Fire kills nine in Ohio motel

CAMBRIDGE, Ohio (AP) — Fire swept through a crowded two-story Holiday Inn in this eastern Ohio city today, killing at least nine persons, authorities said. Others escaped by smashing windows and leaping to the ground below.

Authorities at first thought 10 persons had died in the blaze. But Gayle Ogden, a spokeswoman at Guernsey Memorial Hospital, said a woman who suffered a heart attack and was believed dead was brought back to consciousness.

The bodies of four children and five adults were taken to three funeral homes in the area. Officials did not release identities on the victims and said some of the bodies were severely charred.

Guernsey Memorial Hospital officials said 61 persons were treated for injuries and 11 were hospitalized with cuts and broken bones

A baby was found safe in the arms of her unconscious mother, lying in a on widows and screaming after the fire broke out about 3 a.m. at the motel, which is a quarter-mile north of the junction of Interstates 70 and 77 - the world's largest intersection in terms of area.


One youth picked up an iron bar and began smashing windows. Passersby found an old scaffold and rescued

Only four of the motel's 104 rooms were unoccupied, but the exact number of guests in the motel was not immediately known.

Most of the dead were found in hallways of the 10-year-old brick and wood structure. Fire officials said the blaze apparently started somewhere in the rear of the building.

The building was badly damaged but not destroyed.

The assistant manager of the motel, Mike Dawson, said firefighters were searching for additional bodies but thought all persons were out after the fire was brought under control at 6

U.S. Department of Energy announced a new price formula. Asked if the cost-to-consumer would go up even more, in line with DOE's new pricing regulations, several gas station employees today answered to the effect that their prices would be increased Wednesday by

The new pricing formula sets a 15.4 cent-a-gallon profit margin for independently owned gas stations. As a result, dollar-a-gallon prices for premium and unleaded gas could

become a reality here and throughout the rest of the nation Wednesday, the first official day of the new regulation's effect. The new regulations will not be aplicable to jobber-owned and refin-

ery-owned stations, DOE officials have said. Actual price of gasoline paid by customers, DOE officials have added,

will depend on the tank wagon price at the time the regulations go effect and the retailer's desire to be competative. Maximum figures for unleaded gas could go as high as \$1.02 cents a

gallon and the price for premium could be just under \$1.01, at least one DOE representative has said. Area gasoline prices today for regular ranged from 79.7 cents to 92.9: for unleaded gasoline, from 82.7 to 93.9 cents; and for premium gasoline,



PUC raps TESCO's capacity

Attorney says company's reserve unusually large

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Electric Service Co. is trying to charge its customers for an unusually large excess generating capacity, a state Public Utility Commission lawyer

suggested Monday. Allen King questioned why the Fort Worth-based company needs the capacity to generate 50 percent more electricity than its customers require

at peak hours of a summer day. At the first day of commission hearings on TESCO's \$88 million requested rate hike, King cited other companies' backup power supply.

TESCO's customers in 48 counties eventually pay for a utility's reserve capacity, the lawyer said.

King did not suggest how much extra capacity the company should maintain but indicated customers might be paying too much for the 50 percent reserve.

The commission staff has recommended a \$27.5 million hike. Residential customer bills would increase by an average of \$5 monthly if the company figure is approved. The hearing is expected to last seven to eight

Opponents of TESCO's rate request include Fort Worth, Burkburnett and Hurst; the county commissioners of Midland and Tarrant counties: the Texas Municipal League and the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now (ACORN).

King also questioned Taylor about the company's request to maintain a 2 million-barrel fuel oil inventory for

The utility commission approved only 1 million barrels in fuel oil reserves during TESCO's rate case last October. The company was granted a \$40.4 million hike, but had asked for \$110 million.

King said the commission staff thinks TESCO should be allowed to charge customers the cost of maintaining only a 1 million-barrel reserve. He said this would amount to a \$1.3 million savings to customers.

TESCO President Bill Marquardt said the company needs a larger fuel oil inventory for several reasons. He said the federal government could divert natural gas supplies to the Northeast this winter.

The company would need the fuel oil, especially if freezing weather prevents mining of lignite in East Texas as happened this year, Marquardt

Late afternoon thunderstorms pelted the Permian Basin area Monday and the weatherman said more of the same could occur tonight and Wednesday.

Although an official .32 inch of rain was recorded at the National Weather Service office at Midland Regional Airport late Monday, rain throughout the city and the area was spotty.

High wind damaged two Texas Electric Service Co. poles on Mid-land's northside late Monday, leaving 1,157 residents without electric service for about 40 minutes.

According to Shug Bowlin, staff assistant and media coordinator for TESCO, the two poles were blown

over by high winds about 5:25 p.m. Monday, causing a brief power out-age at Ranchland Hills, Midland Country Club, Hogan Golf Course and Parkview Hospital.

There was no major damage, Bowlin said, and service was restored within about 40 to 45 minutes.

About the same time, a major rain shower was reported 10 miles east of Midland. According to the weather service, that rainstorm dropped 1.3 inches about 6:24 p.m.

Several points in Midland reported receiving showers late Monday afternoon, but amounts of rainfall were

ANSWER: You are not alone in your query, because a city of Midland Inspection Department spokesman says the department is working as hard and rapidly as possible in taking care of some 100 similar reports.

Complaints should be made to the Inspections Department, 683-4281. A city inspector then takes a look at the lot, and if he discovers the lot to be in violation of city ordinances, the lot owner is given notice to clean his property. The city of Midland is re-ponsible for care of lots owned by the

If the property owner does not comply, the city can move in and assess. mowing costs to the owner.

The trouble in some situations, the department says, is that many owners do not live in Midland and are difficult to contact.

In order to speed up the lot-cleaning process, the department hopes to have additional manpower in the near

Procedure: Mix cake mix, eggs, oil and water until all are moist. Stir in chocolate chips. Drop by the teaspoonful onto a greased cookie sheet(about 2 inches apart). Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes; cool. Don't expect these to brown.

What are the requirements for obtaining a hardship driver license?-

ANSWER: The procedure for obtaining such a license, which is issued to drivers under 18 years of age who have not had a Driver's Education Course, are outlined by the Driver License Division of the Texas Depart-

ment of Public Safety. A driver can apply for such a license when he is at least 15 years of age. He must obtain an application form from the department and fill it out with his parents. The next step is for the applicant and his parents to return to the department, meet with an officer, go over the application and discuss the need, such as driving to

and from work or school. The officer also will discuss the restrictions involved in such a li-

Next, the applicant must take a written test and driving test. A hardship license can be used until the driver reaches 18.

Elsewhere in the Permian Basin area, Andrews, Big Spring, Garden City and Odessa all reported light rainfall Monday afternoon, while Lamesa, Stanton, Rankin and Crane reported no rain at all.

In most of the Basin, skies were cloudy again this morning. And the weatherman was predicting a continued chance for showers again today, tonight and Wednesday.

A 30 percent chance for rain chance exists for tonight. A 20 percent chance for more thunderstorms will exist on Wednesday.

Otherwise, it should continue to be warm with Wednesday's high expected to be in the low 90s. The low temperature tonight should drop into

Winds tonight should be out of the southeast at five to 10 mph.

Monday's high temperature reached 99 degrees, far short of the record 106-degree scorcher on that date in 1937. The overnight low was 71 degrees - cool, but still short of the record low 60 degrees set in 1971.

Heavy hunderstorms pounded West Texas during the night and early morning hours. There was no damage reported but just before midnight Dalhart clocked winds of 59 miles per

Satellite and radar spotted very heavy rains from the storms, especially in the Plains east of Lubbock and in the Big Bend area. There also were reports of brief, local flash

flooding. Some of the storms continued past dawn from the Panhandle eastward to Wichita Falls and Abilene.

The rest of the state was generally fair, except for low clouds throughout East Texas.

Judge rules state has no jurisdiction

CARLSBAD, N.M. - District Judge John B. Walker ruled Monday morning in favor of the four men - three of them Odessans — who allegedly held a federal employee hostage in Carlsbad Caverns July 10. Judge Walker released the men

from state felony charges. A writ of habeas corpus filed last

week in the Fifth Judicial District Court in Eddy County, N.M., had questioned the state's jurisdiction in matters occurring on federally-owned

Walker ruled that the state of New Mexico had no jurisdiction in the July

The judge's action put an end to three weeks of indecision over jurisdiction in the case, which had been tossed between state and federal offi-The four men, originally charged

with federal misdemeanors, are Dennis James Mark, 39, of Riesel, and Eugene Hiram Meroney, 31, William Charles Lovejoy, 28, and David W. Kuczynski, 28, all of Odessa.

Eddy County Sheriff's Department currently is holding the four men in custody for the U.S. Marshal in Albuquerque, N.M., where they are to be arraigned later this week.

