, students took to the free-speech zone.

Stephen Spiegelberg, an employee at Red Raider Outfitters and the son of the owner of the store, said the judgment awarded Tech \$3.1 million. The judge ruled that Red Raider Outfitters violated licensing agreements with the school by using the terms "Raiderland" and "Wreck 'em Tech."

"We're now beginning the appeals process," Spiegelberg said. Friday and then again on Monday, students stood in the free-speech zone on. handing out free shirts and rallying passersby for support of the store.

"I absolutely had nothing to do with this," Spiegelberg said. "I did not

organize this at all."

Though he did not organize the students, Spiegelberg said he supports what they are trying to do.

"I think it's great," he said. "It almost brought me to tears on Friday night in regard to a licensing lawsuit between Texas Tech and Red Raider when I heard about it. What Tech did was unjust, and they are trying to

Spiegelberg said it was refreshing to see students caring for and fighting

"This is what is great about the free speech area," he said. "There's literally hundreds upon hundreds of students out there caring."

Bush trades ideas with Iraq panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush traded ideas on Iraq with a bipartisan commission Monday and promised to work with the incoming Democratic majority toward "common objectives." At the same time, he renewed his opposition to any timetable for withdrawing U.S.

As Bush met with the Iraq Study Group, the Democrat in line to lead the Senate Armed Services Committee, Carl Levin of Michigan, said the administration didn't see that "we're getting deeper and deeper into a hole."

Levin and other Democrats called for some troops to come home right away, suggesting that would pressure the Iraqi government into assuming more responsibility.

Bush in turn had stern words for the Democrats, less than a week after they won control of both chambers of Congress in midterm elections in which the Iraq war figured promi-

Asked about proposals by Levin and others for a phased troop reduction, Bush said, "I believe it is very important ... for people making suggestions to recognize that the best military options depend upon the conditions on the ground."

While Democrats agree that troops should leave Iraq sooner rather than later, they remain divided on the specifics. Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa., a contender to become the next majority leader, supports an immediate withdrawal of all troops, whereas Levin and others favor a slower phased withdrawal and have been reluctant to suggest a firm timetable.

Whereas Murtha and some others contend violence in Iraq will continue so long as U.S. troops are present, Levin and others warn that any withdrawal of troops must be

New Spanish program will remain at Tech, fully implemented in spring

The new course curriculum offered by the Spanish program at Texas Tech is set to be fully implemented starting in the spring.

In the classes, Spanish is the only language spoken and grammar is taught outside of the classroom through online exercises. The method is used for the Comprehensive Spanish Review, A Second Course in Spanish I and II and the Intensive Spanish — Second classrooms and the same cost."

Frederick Suppe, professor and chair of the Department of Classical and Modern Languages and Literatures, said the program is no longer considered experimental.

Suppe said the classes emphasize listening comprehension, writ-

ing, speaking and vocabulary.

He said the program was put in place to decrease class sizes better grades in classes. based on guidelines provided by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages.

The council recommends each foreign class has no more than 20 students. Prior to the curriculum redesign, Suppe said many classes. classes had up to 32 students.

being able to accommodate more students. Suppe said he believes the key to the program is research. Roadmap to Redesign. Research has shown things usually taught in workbooks are better taught online.

He said data has shown students are learning more and making

Controlled experiments compile demographic, academic and survey data on students that Suppe said cover all aspects of language acquisition. He said all data has shown most students enjoy the

"Every feature of this redesign has been done on the empirical data that shows students like it better, they're learning more, that our teaching methods are more effective," Suppe said.

The curriculum redesign is part of a national federal program by the National Center for Academic Transformation, or NCAT, called



Marine to plead guilty in probe of Iragi civilian's death

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Another Marine charged with kidnapping and murdering an unarmed Iraqi civilian in the town of Hamdania has agreed to plead guilty to lesser charges, his attorney said Monday. That means four of the eight U.S. troops charged have now struck plea bargains.

Steve Immel, attorney for Lance Cpl. Jerry E. Shumate Jr., said his client would plead guilty to charges of aggravated assault and conspiracy to obstruct justice. He said the original charges, including murder and kidnapping, would be dismissed.

Shumate, 21, of Matlock, Wash., is the third Marine to make a deal in the case. A Navy medic on patrol with the squad has also pleaded guilty to lesser charges.

According to court testimony, the troops planned to kidnap and kill a known insurgent and, when they couldn't get to him, some members of the squad went into a neighboring house and kidnapped Hashim Ibrahim Awad, 52.

Prosecutors say squad members tied Awad up, put him in a hole and shot him, then placed an AK-47 in his hands and a shovel in the hole to make it appear he was an insurgent planting explosives.

One squad member, Lance Cpl. Tyler A. Jackson, said he thought the man was a known insurgent, learning only later that it was Awad. However, Navy corpsman Petty Officer 3rd Class Melson J. Bacos testified that he knew the man was not the suspected insurgent.

Immel said his client would probably be in court next Monday to plead guilty.

"He's relieved to be putting this behind him," Immel said. "He is a young man who is a danger to no one."

Marine spokesman Maj. Jeff Nyhart declined to comment.

Baker and Hamilton later put out a joint statement. "We were pleased to meet with senior administration officials today and look forward to our consultations with some top Democrats tomorrow. We are working expeditiously to complete our report and recommendations," the statement said.

Bush discussed the meeting with reporters during a picture-taking session in the Oval Office with visiting Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert.

