## West Camp And Muleshoe Schools To Vote Saturday On Consolidation

### Baptist Revival Begins Tonight

Revival services at the Main St. Baptist Church in Muleshoe are to begin tonight, Thursday, July 15. Rev. A. L. Meador of Paducah will conduct the revival, according to announcement of the pastor, Rev. M. E. Robinson.

Rev. Robinson, on behalf of the church, issued an invitation to all to attend the revival services.

### Loan Cotton To Be Pooled August 1

All 1947 crop loan cotton still under loan on August 1, 1948, will be pooled by Commodity Credit Corporation for the producers' account. Troy L. Atkinson, chairman of the Bailey County Agricultural Conservation Committee, reminded cotton farmers of Bailey County this week.

Mr. Atkinson said that all 1947 crop cotton under CCC loan that is not redeemed by August 1, 1948, will be placed in pools and sold in orderly manner by CCC. After July 31, 1948, producers will not be entitled to order the sale of cotton. The loans mature on that date.

When all the cotton in the pools has been sold, the net proceeds, if any, after deduction of all advances, interest and accrued costs will be distributed among the producers whose cotton was placed in the pools. No payment will be made to producers at the time their cotton is placed in the pools.

Before July 31, 1948, farmers with loan cotton may either sell their "equity" in the cotton or redeem it from the loan and sell on the open market.

The school consolidation election between the Muleshoe and West Camp independent school districts will be held the coming Saturday, July 17, according to announcement from the office of Cecil H. Tate, county judge and ex-officio school superintendent of Bailey County.

An election held several months ago by the two districts resulted in a defeat for the proposal to consolidate the two districts. Later, people residing in an area comprising about thirty square miles, voted to consolidate with Farwell school district.

The remaining section, consisting of about 65 to 70 square miles will now decide whether to consolidate with the Muleshoe district.

Muleshoe district people will vote on the proposal at the same time.

In the West Camp district, voting will be held in a vacant house on the Ray Griffiths farm, which is situated 2 miles south and one west of the school building, which lies in that part that consolidated with Farwell.

Polls will open at 8 a. m.

C. E. Roark has been appointed judge of the election at West Camp and Connie Gupton will be judge in the election in Muleshoe. Voting will be at the school building.

### Crops Need Rain Despite Showers

Sporadic showers here and there last week end continued to aid crops in their immediate path, but in general farmers were hoping for rain this week as feed and cotton began to show the effects of dry weather.

Muleshoe and some other parts of the county had a nice shower Friday afternoon, amounting in Muleshoe to .90 inch, according to R. J. Klump, weather recorder here.

Muleshoe had a total of 1.90 inches of rain in June and the total for the year to the present time is 6.71 inch, Mr. Klump's report showed.

Several sorghum grain growers interviewed by The Journal said the crops over the territory are beginning to show the need for moisture. Crops as a whole over the Plains are in good condition, however, and it is estimated that a record cotton production is in the making.

A hot wave has had this section in its grip for several days. Hottest day in Muleshoe in the current wave was last Friday which had a high for the day of 102 degrees. Temperatures in the high nineties have been the rule for several days.

### Search For Oil Intensified Here

The search for oil in the Muleshoe country continues, with one wildcat being drilled a few miles from the city and location for another just staked a few miles further away.

The southeast Farmer county wildcat, Sunray Oil Company No. 1, Kimbrough, about 12 miles north-east of Muleshoe, Sunday was reported to have reached 4,118 feet in lime and shale and was continuing.

Located on land belonging to Finis Kimbrough the well is scheduled for a depth of about 9,500 feet. It is 330 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of section 23, Doud and Keefer sub-division.

Meanwhile a new location for a wildcat well has been made north-east of Muleshoe in Castro county. Sun Oil Company No. 1 A. L. Harber is the new venture in Castro. It is located 660 feet from north and east lines of section 8, block 2, W. E. Halsell sub-division.

That puts it two miles east of the Farmer County line and four miles north of the Lamb County line.

It will be seven and one-half miles south and one mile west of the same company's No. 1 Herring, a dry hole completed early in the year on a total depth of 16,500 feet in granite.

That development went through a section of Ellenburger, which was barren of petroleum.

The Sun No. 1 Harber is scheduled to drill at least 10,000 feet, to explore into the Ellenburger — unless it gets granite before it reaches that level. Operations are to start at once.

### Insured Mortgage Changes Broaden Farmers Land Credit Opportunities

Recent Congressional changes in the insured mortgage program of the Farmers Home Administration will broaden opportunities of farmer to obtain real estate credit. L. J. Chapman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, announces:

An assured market for insured mortgages and an increase of one-half of one per cent in the interest rate are provided in amendments to the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, approved June 19, to encourage greater participation of private capital in the farm ownership program.