They are charged with damage to government property - a federal misdemeanor punishable by one year imprisonment and/or by \$1,000 in fines upon conviction, said U.S. Attorney R.E. Thompson in Albuquerque, N.M.

The charge is in reference to shots fired into the Caverns' elevators, an Eddy County Sheriff's department spokesman said.

At the men's initial arraignment, District Judge Harvey W. Fort of Carlsbad refused to accept misdemeanor charges. Subsequently, the Eddy County District Attorney's Office filed state felony charges of kidnapping and aggravated assault against the foursome

The foursome was to have faced a preliminary hearing on the state felony charges today in Carlsbad, but that hearing was canceled after state charges were dropped as a result of the Monday hearing.

Fires destroy vehicle, shed

A storage shed used by Midland Boy Scouts and an automobile were destroyed in two separate fires Mon-

Three units of the Midland Fire Department responded at 12:05 a.m. to a blaze at 3500 Cunningham Drive, according to fire reports.

Firemen arrived to find a shed connected to the west end of the house in

The shed and its contents were destroyed by the fire, according to reports, and the house, owned by the Rotary Club, received heavy damage on the west end.

Cause of the blaze had not been determined today, reports indicated. The shed contained materials used

by Boy Scout Troops 96 and 280. A 1969 Plymouth with New Mexico license plates was destroyed by flames after lightning struck utility lines on West U.S. Highway 80, causing the lines to fall on the car.

The incident, which occurred near the Coors Building, happened about 6 p.m. as a thunderstorm moved through the Midland area.

Lightning struck a phase-down, or the three top wires on the line, a spokesman for Texas Electric Service Co. said today. Owner of the car had not been determined today.

Second Odessa official resigns

ODESSA - The city of Odessa has lost its second top official in less than a week.

Bryan Henderson, director of public works and city engineer, Monday submitted his resignation effective today to City Manager Kerry Sweatt.

Last Thursday, Assistant Police Chief Tommy Callendar was asked to resign over an unrelated matter.

City officials would not comment on whether Henderson's resignation was requested, but acknowledged the 14year city employee has had "differences of opinion" with members of the City Council in the past.

Henderson's letter of resignation said he was resigning "in the interests of a better community.

Henderson's duties included overseeing a number of capital improvement projects including construction of a new fire station and a overhead storage tank, traffic signalization project and street overlay work.

Henderson joined the city staff in August 1965. He was named city engineer in October 1968 and director of public works in January 1971.

Caroline Thompson, 5, reunited with parents after kidnapping

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) -As tears streamed from her parents' eyes, little Caroline Thompson hugged a playmate and smiled at reporters after her rescue from the teen-ager who allegedly abducted her from a hotel parking lot.

The blue-eyed, blonde 5-year-old clung to her father as she left the Myrtle Beach, S.C., police station where she had munched contentedly on a hot dog and asked for a chocolate milkshake following the ordeal that ended in that resort city Monday.

"She's fine," said Rachel Thomp-son, her voice cracking and her eyes red from crying, who along with her husband Russell was flown by chartered jet to Myrtle Beach where they were reunited with their daughter and met some neighbors who had been vacationing there. "She wanted to have her picture in the newspaper a while back but we didn't know it would be like this.

James Keith Tucker, an 18-year-old High Point, N.C., man whom officials said was on parole for an earlier auto theft conviction, was arrested Monday evening. He was held in Florence, S.C., this mcrning on a \$200,000 bond for kidnapping and a \$50,000 bond for auto theft, set by U.S. Magistrate E.A. Swearingen.

Tucker, who did not enter a plea at the hearing, waived his right to a removal hearing - the federal equivalent of a state extradition hearing. FBI Special Agent David Brumble

of Jacksonville, Fla., said before the rescue that authorities believed the man only meant to steal the car, and did not plan to abduct the girl. The Thompsons returned to Day-

tona Beach several hours after Caroline was found and were whisked by police to the Holiday Inn where the incident began Saturday - hoping finally to begin their vacation. The parents had remained at the

hotel in Daytona Beach until word came that their daughter was safe. At a motel press conference on their

return, Mrs. Thompson said she was thankful that the abductor took care of her child. "He didn't hurt her in any way and tried to comfort her by telling her that

he was taking her to her mother and daddy at home," she said. Asked how Caroline reacted when she saw her parents again, she said: 'She was just as normal as ever and is just beginning to understand that many people have been looking for

Caroline, cradled in her father's arms, appeared sleepy and said noth-

The Dunwoody, Ga., family's twoday ordeal ended when Donald and Edith Howell of Goldsboro, N.C., told FBI agents they noticed a man and Caroline as they checked into a Myrtle Beach motel Sunday.

But it wasn't until the couple saw pictures of a suspect and Caroline on television Monday that they realized she was the missing girl. The Howells quickly notified police,

who spotted a man driving the Thompsons' late model Oldsmobile station wagon near the motel.

The car zoomed away, officials said. One patrolman took two shots at the tires, police said, but failed to stop. the car. The high-speed chase through Myrtle Beach ended seven miles later, when Patrolman David Smith used his cruiser to block the speeding station wagon. The little girl and the family's two

dogs were safe in the back of the

As they left Myrtle Beach late Monday for a flight back to Daytona Beach, Mrs. Thompson thanked reporters for issuing their pleas to the "No words I can ever utter can express our appreciation for every-

Senate panel approves bill to aid Mennonites

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Senate Judiciary Committee today unanimously approved legislation by Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen allowing a community of Mennonite immigrants who settled near Seminole to remain in this country.

Bentsen hailed the committee action and urged quick approval of his bill by the full Senate.

"Almost all the members of the Mennonite Church who came to Seminole fled from Mexico and the threat that their land in that country would be confiscated," Bentsen said. "They entered this country on temporary visitor visas in the spring of

The Bentsen bill approved by the Judiciary Committee Tuesday grants permanent resident status to 653 members of the community living in the area around Seminole.

Last April 3 — about two years after the fundamentalist religious order arrived in the U.S. from Mexico and Canada — they lost their 10 sections of farm land in an auction resulting from their inability to honor notes in paying for the land.

The land, south of Seminole in Gaines and Andrews counties, reverted to the original landowner, Lamesa farmer-rancher Dennis Nix. The land, which the Old Colony

Mennonite Church had agreed to buy for \$1.7 million, was auctioned off for \$1,151,000 The original 256 Mennonite families

here agreed to pay Nix the \$1.7 million over a period of 10 years. But leadership within the church waned, a drought plagued the farmland, water rights were denied them

and the Mennonites were unable to

honor their pledge in paying off the indebtedness. In two years, the Mennonites had paid \$575,000 toward their debt total, but defaulted on later payments.

Most Odessa police officers join in effort to obtain union charter

ODESSA - The majority of Odessa's 134-member working police force is seeking membership in the International Police Officers Association primarily to insure job security, a union advocate said today. Sixty-three of the officers already

have paid dues in the association, claimed Detective David King, one of the association backers. King said he believes the Odessa officers should get their association

charter "within the next 48 hours." Their action reportedly stemmed from the forced resignation last Thursday of Assistant Police Chief Tommy Callendar, who was asked to resign by Police Chief Jack Tomlin after Callendar reportedly told two police officers not to appear at probation revocation hearings in El Paso

unless they were subpoenaed. The El Paso hearing was not held when the officers failed to appear to

Tomlin declined today to make any comment on the unionization efforts. Approximately 100 police officers gathered Monday in two meetings to discuss membership in the association or union

"I'm not much on the word 'union," said King. "When the word

union is mentioned, the first thing people think of is 'strike,' and the Odessa Police Department is not planning on ever going on strike.

"They do not plan even on a work

slowdown. The policemen will not turn their badges in. "We will not advocate this," King said. "We will not tolerate this in any way. And any of our men who do will be subjected to dismissal," he said.

King said purpose of seeking association membership is job security. 'We would hope to have job security, and would hope to have input on how the department is run," King said. "We do not plan to run it, by any

The association's goals, in addition to job security of the officers, would be to "have a better (police) department by any means and to do a better job ourselves," he said.

King said the association attorneys would represent IPOA members in possible lawsuits and other litiga-

King said efforts to organize an IPOA chapter here were "not to get (Assistant) Chief Callendar's job back...at this time." But after the chapter is organized, members may vote on seeking job reinstatement of Callendar, he said.

King today held that Callendar's departure sparked interest in IPOA. "The fuel was already in the department," King said. "The forced resignation of Callendar was probably what lit the fuel."

IPOA representative Richard Kesselup has been meeting with the officers, King said. A Midland chapter of IPOA was

formed about two years ago. The Midland Reporter-Telegram

12-year-olds walk streets, ready to fight Khomeini

SANANDAJ, Iran (AP) — Armed Kurds, some only 12 years old, walk the streets of this capital of Iranian Kurdistan, brandishing their weapons and ready to shoot it out with Ayatol-

lah Ruhollah Khomeini's forces. Heavily armed tribesmen were at tight roadblocks at intervals on the main highway through the Kurds' province in northwest Iran. Machinegun emplacements are located at strategic points, and no government forces are in sight.