"I was impressed by the questions they asked. They want us to succeed in Iraq, just like I want us to succeed. So we had a really good discussion," Bush said.

As to newly empowered Democrats, he said, "What's interesting is they're beginning to understand that with victory comes responsibility, and I'm looking forward to working with the Democrats to achieve common

objectives." White House spokesman Tony Snow described the meeting with the Iraq panel as a "general conversation about the situation there," rather than a preview of what the group will recommend. "This was not proposalshopping by the Iraq Study Group," Snow said

Iraqi forces take charge in one of Baghdad's most dangerous areas

BASE FALCON, Iraq (AP) of one of the most dangerous sections of Baghdad to the Iraqi army on Monday — part of a gradual transition that would allow U.S. forces to begin pulling out.

The Iraqi troops took charge of the Sunni-dominated southern part of the capital after months of training and joint missions with American forces. U.S. officers say the Iraqis are up to the task and the battalion's 32-year-old commander issued a defiant challenge to the insurgents whose attacks helped parts of the area earn the nickname, "Triangle of Death."

"The terrorists want to kill the Iraqi people," Col. Ali Fadil said following the handover ceremony at a sprawling base on Baghdad's southern edge. "But we will not alour own lives."

The handover is part of a process that could determine when U.S. forces can finally begin withdrawing, more three years after embarking on an occupation now facing a stubborn insurgency and growing killings among Shiites and Sunnis. President Bush says he







of the United States of America convenes Jan. 2, 2007, the first item on the agenda, as promised by future Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi, will be an increase in the national minimum wage.

The minimum wage, set in 1997, sits at \$5.15 an hour. At 40 hours a week, 52 weeks a year, the wage equals a salary of a little more than \$10,000 per year.

The Department of Health and Human Services lists the poverty level for a single adult as an income of \$9,800 a year. Add another person, and it becomes \$13,200. A third person brings the total to \$16,600. You can see how easily a single parent family with that adult earning minimum wage could quickly become overwhelmed.



On each of the 25 campuses, Mr. Youth employed two student representatives to get the word out. Schoenberg said the two students utilized guerilla advertising tactics, such as word of mouth techniques, to promote the

"Our goal is to drive students to the General Motors Web site to provide information about the company to students," Schoenberg said. "The students can enter a sweepstakes for a chance to win a new car and receive a free ticket for the Jack Black movie."

According to its Web site, Mr. Youth develops integrated marketing techniques to reach the 14-22 age demographic. Mr. Youth creates partnerships with companies like Dell and Neutrogena, so these companies can reach the college population.

Schoenberg said companies have to said. provide a product to the customer to get their attention, whether it be an online sweepstakes to win a new GM car or a free movie ticket.

"Students love iPod giveaways," Schoenberg said. "We are trying to create a connection with the youth and create buzz on campus with these giveaways."

He said there are a number of reasons why college students are targeted rather than other sections of the population.

"We are trying to create brand equity up front at a young age," Schoenberg said. "They may not be in the market for a new car right now, but further down the road, we want them to already have

But Mr. Youth is not the only company setting up campaigns on campuses across the nation.

According to Campus Party's Web site, the company strives to reach college students because they are geographically stable and have a monthly disposable income of more than \$600.

"It's the fastest growing market in the nation," Schoenberg said. "We work because of this."

Cross country sprints to NCAA Championships

Perfection is a rarity. However, for Texas Tech cross country runner Sally Kipyego, perfection has been her game plan for all of the 2006

After finishing ahead of the competition in the Mountain Regional Championships Saturday, Kipyego has placed first in all five meets she ran this season. The first-place finish guided the No. 17 Red Raiders to a second-place finish in the regional championships and an automatic bid to the NCAA Championships for the women's team. Tech's Kevin Chelimo will be traveling Nov. 20 to Terre Haute, Ind., along with the women's team, to represent the men's team in the NCAA Cham-

The automatic bid is Tech's first in school history, and coach Jon Murray said his athletes' strenuous work all season has finally paid off.

"We did a great job of stepping a subpar day.

up and performing well," Murray said. "Our goal was to do well enough to receive an automatic bid, and we did."

Murray said the automatic bid for the team relieves a lot of pressure and worries that the team had going into the regional meet.

The Tech women placed second behind Colorado, who finished 23 points better than the Red Raiders; however, they did upset 12th-ranked Brigham Young in the regional meet.

The Red Raiders face a tough field of nationally ranked teams at the NCAA Championships, including top-ranked Stanford — the defending 2005 NCAA Champions — and No. 9 Colorado, who took home second place last year.

"Stanford is the favorite, as usual," Murray said. "Then there is Colorado, who we have already had the chance to compete against."

Murray said the NCAA Championships always have stiff competition, and it is difficult to predetermine who is going to show up and who will have

"Last year Duke was winning at the halfway mark but ended up finishing in third place," Murray said, explaining the close competition of the NCAA Championships.

Senior Kevin Chelimo is the only men's Tech runner to receive a bid for the individuals meet, and he looks to improve on his performance from last year's NCAA Championships.

"It's good seeing him back at the nationals for another year of competi-

Murray said he holds high expectations for Kipyego in the national

"She's been phenomenal," Murray said of the first-year Tech runner. "She handled everything thrown at her this season. She is considered in the top-five runners at nationals, but it all depends on who wakes up ready to run that day. It's going to be a very close meet."

The NCAA Championships begin Sunday, hosted by Indiana State, at the LaVern Gibson Championship Course in Terre Haute, Ind.