Lenders who extend credit to eligible farmers for the purchase, enlargement or development of farms under the insured farm mortgage program may assign the mortgage to the Government and receive payment in full at the end of a specified period established by the Government. The loans will carry an interest rate of 3 per cent and a 1 percent insured mortgage charge.

The credit is extended only to farmers who cannot obtain adequate financing from private or cooperative sources. Repayment of the loans is fully guaranteed by the Government. The loans are limited to 90 per cent of the borrowers total investment in the farm and repayable over a period of 40 years.

Since the first insured loan was made last October, 333 loans averaging approximately \$7,000 have been closed or approved. In addition, 9,200 applicants for insured loans have been approved and their applications are being held pending the location of suitable farms or lender willing to finance the loans with Government insurance. Up to \$100,000 worth of loans may be insured in any one year.

Principal activity has been in eight states. Minnesota has closed or approved 31 loans Kansas 30, Wisconsin

### County Agent Calls Meeting To Discuss Cotton Insect Situation Here

#### July 31 Deadline For Reinstatement Of Vets Insurance

Robert W. Sisson, VA regional manager, reminds veterans that July 31 is the last day for reinstatement of lapsed National Service Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis.

Before Aug. 1, an eligible veteran may reinstate any amount of term insurance from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500 - regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed, and usually without a physical examination. He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after July 31 only to veterans whose policies have lapsed for less than three months. Where the period of lapse is three months or longer, the veteran will be required to take a physical examination and qualify as an insurable risk, the VA manager said.

### Gold Star Buttons To Be Available

The Veterans County Service office now has application blanks for the Gold Star Lapel Buttons distributed by The Adjutant General to next of kin of members of Armed Forces of the United States who lost their lives in service during the period from Dec. 7, 1941 to July 25, 1947. These buttons will be issued as follows:

Without cost to the widow and each parent including mother, father, stepmother, stepfather through adoption and father through adoption.)

At cost price to each child, stepchild, brother, sister, half-brother and half-sister. The cost of this button will be approximately \$1.00 which includes cost of manufacturing, engraving, packing and C. O. D. fee.

All persons eligible to receive one of these buttons are asked to contact the Veterans County Service Office, who will furnish application blanks and assist in making them. All the information required will be full name of deceased, grade or rating, service or serial number and date of death.

Approximately 90 days will be required to make delivery of the buttons after application is filed. Once the lapel button has been received it should be carefully safeguarded since the law provides that NO GOLD STAR LAPEL BUTTON WILL BE SOLD TO ANY PERSON WHO HAS BEEN FURNISHED SUCH A BUTTON WITHOUT COST AND NOT MORE THAN ONE LAPEL BUTTON WILL BE SOLD TO ANY ONE PERSON.

### Report 580 Cases Of Polio In Texas

Austin.—Reported cases of polio in sixty five counties of Texas have reached the alarming total of 580 during the first six months of the year, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. For the same period in 1946, the total number of cases reported in sixty-two counties of the state was only 292.

"This staggering increase in polio in a brief two year period evidences a need for drastic measures in all communities to combat the disease," Dr. Cox asserted. "It is the responsibility of the people of the state to report themselves to their doctors whenever they recognize symptoms of polio. It is also their duty to give wholehearted cooperation to clean-up drives in their communities."

Dr. Cox urged immediate attention, especially at this time of year, for such things as headaches, fever, stiff neck pain in the legs, irritability or drowsiness. These, the health officer stated, are symptoms of polio.

### Farm Cash Income Shows Nice Increase

Austin.—May farm cash income totaled \$106,629,000, a 9 per cent gain over a year earlier, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Farm income rose 3 per cent from April to May, as marketings of wool, calves, sheep and flaxseed increased substantially. Smaller gains were

made by sorghum, grains, poultry, rice, and peanuts, while other farm products showed declines from April to May.

All districts except Northern High Plains, Trans-Pecos, Coastal Prairies, South Texas Plains, and Lower Rio Grande Valley turned in April to May gains ranging from 11 per cent in East Texas Timbered Plains to 63 per cent in Western Cross Timbers.







Small cracks in the foundation or masonry walls can be repaired by filling with asphaltic cement, while large cracks should be chipped out to about half inch or more and filled with cement mortar. Replace badly warped boards and shingles, whether walls or roofs. Split badly warped wood shingles on the roof and re-nail them perfectly flat. Seal clapboard wall joints with paint and doubtful points in