Seeking the home rule and autonomy Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and his predecessors denied them, the Kurds claim to control the roads from Kermanshah to Rezayieh, a distance of 270 miles along the Iraqi and Turkish borders. Government forces have made no major attempt to challenge

A major confrontation appears to be shaping up this week at the town of Marivan, 45 miles northwest of Sanandaj and close to the Iraqi frontier, where the Tehran government sent a force of revolutionary militiamen week before last to establish its

Marivan's population deserted the town and set up camps in the nearby hills and villages. Then Kurds from farther north started marching south to protest the military occupation of the town. They were reported to have numbered 10,000 at the start, but 30,000 now are reported on the march, and they are expected at Marivan

Thirty government soldiers and Kurdish fighters were reported killed and scores were reported wounded in clashes around Marivan. A government column of 30 tanks and four armored personnel carriers set out from Kermanshah to reinforce the militiamen at Marivan a week ago. but unarmed women and children blocked the road outside the town of Kamyaran. They told the troops they would lie in front of the tanks if they tried to pass.

The column turned back but three days ago started north again, this time accompanied by a number of Khomeini's revolutionary guards.







Bob goes 'way out'

State Comptroller Bob Bullock really went way out on a limb Thursday in urging labor to unionize state employees.

It was, indeed, a surprise action, and if it was his intention to shock his fellow Texans, then he got over real big. But it is quite doubtful if he gained many, if any, votes or supporters outside of organized labor and possibly some state employees.

Bullock, in addressing Texas AFL-CIO convention delegates at Austin, said if an AFL-CIO union would oganize state employees into a collective bargaining unit he would be the first state official "to recognize an AFL-CIO union on all matters not restricted by the appropriations bill or state law." What a grandstand play!

And of course, the convention delegates whooped it up in a big way, and of course Harry Hubbard, AFL-CIO president, responded by saying, "I guarantee you we will follow through on your challenge.'

Unionization of state employees is one thing the Lone Star State certainly can get along very well without, and we were delighted to see Gov. Bill Clements' reply that he is "absolutely opposed" to such

The governor said further that state employees will not gain any benefits or improve their efficiency if they join a labor union.

In response to Bullock's comment that many state employees fear losing their jobs to the governor's drive to reduce the payroll by 25,000 persons (during his fouryear term), Clements said the employees should not be fearful of losing their jobs. "We have a 25 percent turn rate in state employees each year. We are in a position of not hiring, (instead of) terminating," he explained.

Bullock, in his address, also said that state employees "need a real friend. They need someone who's going to stick by them. Someone who can produce other than just

"Their cart is stuck in the ditch and they need you, every one of you, to help them pull it out. They need to be represented by the Texas AFL-CIO." Hogwash!

He went on and on, saying at one point that the 5.1 percent annual pay raise given the employees by the 1979 Legislature "won't keep up with inflation.'

He told the delegates that it's not going to be any better and the future "holds no hope without your help. I'm here today to ask you for help on behalf of 169,000 state employees...'

And now you know the feeling and position of the comptroller in the role of union advocate.

What prompted Bullock to get out on this particular limb, we have no idea whatsoever.

And neither does the governor, who said he tried to call Bullock without success. "He apparently said that and left town," Clements added. We can't say that we would blame Bullock for leaving town after such a blast.

"I really don't understand Bob's position on that regard or what prompted him to say it at this particular moment," Gov. Clements said, adding that if Bullock wants to run for governor, "he's just going to have to get in line like the others."

For the time being, we will just have to wait and see whether or not Mr. Bullock gets in line officially somewhere along the way to the next gubernatorial elec-

Shah's threats to U.S. cited

WASHINGTON — Top-secret State Department cables - one of them double encoded, preventing the CIA from reading it - reveal that the shah of Iran personally threatened to shut down the massive U.S. intelligence operation in Iran if any action were taken to check the illegal activities of SAVAK in the United States. SAVAK was the shah's notorious secret po-

The bullying tone of the shah's warnings to then-Secretary of State Henry Kissinger casts new light on the strange relationship between these two international power brokers. Over the years, we have told about Kissinger's curious obsequiousness toward the shah - which continued even after the shah's downfall. when Kissinger used his influence to arrange asylum in Mexico for the exiled dictator.

Whether Kissinger also used his considerable influence as secretary of state to block any crackdown on SAVAK's criminal operations in this country is not clear. What is clear is that nothing was done about SAVAK's activities - mainly directed at antishah dissidents in this country beyond a timid Justice Department investigation that ended inconclusi-

The shah's messages to Kissinger were conveyed by American Ambassador Richard Helms and Ardeshir Zahedi, the urbane, party-giving Iranian ambassador in Washington, in late 1976 and early 1977. They are contained in a supersensitive Senate report on foreign intelligence operations in this country.

The messages between Tehran and

Foggy Bottom make it painfully clear that the shah was holding our CIA agents in Iran hostage to give his secret police a free hand in the United States. Following a public outcry in October 1976, over SAVAK's operations in this country, the Iranian Foreign Ministry issued a cautious statement warning of retaliation in case of a U.S. crackdown on SAVAK.

In a secret cable on Nov. 7, 1976, Helms reiterated the warning. "The statement serves notice," he wired Kissinger, "that any restraints imposed upon, or actions taken toward. Iranian representatives in the United States would be reciprocated here.

Two days later, Assistant State Secretary Alfred L. Atherton Jr., met with the Iranian ambassador in Washington and reported afterward: "(Zahedi) said that if we did not like what SAVAK is doing here, Iran would send its agents home. Then, of course, the United States would have to bring its agents from Iran. It was, he said, simple reciprocity.

On Dec. 27, 1976, Helms relayed another message from the shah to Kissinger. "The shah is very concerned to maintain the special relationship between Iran and the United States," he wired. "He contends that no SAVAK representative is operating against the United States or its citizens. Put another way, SAVAK is not authorized to conduct activities counter to U.S. law.

Helms spelled out the tit-for-tat possibilities, warning against "an inflammatory, public brouhaha over possibly ill-advised intelligence activity" by SAVAK. "As you well know," he reminded Kissinger, "we are very beholden here in the intelligence area and therefore correspondingly vulnerable."

Finally, on Jan. 2, 1977, Helms relayed the shah's boldest threat of all. It was so sensitive that Helms sent it on the "Roger Channel," a double-encrypted State Department line the CIA could not decipher. Even though Helms was the former CIA boss, he evidently didn't leak to his old colleagues. A well-placed CIA source told our associate Dale Van Atta that most officials in the agency were "shocked" by the threats disclosed in the Senate report, and had been unaware of them at the time.

Helms' cable quoted the shah warning that if anything were done to his SAVAK agents, he "would not be able to overlook the presence of 70 of your people who are carrying out activities contrary to Iranian law," or of "others whom we do not know about officially.

Footnote: Not only Kissinger but Helms also has had a buddy-buddy relationship with the shah. Now out of government, Helms has been searching for a suitable mansion for the shah to purchase in the Virginia hunt country.

BRZEZINSKI'S VERSION: We recently reported that Zbigniew Brzezinski, the White House foreign policy whiz, had embarrassed Secretary of State Cyrus Vance in the midst of his SALT negotiations with the Russians. Brzezinski, we reported, tried to telephone Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, who diplomatically refused to take the call.

The busy Brzezinski, who did not return our telephone calls at the time, now tells us that our State Department sources garbled the story. As he recalls the incident, he received new instructions last December from President Carter who was spending the Christmas holiday in Plains, Ga.

Brzezinski placed an urgent call to Vance in Geneva where the efficient White House telephone operators located the Secretary of State in the Soviet embassy. Brzezinski was not calling Gromyko, as we reported, but was trying to reach Vance.

As Brzezinski recalls it, Marshall Shulman, the State Department's specialist on Soviet affairs, came to the telephone. Cryptically, he explained that the call had reached them at the Soviet embassy and asked whether Brzezinski still wanted to discuss strategy with Vance.

The White House aide acknowledged the warning but asked to speak to Vance. Then Brzezinski, using coded words, carefully passed on the secret-instructions to Vance right in the Soviet embassy.

INSIDE REPORT: Another SALT blooper discovered as debate launched

WASHINGTON - A reading of the fine print in the SALT II treaty after it went to the Senate has revealed, to the horror of supporters of the arms control pact, an uncanny repetition of the worst U.S. blooper in the 1972 SALT I treaty.

The 1972 mistake, not discovered until long after ratification, failed to pin down specific limits on the size of a replacement for the SS-11 intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM). Now, in a new negotiating blooper discovered as Senate ratification debate begins, SALT II does not clearly define the size of Moscow's mainstay SS-19 ICBM, which it sets as the limit on the size of any new missiles. That history should be so sadly re-

played is explicable only by this fact: the Russians simply refused to agree on a specific definition of the size of the SS-19. This adds new evidence that U.S. negotiators, under orders from Washington for an agreement at almost any cost, bowed to the iron will of their Soviet counterparts.

Ironically, the 1979 mistake occurred in an effort to correct the effect of the 1972 negotiating blunder. By failing to pin down the size of the new Soviet ICBMs, SALT I contributed to the vulnerability of land-based U.S. missiles. Limiting future Russian ICBMs to the size of the SS-19 in an effort to protect the land-based U.S. missile force.

But if there was no agreement on the size of the SS-19, how can Moscow legally be held to the terms of the treaty?

The answer: it cannot, any more than it could be forced to comply with the clear understanding of limits on "new" missiles in the 1972 treaty, negotiated by Henry Kissinger. Kissinger relied, to his later dis-

may, on what he called the "safeguard" of Soviet assurance "that no missiles larger than the heaviest light missile that now exists can be substituted." In 1972, that was the SS-11. But after SALT I took effect, the SS-11 was replaced by the SS-19, which almost was half again as big.

President Carter's negotiators retraced Kissinger's slippery footsteps, relying on their own understanding of the size of the SS-19. The Soviets typically refused to agree or disagree with the U.S. definition.

The State Department virtually admits that it could not nail down the Soviets. Its "detailed analysis" of the treaty, sent to all senators, spells out this country's position: the U.S. "considers" the SS-19 to have a launchweight (weight in the silo) of 90,000 kilograms and a throw-weight (weight of the warheads) of 3,600 kilograms. These are key measure"These figures are based on our

estimate for the SS-19," the senators were told. "The Soviet Union did not respond to this statement (but) the U.S. will regard these figures as the limits for the one new type of...ICBM permitted to the United States. But will the Russians? Realists here

doubt it, anymore than in 1972. Kissinger learned the hard truth slowly, as U.S. monitors in Iran began to accumulate data on the true size of the new SS-19 being tested to replace the old SS-11.

Trapped by Soviet duplicity three years later, Kissinger found himself lamely explaining away the sudden appearance of the big SS-19. "We obviously did not know in 1972 what missiles the Soviet Union would be testing in 1974," Kissinger told a State Department press conference on Dec.

But there was no way to stop SS-19 development. Moscow blithely kept insisting its new missile was just a slightly updated model of the old SS-11. Now, following SALT II, the Russians have a loophole to sustain their own verion of a "legal" follow-on missile to the SS-19 by claiming that the U.S. definition of the SS-19's size is simply wrong, and that Moscow never agreed on it.

This would not come up if the Russians played fair and square. But they play to win; they take advantage of whatever opportunity is granted. Discovery of Soviet deception on the

SS-19 by the Nixon-Ford administration long after SALT I took effect depended on America's ally, Iran. But the true size of the SS-19 almost

certainly would have eluded U.S. intelligence for even longer had it not been for U.S. monitoring stations in

These stations no longer exist, and the U.S. is not close to duplicating

This undermines the SALT-sellers'

northern Iran, just south of the main Soviet test range.

Mrs. Thatcher shown all courtesy of muggers in subway, paper says

LUSAKA, Zambia Tube (subway)." (AP) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher arrived for the Commonwealth Conference amid an unprecedented chorus of condemnation from the Zambian government's press mouthpieces. Conservative British newspapers responded in kind.

Scores of welcoming blacks at the Lusaka airport smiled and applauded as the head of Britain's Conservative government arrived Monday for the 39-nation conference at which her policy toward the new government of Zimbabwe Rhodesia will be the chief issue.

But the governmentcontrolled Times of Zambia accused her of "blind and pusillanimous arrogance." The Zambia Daily Mail said she was "racially biased." And President Kenneth Kaunda in a newspaper interview said her fear of the Russians was very sad "because when people become frightened, they lose their reason.'

The London Daily Mail said Mrs. Thatcher was greeted "with the diplomatic courtesy a gang of muggers might reserve for a solitary woman travelling on a late-night

Miss Lillian remains in hospital

AMERICUS, Ga. (AP) - Lillian Carter, president Carter's 80-year-old mother, will be hospitalized at least "several more days," a nursing supervisor at the Americus-Sumter County Hospital said Monday night.

Mrs. Carter increased her activities earlier Monday, despite continuing pain in her left shoulder caused by what doctors had diagnosed as bursitis, hospital officials said. Mrs. Carter has been hospitalized

since Thursday. Nursing Supervisor Catherine Woodall said Monday night that Mrs. Carter's condition had not changed.

James R. Griffith, administrator of the hospital, said Mrs. Carter "is able to be up more and is trying to increase her activities" despite "moderate pain" in her shoulder and back.

Mrs. Carter's physician, Dr. John H. Robinson III, said the president's mother was taken to the hospital from her home in nearby Plains after complaining of "se-

vere, extreme pain." Robinson said he ruled out heart problems and said her pain "could be bursitis," a joint inflammation.

Aggressive men type prone to heart attacks

Dear Dr. Solomon: Are certain types of people does not appear to be strongly genetically determinmore susceptible than others to heart at- ed. tacks?—Alan

Dear Alan: Men who are impatient, aggressive, and success-oriented-characteristics of what is referred to as the "Type A" personality-are more prone to heart disease. Researchers have shown that these individuals have twice as many heart attacks and more severe symptoms, and have three to four times as many second heart attacks as others.

Scientists at the Duke University School of Medicine have received a grant from the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute to study this pehnomenon. Dr. Redford B. Williams, a professor of psychiatry, feels that if he can identify a specific component of Type-A behavior-such as hostility-as leading to coronary heart disease and heart attacks, patients may be able to be trained to control this factor, or it might be controlled through medica-

Dr. Saul Schanberg, a professor of pharmacology, is collaborating in the research. He will study changes in the levels of two hormones, epinephrine and norepinephrine, that affect the sympathetic nervous system, increasing both blood pressure and


The two researchers already have demonstrated that patients with Type-A personalities have five or six times more atherosclerotic plaque-or fatty deposits-in their coronary arteries than do other heart patients. According to Dr. Williams, the Type-A personaltiy pattern can be identified in children as young as eight or nine years of age. Although research in this area has been limited, it is assumed the children learn the behavior from their parents or through childhood experiences, since it





Chinese official urges reform

PEKING (AP) — A top Communist Party official urged reform of the party's bureaucracy today, culminating months of protest against leaders who live high, buy luxuries and seek privileges for their

"It is imperative to reform the party's cadre system systematically by introducing ... election, examination, supervision, award and punishment, recall, rotation and retirement," said Hu Yaopang, third secretary of the party's Central Commission for Inspecting Discipline.

Hu was quoted in a front-page article in the People's Daily, the voice of the Communist Party Central Committee. The newspaper, which also has called for an end to privilege-seeking, quoted Hu's recent comments at the commission's first working conference in Peking.

Hu said regulations must be drawn up at once to enforce discipline, overcome factionalism and safeguard unity.

He said the new rules should include "criteria for the party's internal political life, standards for the living conditions of leading cadres, conrete stipulations for the conscientious practice of democracy

and the rights and duties of party members."

Hu's statement was the latest condemnation of privilege-seeking among party leaders and comes on the heels of mounting and noisy criticism of those who use their position to obtain advantage.

A letter to the People's Daily on July 21 said party officials come back from foreign countries laden with quartz watches, television sets and washing

In the same edition the paper said some leading cadres frequently have improvements made to their homes, move to better surroundings, and are highly particular about their furniture. It also said they make trial use of high-quality products without paying a cent.

'Some spoil their children and satisfy their every demand, do their best to find them the best schools and jobs, and try every means to let them leave the countryside to work in the cities. Some even violate rules and regulations to enable their children to study or work abroad," it said.

The newspaper called it "an evil trend" and said. "this unhealthy tendency is a manifestation of feudalistic ideas of privilege ... It undermines the party's prestige ... It also impedes unity and dampens the morale of the people and spreads the plague of selfish ideas."

Officer killed in Ireland

ARMAGH, Northern Ireland (AP) -Gunmen killed a plainclothes police officer today as he sat in an unmarked car outside a courthouse in Armagh, police reported.

The officer was waiting in the car for a colleague who was in the courthouse collecting arrest warrants, a spokesman said.

He was shot dead by two gunmen who opened up from a car driving slowly past the police vehicle. The slain officer, who was not named, was the 12th

policeman killed in Northern Ireland this year and the 89th since sectarian violence erupted nearly 10 The killing raised the known overall death toll to at

None of Northern Ireland's terrorist groups has claimed responsibility for the assassination. But police sources blamed Irish Republican Army guerrillas.

Sunken ship blocks canal

GAMBOA, Panama Canal Zone (AP) — Traffic slowed down in the Panama Canal after the freighter Quidnet sank crossways halfway through the 51-mile waterway following a collision with the Greek ship Seatide.

Only one ship at a time was able to move by and passage was restricted to ships no longer than 600 feet with beams not exceeding 82 feet. The canal locks are 110 feet wide.

The 360-foot Quidnet and the 466-foot Seatide collided Sunday night. There were no injuries and the Seatide continued south to Gamboa. It will take a week to figure out the best way to raise the Quid-

Portugal forms cabinet

LISBON, Portugal (AP) - A 16-member Cabinet has been formed by Maria de Lourdes Pintassilgo, the premier-designate who has the task of steering Portugal's government through the autumn elec-

She announced formation of the Cabinet Monday. It was described as moderate, with centrist, independent Social Democrats far outnumbering members of other parties.

Diver rescues 15-year-old

TRURO, England (AP) — Royal Navy diver Jimmy Bauld rescued 15-year-old Peter Crowther from a small plane that crashed and sank in 50 feet of water, but the boy died in a hospital.

"The boy looked as if he'd tried to get out but had become disoriented. He was going the wrong way. I got him out as quickly as possible," Bauld said after getting Peter to the hospital.

The plane crashed Monday about 1½ miles off the coast of Cornwall in southwest England. Peter's 12-year-old brother, Simon, and the pilot and another passenger were rescued on the surface.

Dead woman may be off sunken yacht

 \star MONTREAL (AP) — A dead woman found floating off the Gaspe Peninsula last week with \$3,600 stuffed in her bathing suit is believed to be from the Ottawa area, Police Investigator Jean-Pierre Desgagnes said.

However, positive identification of the body is not expected until today at the Quebec City Morgue, Desgagnes said.

He said an autopsy showed the woman was about 28 years old and that the cause of death was drown-

Bits of debris found after a tour boat picked up the body indicated the woman was from a yacht that sank in the area, Desgagnes said.

Costa Rica to return weapons

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) - Costa Rica will return weapons borrowed from Venezuela and Panama now that the Nicaraguan civil war is over and dictator Anastasio Somoza has fled.

The minister of public security, Juan Jose Echeverria, said the first of eight anti-aircraft batteries will be shipped back to Panama today, and 500 rifles will go back to Venezuela soon afterward.



Brown issues another challenge, files papers

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Edmund Brown Jr., describing himself as a fiscal conservative and an environmental liberal, has issued another challenge to Jimmy Carter.

Brown filed papers Monday with the Federal Elections Commission for a "Brown for President" committee, making him an official candidate - in the commission's eyes, if not his own - for the Democratic nomination for

He said Monday at Los Angeles airport before a trip to Mexico City, "My own feeling is that people are ready for an alternative; they're ready for a blend of fiscal responsibility and yet a bold vision for the future. That's what we lack right now.

"Most of the surveys indicate President Carter and I are running very close, even though I've barely even left the state," said Brown as he headed for talks with Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo.

Brown said that by starting now, "we'll have a lot of time to let people get to know me and for me to articulate ideas in such a way that if people like them, fine, and if they don't, I can accept that."

In Mexico City, Brown told reporters he had sought the talks because of a fear of "separation and alienation" of oil-rich Mexico in the next decade.

After an hour and 15 minutes with Lopez Portillo, Brown said they discussed "a common market between the United States, Canada and Mexico; California's electricity needs; U.S. barriers to Mexican exports;

Mexican oil; and unrest in Nicara-

Technically, the 41-year-old governor has not yet formally declared his candidacy. He calls his committee "exploratory."

Federal law allows potential presidential candidates to raise money to test the political waters without registering and reporting contributions and expenditures. This could include spending on polling, travel and the

But Brown aide Tony Dougherty said the exploratory committee, like those of other possible candidates, would go beyond the law's definition of exploratory, and that's what Brown told the commission.

In 1976, Brown won three primaries in an 11th-hour challenge to Carter but had virtually no chance of capturing the Democratic nomination because of his late start. Since then especially in the last year - he has been unceasing in his criticism of

Brown named state Air Resources Board Chairman Tom Quinn to head the "Brown for President" committee. He said his director of administration, Jodie Krajewski, will be treasurer. Both are to resign their state jobs at the close of business today.

Differing with Carter, Brown opposes nuclear power plants and the MX missile, supports the right of poor women to government-funded abortions, and favors a constitutional convention to require a balanced federal

Baker to spend August recess campaigning

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Howard H. Baker Jr. is gearing up to devote the month-long August congressional recess to intensive campaigning for the 1980 Republican presidential nomination

The Senate GOP leader, who hasn't yet made a formal announcement of candidacy, has lined up campaign appearances in some two dozen states during the recess.

Baker will be hitting the road with the endorsement of Sen. John Chafee of Rhode Island.

Chafee, a liberal Republican who differs markedly from Baker on the SALT treaty, was holding a news conference today to announce his support for the minority leader.

A strong supporter of the SALT

treaty, Chafee is expected to oppose any major amendments to it. Baker has declared he would not vote for the treaty unless substantial changes were made.

Baker recently demanded that the Carter administration and the Soviet government signal their willingness to accept Senate changes in the agreement. The Tennessee senator said he was particularly disturbed by the fact the treaty permits the Soviets to maintain 308 giant SS18 missiles, which are far larger than any in the

Chafee's endorsement is expected to be the first in a series to be unveiled

during the coming months. Another senator in Baker's camp is Richard Lugar of Indiana, his cam-

Baker's August travel plans include three days in New Hampshire, the sate that traditionally holds the first presidential primary, and such other early primary states as Massachusetts, Florida and Connecticut.

He also plans a stop in Iowa, where party caucuses in January will choose the first GOP convention delegates. Other places he plans to visit include California, New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Minnesota, South Dakota, Oregon, Washington, Colorado and Puerto Rico.

Baker has maintained a busy travel schedule, but Senate business has made extended trips a rarity. Like most of his rivals for the nomination,

Baker has made several trips to New Hampshire.

So far, Baker has raised about \$750, 000 and has 30 people working at his Washington, D.C, campaign head-

During his August travels, the senator has scheduled about 15 fund-raising events.

With a campaign committee registered at the Federal Election Commission, Baker is officially a candidate under federal law

He also has said many times that he is running for president. But Baker does not plan to make a formal announcem at of candidacy until the end of the year, after the SALT debate in the Senate.


Rankin's two Tommys leave rodeo clowning neither rich nor healthy

RANKIN - Tommy Owens sort of taught Tommy Sheffield how to 'clown around' in the rodeo arena and not get hurt.

But, both were injured while protecting rodeo performers from wild critters, and both now are retired from the arena.

"That's just not an old man's game," says Owens, who has retired to ranching and drenching livestock for a living. "Thirty years is old in the

rodeo profession. Besides getting injured while sticking in there to save the cowboy from injury by being gored, kicked, hooved, stomped on, thrown into a fence or hurt in any way, Owens didn't get rich or healthy off the

'That (clowning) is a poor way of serving the Lord," says Owens, who followed the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association in the late 1950s and

Like Owens, Sheffield has bailed out of clowning. But instead of ranching around his hometown of Rankin, Sheffield now is studying down Hous-

Sheffield, at 30, quit the circuit last year after seven or eight years of clowning. Like Owens, he had reached his prime and had been injured too many times.

His mother, Pauline Sheffield, recalls how her Tommy got into the

"He started riding bulls for Sul Ross (State University at Alpine)," she recalls. That was in the late 1960s and 1970 when Sheffield participated in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association rodeos.

But, like Owens, he had an aching to do more than hang onto a swirling, spinning and sort-of-bucking irate and onerous bull for a l-o-n-g eight seconds - a nice little chunk of eternity as far as the bull rider is con-

"He wasn't sure if he wanted to ride bulls or be a clown," Mrs. Sheffield

Perhaps it was the other Tommy — Owens — who was his inspiration. "Tommy (Owens) gave Tommy Sheffield one of his costumes." Sheffield - then, before or later - decided to be a clown.

"We adore him (Tommy Owens)," Mrs. Sheffield says with utmost sincerity. "But," she says in switching to a jestful mood, "we could have killed

Clowning is a hazardous job, especially when a fellow is trying to predict the movements of wild, rambunctious critters who are supposed to be mean and who are supposed to make cowboys (and clowns) respect them — be the critters bucking horses, snorting bulls or wild steers.


"They've both been hurt many, many times," Mrs. Sheffield says. "Tommy (Owens) had to quit on account of his back; his doctor told him if he wanted to live, he had better quit."

Of course, Owens still is around working like a top-notch hired hand. "He's a terribly hard worker, and he's responsible," she says of

The other Tommy quit, too, in his prime before he got crippled. "He (Tommy Sheffield) has broke his tailbone, broke about everything he has, been bruised up, banged up."

But years before, Pauline and Claude Sheffield did not try to dissuade their son from rodeo clowning despite the hazards of the work. "We didn't encourage him because it was so dangerous," Mrs. Sheffield says. "But we didn't try to discourage him. We let him choose what he want-

Bundy's punishment now in hands of Florida judge

MIAMI (AP) — Twice deadlocked between life and death, a jury has voted to send smiling former law student Theodore R. Bundy to Florida's electric chair for strangling two sorority sisters. Now a judge must decide whether to take the jury's

Judge Edward D. Cowart said he would announce today whether Bundy is to live in prison or die in "Old Sparky," the oak chair in the state's death chamber.

Bundy seemed unconcerned. "See you next trial," he said with a grin on the way out Monday after the jury recommended his execution.

The jurors were out for just under two hours. On the first allot, six jurors voted for Bundy to live, said juror Mary Russo. Six voted for death. Another vote produced another 6-6

"Each time we voted secretly," she said. "The third time we came up with a majority." Jurors would not say what the final vote was.

Under Florida's two-stage trial system in capital cases, a unanimous jury vote is required for a conviction. But only a simple majority is needed for the jury's non-binding recommendation on a penalty.

Cowart gave no hint whether he would accept the jury recommendation. He has sentenced three people to death, once overriding a jury that recommended life in prison.

Florida electrocuted convicted murder John A. Spenkelink on May 25, the first time in 12 years an inmate in an American prison was executed unwillingly.

Bundy seemed without emotion

read. As he had when he was convicted six days earlier, he remained serene, chewing idly on a mint and

making notes on a yellow pad. Then he rose — but only to speak in calm tones. He wanted to make sure his family could visit him in jail. Cowart said they could.

Prosecutor Larry Simpson reminded jurors of Lisa Levy, 20, and Margaret Bowman, 21, who were battered, choked, and bitten in the Chi Omega sorority house in Tallahassee. Three other young women were beaten the same morning around the Florida State University campus.

Bundy wouldn't let his lawyers in troduce results of his last psychiatric test, but public defender Margaret Good tried to depict a client with a troubled mind. "The crimes were the product of delusion, disorder and compulsion," she said.

She argued that the victims had not suffered. "They were sleeping," she said. "They felt no pain.

Later, she noted the defense has until Aug. 10 to file a motion for a new trial and said "We will file it before that time.

Bundy has other dates in court. He is due for trial in September on a charge of murdering 12-year-old Kimberly Leach, of Lake City, Fla., on Feb. 9, 1978. He is charged in Colorado with the 1975 slaying of Dearborn, Mich., nurse Caryn Campbell. He is still under a 15-year Utah prison sentence for the 1974 kidnapping of 17-year-old Carol DaRonch.

The FBI said in early 1978 that Bundy was sought for questioning in three dozen murders of young women. He was not charged except for the Utah, Colorado and Florida cases.

American Airlines mechanic says instructions sidestepped

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP) - American Airlines mechanics routinely sidestepped company maintenance procedures because they could not be followed to the letter, according to a mechanic testifying at a hearing on

the nation's worst air disaster. Tulsa-based mechanic William R. Robinson appeared Monday on the first day of hearings before a National Transportation Safety Board panel investigating the May 25 crash of a DC-10 airliner at Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. All 271 persons aboard the plane and two persons on the ground were killed.

The hearings were to resume today with three other American Airlines mechanics and an inspector to testify further on how American's wide-bodied DC-10s were maintained. The bulk of the testimony on Monday ad-

dressed that issue. Robinson, who worked on the doomed DC-10 during its last maintenance check at a Tulsa, Okla., facility in March, said he and other mechanics did not follow exactly the sequence of steps in a work order issued by American. That order outlined the procedure for removing the engine from the pylon, which is attached to

He said the company's directive for removing th engine and the pylon could not be followed step by step. He said he performed the tasks out of order without telling his supervisor.

Michael Marx, an NTSB metals expert, said the method of removing the engine and pylon described by Robinson caused a crack in the suport structure. Such a crack caused the left engine of the DC-10 which crashed


at Chicago to fall away on takeoff. Marx also told the panel that American saved about 50 man hours of time on each engine it serviced in that way

Marx, in often complicated and technical remarks, said American maintenance crews removed both the engine and its supporting pylon as a unit, rather than separately as in-

Then, in order to reattach the engine to the wing, the maintenance men had to force the bolting mechanism to fit, thus causing a bend in the engine mounting structure and eventually a crack, he said.

"It's just common sense that they (mechanics) could very well have caused the crack then (when reattaching the engine)," Marx said.



Fuel inventories: Keeping our balance is part of the Droblem. It takes a constant balancing act to meet America's energy needs, because the kind and amount of fuel most needed at a particular time

amount of fuel most needed at a particular time

and place change with the seasons. For instance, gasoline consumption usually goes up about 10% during the heavy summer driving months. Then, as winter closes in, many parts of the country need tremendous amounts of

During the peak seasons for gasoline and heating fuels, the amounts needed are greater than can be met by day-to-day refinery capability, so it is necessary to refine and store a supply ahead of time.

At the same time, throughout the year we are obliged to turn out a steady amount of aircraft jet fuel as well as diesel fuel for farming vehicles and large trucks.

What does inventory balance have to do with the fuel shortage?

All fuels are vital to Americans, so no particular fuel including gasoline can be produced in a totally unrestrained manner at the expense of other fuels. Thus, when demand for gasoline unexpectedly surged to record levels early this year, it created problems in storing enough gasoline to supplement summer production for peak season driving. And now that the peak driving season is upon us, it's virtually impossible to make up for diminished gasoline inventories since inventories of heating oil must be built up for the coming winter.

Also, an inventory of crude oil must be maintained to avoid refinery disruptions if deliveries of new crude supplies are delayed. Nevertheless, we are holding our crude oil inventories down at minimum safe levels so as to maximize gasoline and heating oil availability.

Large inventories must be used just to make the systems work.

In addition to this constant balancing act, sizeable inventories of crude oil and other petroleum stocks are needed just to keep the facilities that make and transport fuels physically operating.

For example, 9 million barrels of oil (the daily total of all U.S. oil production) must actually be inside the Alaskan Pipeline for it to even function.

Putting inventory problems in perspective.

The necessity of adequate and balanced inventories to meet America's varying year-round fuel requirements is not the only factor involved in the shortage. Other factors like refining capacity, increased demand, government controls, environmental restrictions, and even differences in crude oil qualities all play a role and each will be discussed individually in the future.

Regaining our balance.

World and U.S. crude oil supplies are still short of demand. So in Thank you for listening. addition to continued careful management of inventories, America must do everything possible to speed development of our domestic sources of energy, while at the same time doing a better job of conserving, the energy we have now.

Oriental foods offer short-cut to nutritious, balanced meals

Spending long hours preparing everyday meals or special treats for entertaining is a luxury not available to the 24 million working couples in the United States, but there are short cuts to achieving the same results.

Cooking well-balanced, attractive meals does not have to be a time-consuming chore. Tasty, nutritious Oriental meals can be prepared quickly, and the cook can have fun doing it. Paula Purdom of Midland does.

ed in Chinese cooking about five years ago when she and husband Larry received as a wedding present a wok, which is a bowl-shaped cooking utensil used in preparation of Chinese

Mrs. Purdom first became interest-

Since then, she's become a real gourmet in the area of Oriental food, having studied under Irene Wong at the LaBonne Cuisine School of Bon Appetit in Austin.

Her goal is to "turn West Texas on" to Chinese cooking.

"My husband, who grew up here, is basically a meat and potatoes man,' she said. "I thought I was doing good when I finally got him to try stir-fried

SHE IS ENTHUSIASTIC about the advantages of Oriental cooking.

"It's economical because a small amount of meat is used with a large amount of vegetables," she said.

In addition, cooking times are short, wih actual time for most Oriental recipes averaging about 10 mi-

"As a result, the stove is on for just a very little while and the house doesn't get heated, saving on energy," she said.

Oriental cooking, by its very nature, is time-saving, said Mrs. Purdom. It employes three main principles that add speed. "First, you are using meat and vegetables that are cut into small pieces that naturally cook faster. Then, the ingredients are exposed to a lot of cookware surface, especialy if a wok is used. And, finally, Oriental foods are cooked at high heat, cutting down on the time.'

"Additionally, the food is good for persons on a diet because of its low calorie, low-salt and low-cholesterol

The local grocery stores have begun stocking the basic ingredients used in Oriental cooking, said Mrs. Purdom.

"FIVE YEARS AGO, it was hard to locate eggroll wrappers or special vegetables. Now, I can easily find ginger root, snow peas, and bok choy (Chinese cabbage) here."

"You don't have to use a lot of fancy ingredients, however-that's the real beauty of Oriental cooking. She admits that she has done a good

bit of experimenting.

Many of the recipes, for example, call for seafood and shrimp, not always easy to find in West Texas. She adapts the recipe by using chicken and economical cuts of beef.

"Also, everyone has to alter recipes to suit the tastes of individual fami-

Many of the vegetables used in Oriental cooking can easily be grown in the West Texas climate. Mrs. Purdom plans, in fact, to plant a fall garden soon with broccoli, bok choy, cauliflower and spinach, all of which are excellent vegetables to include in Oriental recipes.

For Midlanders interested in learning the basic art of Chinese cooking, Mrs. Purdom will offer four classes beginning in August.

Courses will be held in (1) Stir-frying (the basic method of Oriental cooking; (2) Eggrolls and Wonton; (3) Hunan (also called Szechwan; this is the hot, spicy food of the Orient); and (4) Steaming (using the wok and bamboo steamers).

"By the time a person takes all four courses he or she will have acquired a basic feel for Chinese cooking," said Mrs Purdom.

CLASS SIZE WILL BE LIMITED and schedule will include the preparation of three recipes at each session. Instruction will also be given in chopping, equipment and operation, and following the recipe. Students will eat the foods which they prepare at

She advises that there are two basic rules to preparing a Chinese meal. One, cut meats and vegetables in advance and have all sauces mixed before cooking," she instructed. 'That's the secret to Oriental cooking. The ingredients are cooked for a small amount of time at high heat, resulting in crisper vegetables and meat that is seared, but juicy.

Secondly, she advises that it is important to chop vegetables and meats in similar shapes and sizes "to make the dish pleasing to the eye.

Mrs. Purdom plans a demonstration of her art from 1 to 3 p.m. Saturday at the Gourmet Emporium in San Miguel Square. For further information on the demonstration and classes, call 683-8625

New homes to include a warranty

About 25 percent of the new houses sold in the United States this year are or will be covered by a warranty protecting the quality of the construction. That's twice as many as had such protection only one year ago.

The warranty, offered by many builders, is guaranteed by the National Association of Home Builders, the industry trade organization, which is a lot better than a guarantee from a single builder who may or may not be around when something goes wrong with the house.

Under the arrangement, builders enter into a contractual arrangement with the National Home Owners Warranty Corp. and are responsible in the first year for the repair of all defects in craftsmanship, in the home's mechanical systems (wiring, plumbing and ductwork), and any defects in

structure, as specified in the guide-

In the second year, the builder is obligated to correct all defects in mechanical systems and major structural defects. For years three through 10, the program guarantees repairs on all major structural defects. An interesting part of the protection is that it applies even though there may be a change in house ownership. How did such a program get start-

Obviously, it was inspired by the

complaints of consumers regarding faulty construction. But some reputable builders took it upon themselves to get behind the idea because they saw the industry was suffering from the misdeeds of other builders. So, as Robert Levenstein, president

of Kaufman and Broad Inc., put it, 'This is a chance for private industry to play an important role in consumer protection. The rise in consumer complaints over the years is injurious to the industry in the long run. Eventually, I believe that the majority of new houses in the country will be covered by a Home Owners Warranty

All such consumer guarantees (there are others) will do much to erase the bad image created by some fly-by-night builders over the years. Curiously, various forms of warranties have existed for many years on other costly items - among them television sets, refrigerators and automobiles - but the most expensive of them all offered the buyer little assurance of redress for grievances. Reputable builders usually cooperated with the new home owners, but others did not and, worst of all, some were out of the building business or had disappeared or both.



WASHINGTON (AP) - Surgeon General Julius Richmond urged this week Ameri-One of the most important results cans save lives and money by stressing prevention rather than treatment of disease.

Richmond suggested six ways Americans can "enhance the prospects of good health." They

"Elimination of cigarette smoking, reduction of alcohol misuse, reductions in excess calories, fat, salt and sugar; moderate exercise, periodic tests for major disorders, and adherence to speed laws and the use of seat belts.

In a report on health and prevention of disease, Richmond said American health care spending has skyrocketed to \$192 billion last year, but without any striking improvements in mortality rates as might be expected.

Houswife wins miscarriage suit

DENVER (AP) - A 30-year-old Denver housewife has received a \$6.8 million judgment in a suit charging that an intrauterine birth control device caused a miscarriage that nearly killed her in 1973. The judgment against A.H. Robins

Co. of Richmond, Va., was handed down Monday in Denver District Court. Presiding Judge Robert Fullerton said the award - \$6.2 million in punitive damages and \$600,000 in actual damages - was the largest in Denver legal history.

The suit brought by Carrie Palmer was one of several hundred filed against A.H. Robins, which manufactured an IUD called "Dalkon Shield" in the early 1970s.

It was removed from the market in 1974 after the federal Food and Drug Administration reported a "sharp increase" in the number of deaths and uterine infections among women who used the shield.

Some scientists contend that the multi-filament string on the Dalkon Shield allowed bacteria to enter and infect the wombs of women who became pregnant while using it.

Attorneys for some of the women suing A.H. Robins claim there have been more than 200 "septic abortions" - or miscarriages with uterine infections - associated with the Dalkon Shield. There have been 17 eaths assciated with the IUD, attorneys

Labor officials endorse Carter

WASHINGTON (AP) - The endorsement a coalition of labor leaders is giving President Carter for re-election in 1980 may prove short-lived if Sen. Edward M. Kennedy enters the race.

Officials of six major unions announced Monday the formation of a Labor for Carter-Mondale Committee, then ducked questions about what they would do if the Massachusetts senator made a bid for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Kennedy has said he will not run, and "this committee has accepted that statement," said group spokesman William H. Wynn, president of the largest AFL-CIO union, the 1.3 million-member United Food and Commercial Workers. "We do not want to speculate" about Kennedy challenging Carter in 1980, Wynn said.

But one union official connected with the Carter backers said a Kennedy candidacy would force the announced Carter supporters to "reassess" their political plans. The official asked not to be named. Kennedy, with his strong liberal views, appears to

be the clear favorite for the nomination among union leaders, who reluctantly backed Carter in the 1976 general election campaign and then found his economic policies too conservative for their

But the growing belief that Kennedy will not seek the presidency next year has prompted some labor leaders to endorse Carter as the only viable Democratic candidate even though many of them again are less than enthused with the president.

At Monday's joint news conference, Wynn read a statement praising Carter as a "consistent, committed champion of working men and women." When a reporter asked whether he would evaluate Carter's performance as good, fair or poor. Wynn responded, "Fair."

The idea for the Labor for Carter committee originated with the president's political advisers, who had hoped to attract more supporters than those appearing together Monday.

Carter's aides, in trying to elicit early union backing, have warned labor leaders that a Carter-Kennedy race could split the Democratic Party and give the presidency to the Republicans.

Technical problems hamper experiment

SAN BENITO, Texas (AP) - An experimental attempt to use gas derived from oil and coal to replace natural gas at a South Texas power plant has been stalled by technical problems.

A Central Power and Light project engineer said Monday the gasification process was shut down in June a few days after it began operation. Mike Shropshire said the \$10 million project may be delayed until September while repairs are being made.

CP&L is testing the feasibility of making gas from low quality oil and coal. The resulting gas will be tried as a substitute for increasingly expensive and scarce natural gas at the La Palma power station here. The station's boiler has used natural gas since its opening in 1946.

Shropshire said the major problem was in the "cyclone," a mechanical process used to purify the gas derived from the thick oil and East Texas lignite.

The utility company paid \$5 million for the construction of the experimental facility. Foster Wheeler Energy Corp., of New Jersey was granted a \$5.7 million federal contract to handle the engineering. Fred Urich, Fostr Wheelers senior engineer here, said the Envron-

mentalProtection Agency is interested in the project as a cleaner gasification process. Urich said the system being tried here is the only one of its type in the

The system uses a limestone bed to clean the oil or coal. Urich said the high temperature in the process — up to 1,600 degrees may have contributed to the cyclone's failure.

Shropshire said there were also minor problems with vibration and insulation. He estimated it will cost up to \$12,000 to make the necessary changes before the experiment is resumed. The engineer added that CP&L officials fear natural gas will be

unavailable or too costly within a decade Shropshire is confident the experiment will be a tecnical success. But he cannot tell if the system will prove economically worthwhile.

Oil slick 90 miles from Brownsville

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -Preliminary toxicity tests taken from the oil slick approaching Texas waters are expected today, and scientists plan to test the currents to determine where the slick is headed.

The Coast Guard, which has been flying over parts of the Gulf in a C130 daily with special electronic surveillace equipment, spotted oil on a flight 180 to 240 miles south of Brownsville.

Griggs said from 110 to 180 miles south of Brownsville, the team observed "a lot of sheen, ribbons of oil, as well as some ribbons of oil a little bit farther north of that. But there was no significant amount of oil any farther north than we had expect-

The Coast Guard will make another overflight today, he said.

Meanwhile, patrons of Sohio, Boron and BP gas stations in 12 states and the District of Columbia have been hit with another price increase, Sohio announced Monday.

Prices for all grades of gasoline at company-operated stations were raised three cents a gallon in Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Kentucky, and four cents a gallon in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Delare, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia, said officials of the Cleve-

land-based firm Wholesale prices to independent dealers were raised similarly in both sales regions, Sohio officials said.

And in Congress, Republican members of the Senate Judiciary Committee blasted a proposal from Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., to restrict major oil company mergers in a bid to encourage more oil and gas exploration. Under Kennedy's proposal, the 16 largest U.S. oil firms would be prohibited from acquiring other firms worth more than \$100

million. "We are hoodwinking ourselves if we think legislation like this is going to create energy supplies," said Sen.

Gasoline crisis fades with improved supplies

NEW YORK (A) - The gasoline crisis, which just a few weeks ago forced Americans into long lines at service stations around the country, seems to have all but disappeared.

But analysts say its disappearance is not as mysterious as it might seem. It's just that supply has once again caught up with demand. The supply of gasoline is improving because the effects on oil supplies of

the Iranian revolution and a drop in

U.S. oil production last winter are

substantially subsiding. When they were unable to get the crude oil to make as much gasoline as they needed, oil companies had to allocate what gas they could make about 90 percent as much as last year. Under federal rules companies then had to give priority customers as much as they got a year ago, with the rest divided up among service stations. This meant that many stations were getting about 80 percent of what they got a year ago.

FORT WORTH - The Texas Tech football team had their share of award winners during last year's 7-4 season which saw the Red Raiders finish fourth in the Southwest Confer-

Rex Dockery was tabbed conference coach of the year while James Hadnot, who was converted from tight end to fullback and led the conference in rushing, was the SWC offensive player of the year. And, freshman quarterback Ron Reeves copped conference newcomer of the

ALL THREE return for the upcoming campaign, which begins Sept. 8 in Lubbock against, ouch, Southern Cali-

Yet, with all the holdover award winners, Dockery isn't about to concede a national championship, much less a SWC crown, to the Red Raiders. Not at this time, anyway.

There are just too many ifs. On offense and defense.

"Defensively we need more quick-ness, we need more pursuit," said Dockery here last week during the Texas High School Coaches' Association convention. "Our two critical areas on offense are strength and wide receiver."

Reeves, a sophomore from Lubbock Monterey, threw for 1,195 yards last season while completing nearly 50. percent of his passing attempts.

Dockery, who's been Tech head coach since 1977, plans to utilize an air attack, saying "you've got to be able to throw the football." Before that happens, though, he's got to find

somebody to catch Reeves' aerials. What the Tech taskmaster thinks the Raiders need are fleet people. "We're lacking speed at the skill spots," he said. "You need somebody that's got speed. We need a fast guy that can turn around a game with a

SPEED ISN'T a problem with Hadnot. The bruiser from Jasper has shed a few pounds and Dockery thinks it has to help. "Hadnot gives our running game hopefully a chance of being better," said Dockery. "He's down to about 231 pounds (from 240). Hopefully, less weight will help

Last year, Hadnot rushed for 1,369 yards. Still, Dockery sees room for improvement. Not necessarily more acreage but improved technique. "He (Hadnot) needs to work on his openfield running," explained Dockery.

Perhaps the area where Tech is most blessed is the kicking game, where both regulars return. Maury Buford led the nation in punting last fall as a freshman with a 44.1 average. Bill "Blade" Adams, a senior from Fort Worth Arlington Heights, is a sidewinder who led the Raiders in scoring last year and who has missed only one extra point during his college

The strength of the Tech defense will be the secondary, said Dockery. Strong safety Larry Flowers of Temple and cornerback Willie Stephens of Abilene High return, and they're among the best in the SWC. Plus, Alan Swann, a sophomore from Odessa Permian, appears fully recovered from knee surgery.

RUSTY MARONEY, a 6-foot-1, 215-

pound linebacker who was a former Midland High standout, might be playing an important role for the Raiders this fall, said Dockery. Maroney did a superb job last fall when called-upon to replace injured starter Jeff Copeland.

"Rusty plays with a lot of intensity, he made some big plays for us last year," said Dockery. "Right now, he'll be battling Copeland for the

starting job."
A couple of other Tall City products will be trying to impress Dockery this fall. Jeff McCowan, a 5-foot-11, 205pound linebacker, and Herb Pearce, a 6-foot-2, 215-pound lineman, are 1979 Midland Lee graduates signed to play with the Raiders.

All told, eight of Tech's incoming recruits participated in the Coaches' All-Star game, which bodes bright for

AND THEY'LL need everything they can muster when USC, a heavy favorite for another national championship, invades Jones Stadium.

"We feel it means a lot to our players, West Texas and our conference having USC come here," said Dockery. "Our fans are looking forward to the game. It should be exciting.

Exciting is a word that can also be used to describe the coming SWC warfare. "After Texas, there are five or six teams with a chance of winning it (the conference)," said Dockery. "Every week you line up, it's just going to be tough." Amen, Rex.



Tracee Talavera electrifies crowd in gymnastics

> COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) - Because she has only one international competition under her belt, it's far too soon to tell whether Tracee Talavera, a tiny dynamo from Eugene, Ore., may be the next Nadia Comaneci.

> But juging from the reaction of an overflow crowd at the women's gymnastics finals of the National Sports Festival, something exciting is about to happen to American gymnastics.

> The 4-foot-9, 74-pound Talavera, who is only 12 years old, electrified the crowd Monday night - first with a 9.8 performance on the uneven parallel bars to tie for the gold medal, and then with a 9.8 on the balance beam to easily claim first place in that event. She earlier won the all-around title here. "Tracee is already an excellent gymnast," says

> Marlene Bene, a U.S. Gymnastics Federation representative at the festival. "Is she another Nadia? Well, that's hard to say. We really don't know what's going to happen one or two years from now.' What Bene will say is that the presence of such

> young talents as Talavera and 13-year-old Jackie Cassello has pressed the veteran women's gymnasts into better performances and given the United States "more depth than we've ever had. At the 1980 Olympics, we'll have the strongest team in the history of U.S. gymnastics."

> Talavera clearly figures to be on that team, although she'll likely miss the World Games in December because of her age. She turns 13 in September, but entrants must be at least 14 years old, and the international federation apparently won't grant her an exemption.

Talavera was introduced to international gymnastics in the recent American Cup competition in New York. She surprised everyone by finishing third in the all-around, showing the guts of a youngster and the expertise of a veteran in a scintillating perfor-

"Frankly, we didn't expect her to do that well," admitted Bene. "But she has always had an excellent coach to work with.'

Competitive juices flow during Sports Festival

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) - The nation's inability to develop good young discus throwers and the stirring return to action of 42-year-old Al Oerter got the competitive juices flowing again in John Powell.

Powell, a former policeman from San Jose, Calif., now is so enthusiastic about his own comeback that he has a secret plan he hopes will culminate in an Olympic gold medal next

The 32-year-old Powell, idle most of 1978 because "I thought America was going to pick and develop three discus throwers better than me," completed a gruelling long-distance double Monday. He won the gold medal at National Sports Festival II with a toss of 214 feet, and last week, he was the winner at Spartacade in Moscow.

"When they didn't develop them, I said I thought I could do better than the guys competing, so I decided to come back," said Powell, the United States' top-ranked discus throwe in 1973,1974 and 1975. "Also, Al's presencehelped."

Powell sid he waspleased with is progres — his best this year is 220-11 but tempered his enthusiam by

sayig: "Last tie, with ayear to go before the Olympics, I was No. 1 and Mac Wilkins came in and demolished me (in the Games).'

Now, Powell, the third-place finisher in the Olympics, said he has a 12-month plan that will bring him to his peak at the Games in Moscow. But he would not reveal much about

it. All he would reveal about it was that "it takes patience, it takes setting a goal and it will require more weightlifting - something that I hate to do and have neglected, but I guess I'll have to get back to it." Powell, whose best throw came on

his third attempt, said he was glad Oerter passed his final throw when it started to rain. "The ring got slick when it started to rain," Oerter said. "The surface

was slippery, and I've pulled too

many muscles in that kind of ring. "In 1960, just before the Games at Tokyo - I have memories of a tremendous tear in my rib cage while trying to throw in a wet ring. I didn't want to go through that again, so I passed on my last throw. And I was pretty satisfied with what I'd thrown, so I quit.'
